when they can be spared from the fires they've been working on. However, the closure remains in effect in zone 16, which includes a portion of the extreme part of the county in the Canyon Mt. Vicinity.

They'll be able to return to work, for all logging closures in Douglas County were lifted at midnight last night by State Forester George Spaur. But Hampton guessed that many of the logging crews returning to their jobs will be restricted. Many of the men still are on the fire lines.

Between 50 and 60 Forest Service employees still are fighting fire. A crew of 21 men, loaned by the Douglas Forest Protective Assn., joined the national forest people.

A blanket of smoke from other southern Oregon and northern California fires has been mostly blown away from the Umpqua forest. Fire spotters had trouble seeing new blazes earlier in the week because of the smoke.

However, the air still is hazy in the Cascades. Smoke from local fires is lying in many canyons, making fire-spotting more difficult. The outlook is for warming weather through Saturday, although no forecast of lightning is made, according to a weather report sent to DFFA headquarters in Roseburg.

Signers Of Integration Petitions Lose Their Jobs

SELMA, Ala. — Several signers of a petition demanding racial integration have lost their jobs here in the first showdown on the threat of "economic reprisals" against Southern Negroes clamoring for integration.

Reports indicated more than half the 29 signers have been fired since the petition was filed last week with the Dallas County School Board. Most of those who did not lose their jobs are self-employed or unemployed.

Alton Keith, chairman of the Dallas County White Citizens Council, estimated 16 of the 29 signers have been fired in a "spontaneous reaction" of white employers to the filing of the petition.

Defiant Ex-Convict Shot To Death In New York

NEW YORK — A defiant ex-convict, who held four persons as hostages in a taxi cab and challenged police to "come and get me," was shot to death by a policeman in view of after a theater crowds just west of Rockefeller Center Wednesday night.

The gunman, who had a withered left leg, held off police for 30 minutes before he was killed.

He was identified through fingerprints as Peter Hatzis, 35.

Pacific Highway Relocation Jobs To Be Contracted

Six projects, five of them on the Pacific Highway relocation, will be contracted within Douglas County when the State Highway Commission meets in Portland Sept. 22-23 to let an estimated \$6,000,000 worth of jobs in Oregon.

One of the largest projects will be a 363-foot overcrossing at Divide to carry highway traffic over the Southern Pacific tracks. The structure will replace the present narrow wooden one, which will be razed. The bid opening will be on Sept. 22.

The following day, bids for construction of a 412-foot bridge over Cow Creek on the Yonkum county road and 7.1 of a mile of grading and surfacing will be opened. The bridge is located about a mile off the Pacific Highway near Ford's Camp. It is a federal-aid project, with the state and county participating.

Three other contract lettings are set for Sept. 22. One will be for construction of three structures on the Shady-Carsonville section of the highway. Another will be for fencing from Divide to Rice Hill, and that will continue on Sept. 23. The third will be for installation of guardrail between Roseburg and Myrtle Creek.

On Sept. 23, the commission will open bids for grading 1.23 miles of new highway near the Ford's Camp bridge, contracted last month.

Roscoe Ates Marriage On Again After Battle

HOLLYWOOD — The marriage of stuttering film comic Roscoe Ates is on again despite the premature showering of an old shoe on the intended bridegroom.

During a spat Tuesday night, Ates, 40, said his red-haired fiancée, Sandy Reeves, flayed him on the head with her spiked-heeled shoe.

After treatment for cuts, bruises and bites, Ates said he wrestled Miss Reeves to the floor, got a "scissors hold" on her but she began hitting.

"I didn't get a scratch," said the 21-year-old former model from Houston, Tex.

Ates, who sheriff's deputies said refused to sign a complaint, yesterday kissed and made up with Miss Reeves.

Engineer Gives Approval To Beaver Marsh Project

SALEM — State Engineer Lewis A. Stanley approved Thursday the Eugene Water and Electric Board's applications for the Beaver Marsh hydroelectric project on the McKenzie River.

The permits grant the right to construct Fish Lake Reservoir, to store 1,600 acre feet of water; to store 1,280 acre feet of water in Clear Lake, and to appropriate 1,200 cubic feet per second of water from the two reservoirs and the McKenzie River.

This water would be used to develop 54,500 theoretical horsepower at the Beaver Marsh project.

Negroes Have Legal Right To Use Of City Parks

BEAUMONT, Tex. — Negroes have a constitutional right to free use of city parks here, Federal The Beaumont Enterprise said it Judge Lamar Cecil has ruled.

was believed to be the first decision in the U.S. 5th Circuit striking down segregation of races in the field of public recreation.

Judge Cecil ruled in behalf of six Beaumont Negroes who contended they were denied use of Central and Tyrrell parks solely because of their race and color.

Three Dead, Five Injured In Ohio Train Derailment

CHILLICOTHE, Ohio. — Three men are dead and five injured after the second Ohio train derailment in three days.

A westbound Baltimore & Ohio express piled into a pickup truck at a crossing just east of here Wednesday night, killing three men in the truck and derailing 13 of the 15 train coaches.

Three postal clerks and two crew members from the train were hospitalized after the crash.

PRODUCING JETS

VIENNA — A Prague newspaper says Czechoslovakia's aircraft factories have been producing jet fighters and bombers for the Soviet Union since before the Korean War.

The newspaper Prague published pictures of sleek MIG-type fighters and modern jet bombers Tuesday and described them as the "product of Soviet designers and Czechoslovak workmanship."

Enrollment Up In Days Creek, Riddle Schools

Both Riddle and Days Creek showed increases in the elementary grades as school opened this week.

At Riddle, total registration reached 638. Of that number, 497 were in the elementary grades. A fourth first grade class was added by shifting Mrs. Louise Finlayson from second to first. Mrs. Mavour Stuart was hired to replace Mrs. Finlayson.

Supt. Kenneth A. Stuart told correspondent Erma Best that double-shifting sessions had to be extended through the third grade with 10 teachers sharing six rooms for their classes and work space.

Stuart said 141 had enrolled in the high school. At Days Creek, graders numbered 176, an increase of about 15 over last year, according to Supt. Marlen Yoder. The district registered 39 first graders the opening day, Tuesday. This is the biggest class.

Total registration was 243. Physical examinations were given by two doctors from Forest Glen Hospital. Besides the 39 first graders, 20 ninth graders were examined. Teachers and members of the PTA aided.

Supt. Yoder reported that because of increased pupil load, one change in bus runs has been made. The first bus going up river is 10 minutes earlier because the second run is going to Lavadour, instead of turning around at the gravel dump as it did last year.

Eisenhower Will Be Pressured To State Intention

WASHINGTON — Republican State Chairman Samuel L. Bodine of New Jersey spearheaded today a drive aimed at forcing an early announcement by President Eisenhower whether he will run again in 1956.

Bodine said in an interview he will ask GOP state chairman attending a campaign school here to organize formally and sign a petition asking the President to seek a second term. The New Jersey chairman predicted all would sign.

"I am recommending that the state chairmen organize independently of the party and take united action to make it clear to the President that the party needs him as a candidate," Bodine said. Eisenhower might thus be persuaded, he said, to announce his intentions "at once."

The 48 GOP state chairmen, attending a national committee school here on campaign tactics, will fly to Denver, Colo., at the conclusion of their classes for a Saturday morning breakfast with the President.

Murray Snyder, assistant White House press secretary, said in Denver the President will have no announcement at that time on his future plans.

Mother Of Slain Boy Invited To Attend Trial

SUMNER, Miss. — A Chicago Negro mother will be invited to attend the trial of two men charged with murdering her 14-year-old son for whistling at a white woman.

Dist. Atty. Gerald Chatham of Hernando, prosecutor, said last night he will wire the invitation to Mrs. Mamie Bradley, mother of Emmett Till, as soon as the trial date is set.

Chatham said his telegram will express his personal regret and the regret of the state concerning the unfortunate death of her son.

"I will tell her that I think it is important to the state's case that she appear and certain evidence she can give would be very important."

HEAVY FINE IMPOSED

Robert Joseph Cihbons, 38, Roseburg, was fined \$250 in district court Wednesday after he was found guilty of drunken driving. Cihbons was tried before Judge Warren A. Woodruff. He was arrested last month by a state police officer.

Funeral Friday For Woman, 92

Funeral services were scheduled Friday at 10:30 a.m. in Oakland for Mary Frances Bradburn, 92, who died at Roseburg Monday.

She was born in Cowan, W. Va., Nov. 10, 1862. She moved with her parents to Kansas in 1876 and resided there until 1896 when she moved to Oklahoma.

She was married to William Bradburn in Oklahoma City in 1920. It was her second marriage. After her second husband's death, she moved to Oakland to live with her son, A. P. Bradburn, in 1945. She had two sons, Charles W. and A. P. Both preceded her in death.

Survivors include a sister, Nellie Finley of El Reno, Okla.; two daughters-in-law, Mabel Allen of Oakland and Mattie Allen of Chula Vista, Calif.; and two grandchildren, John and Frances Allen of Chula Vista.

Funeral services will be held at the Presbyterian Community Church, Dr. Homer Noble will officiate. The body will be taken to Eugene for cremation following the service. Stearns & Little Mortuary, Oakland, is in charge of arrangements.

Egypt And Israel Both Censured For Border Clash

GAZA, Egypt-Held Palestine — The Egyptian-Armistice Commission Thursday censured both Egypt and Israel for border clashes east of Gaza on Aug. 22 in which Egyptian soldiers were killed and eight wounded.

The incident caused a breakdown in Egyptian-Israeli talks on easing tension in the Gaza area and preceded the recent fighting which resulted in casualties estimated at more than 60 killed.

The U. N.-sponsored Armistice Commission blamed Israel for firing and shelling an Egyptian outpost and a proposal which said Egyptians fired on an Israeli force.

In Jerusalem, Maj. Gen. E. L. M. Burns of Canada, chief U. N. truce observer, said the mixed Armistice Commission might not be able to fix responsibility for firing the first shot in the recent border clash.

This point, he said, had been omitted from his report released by the U. N. Wednesday because of communications complications. He said he wanted to correct any impression that the report attributed responsibility to either party.

Dwight Phipps Named Oregon State Forester

SALEM — Dwight L. Phipps, deputy state forester for the past six years, will become Oregon state forester on Oct. 1, the State Forestry Board announced Thursday.

He will succeed George Spaur, who said Wednesday he will resign to become a consultant to the U.S. Forest Service for East Pakistan.

Phipps, with 30 years of forestry experience, served as acting state forester for two years while Spaur was with the Army.

Phipps started his forestry work as a patrolman in Jackson County in 1925. Three years later he became district warden there.

Bomber, Fighter Plane Clip Wings And Crash

LAS VEGAS, Nev. — A bomber and a fighter plane clipped wings and crashed east of here Wednesday. A bomber crewman was killed and three of four others aboard were critically injured.

One of the injured, said authorities at Nellis AFB, was a civilian photographer. The B25 bomber was attached to Nellis and was on a routine photographic flight when it collided with the F86 Sabrejet, also from Nellis.

No names were released immediately.

Los Angeles Expects Cooler Weather; 84 Die

LOS ANGELES — The Los Angeles heat wave forecast got out of its 100-degree rut today. A downtown maximum of 94 is expected.

If that forecast holds, it will be the first under-100 weather since Aug. 20.

Yesterday's 100 maximum made it eight straight days with tops at that level or higher, surpassing the previous record for sustained heat of seven 100-or-higher days in September 1939.

The current siege has caused heavy losses in human life, poultry and some crops in the county. The coroner said 84 deaths have been due, directly or indirectly, to the heat.

Geisha Girls Protest Tax Collection System

TOKYO — Three thousand cabaret girls and geishas paraded to a downtown meeting hall to protest a new government tax collection system which goes into effect Nov. 1.

The new law requires the girls to turn in receipts showing their profits from an evening's work. It is bound to cut sharply into their income. They have been able to avert a high tax by declaring small incomes. Now, they'll have to make their declarations and daily receipts like.

Norwegian Ship Owner Radios For Evacuation

COPENHAGEN, Denmark — Capt. Knut Nakkem of the Norwegian ship Jopeter, trapped perilously in the drifting East Greenland ice pack, asked Thursday for air evacuation of 19 passengers.

Helicopters from the U.S. Air Force base at Thule and the Danish navy have been ready at Meistervig, further south, for several days awaiting the captain's decision.

The crew of 16 will stay aboard the ship.

Functions Told For Air Force's New Academy

Functions of the Air Force Academy recently established near Colorado Springs, Colo., were outlined Wednesday night at a meeting of local Air Force reservists.

Conducting a training lecture on the academy was Lt. Col. Joe Carey, Roseburg.

His talk was given at a meeting of Flight A, 9415th Air Reserve Squadron. The unit resumed meetings after a two-month summer recess.

Carey pointed out that academy applicants must meet requirements of other academies and, in addition, be able to pass a regular flight physical.

In addition to regular courses and physical training, students also are given flight training. After graduation those qualifying must then take full pilot training.

The academy, designed to train young men for leadership in the field of military aviation, enrolled 301 when it opened its doors in July. Eventually enrollment will be about 2,500. The annual quota from Oregon is three.

Lt. Col. Theodore H. Wirak, squadron commander, and T. Sgt. Richard A. Camfield, liaison sergeant, both spoke briefly at the meeting, which was conducted by Capt. R. M. Beardsley, flight commander. Camfield also showed movies.

The unit will meet each Wednesday in September. Next Wednesday's session is scheduled for 8 p.m. at the Air Reserve Training Center, 904 S. Stephens St. Members must attend at least three meetings in September to meet minimum training requirements.

Young Woman Granted Probation From State Pen

Adenauer Leaves For Moscow For Talks With Reds

BONN, Germany — Chancellor Konrad Adenauer took off today for Moscow and his momentous first conference with leaders of the Soviet Union.

In an airport statement the 79-year-old West German chief said he was leaving "with the best intentions of doing everything possible to further world peace and to restore the unity of Germany and to reach agreement for the return of our prisoners of war."

"Our goal is to serve the cause of peace, not only in Europe but in the entire world," he declared.

Two American-built constellations carried Adenauer and 49 members of his delegation in the nonstop flight from Bonn to the Soviet capital. Foreign Minister Heinrich von Brentano headed one party, the Chancellor the other. The rest of the 116 delegation members had gone earlier by train.
