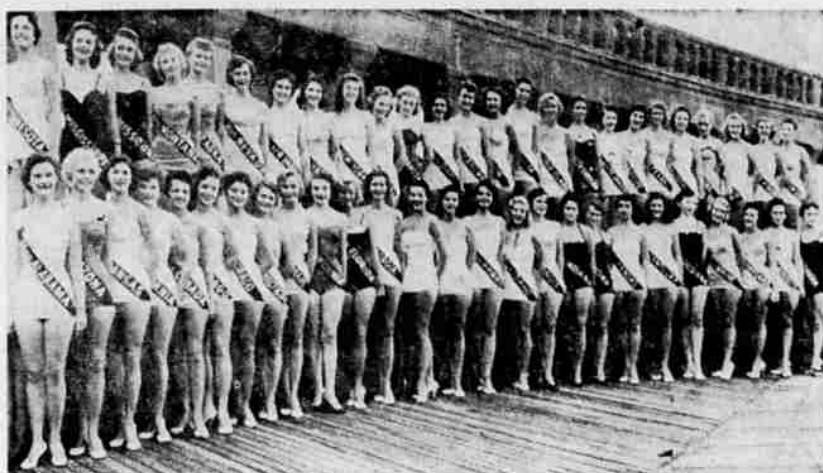

Robert McCreery Arrives As NW Chamber Manager

PORTLAND — Robert G. McCreery Wednesday arrived here to become manager of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce's Pacific Northwest district.

McCreery, whose headquarters will be in Portland, will help business groups in Oregon, Washington and northern California organize congressional action committees to express views on national legislation.

McCreery until recently was district manager for the national chamber in Tulsa, Okla. He once served it as a legislative assistant in Washington, D. C.

Realistic Measures Used In Training Air Force Men For Brainwash Resistance

WASHINGTON — Highly realistic measures of physical and mental pressure, borrowed from the Communists, are being used on Air Force combat crewmen at a new center in Nevada for training in resistance to brainwashing, Newsweek magazine reported Wednesday.

The Air Force promptly called in the commanding officer of the

center for questioning about the article.

The magazine in its current issue describes an unusual 17-day course being given at Stead Air Force Base outside Reno, where it said the air crews undergo hunger, pain, fatigue and mental pressure to teach them to survive in enemy territory or captivity.

It speaks of "ingenious combinations of physical and mental stresses" and tells of men who are washed out of combat flying because of their reaction.

Confinement, hard labor, prolonged interrogations, barefoot "death marches," spotlights in the face, electric shocks and other devices are used, the report said, in preparing men to face the enemy.

"But the pressures are turned on under supervision of medical men and five psychologists and some 29,000 men have safely withstood the 17-day course," the magazine said.

At a stockade, where conditions of an enemy POW camp are simulated, trainees break rocks, sleep on the ground without blankets in near-freezing nights, eat "uncooked spinach and raw spaghetti," the account says.

"Each man is tackled where he is most vulnerable," the story said. "Officers who ask for water get it thrown in the face. Meek 'prisoners' are bounced against the wall by the brainiest interrogator. . . . Men who are shy about undressing may not keep their shorts on. Interrogators munch sandwiches in front of the hungriest trainees."

YMCA Is Seeking New Headquarters

Don Naden, secretary of the YMCA, reported Wednesday that the "Y" is still looking for new headquarters.

The "Y" has been asked to vacate its offices in the Roseburg Armory to allow for expanded National Guard activities. Naden said the "Y" should be in new quarters by Oct. 1.

He said the organization is looking preferably for some centrally located business property which would afford space for game room, offices, a small library and a lobby for club meetings, movies, etc. He said it should probably be 60 feet long and 30 or 40 feet wide. He said the first choice would be a first floor arrangement, but

a second floor location will be acceptable. He said in the event neither of these can be secured, the "Y" would take a large house.

12-Month-Old Error Gets Rash Of Apple Pies

OKANOGAN — How, oh how, asks the Okanogan County Fair manager, did the report get out that there wasn't a single apple pie entered in this apple country's exhibition last week?

In the first place, the Fair wasn't held last week. It is scheduled for Sept. 9-11.

In the second place, says Dr. Charles Benson, whoever was responsible for the widely published apple pie jest had a lot of crust. When the three-day Fair opens, Dr. Benson says, there will be at least 50 apple pies. And that's no apple sauce.

The Okanogan raspberry, it developed Wednesday, should be directed at Spokane. A newspaper, unwilling to start a rhabarbar, accepted the blame, explaining there was a 12-month error in the rewrite of an item from a country correspondent. It was last year's fair that had no apple pies.

Two Biggest Food Chains To Boost Coffee Prices

NEW YORK — The nation's two biggest food chains announced Tuesday that they will boost retail prices of their own brands of coffee Wednesday.

A&P Food Stores will increase its 8 O'clock brand by one cent. Bokar, Red Circle and A&P vacuum-packed coffees will go up four cents a pound.

Safeway Stores said it will hike its Airway brand by a penny a pound and Nob Hill coffee by four cents. Its Edwards coffee will not be increased.

Major independent roasters already have posted higher wholesale prices for coffee following a recent advance in green coffee quotations.

Rear Adm. Ingersoll To Command 7th Fleet

DENVER — President Eisenhower's vacation headquarters announced Wednesday that Rear Adm. Stuart H. Ingersoll will be assigned "in the near future" to command of the U. S. Seventh Fleet, now protecting Formosa against any Communist attack.

Ingersoll, now chief of staff to the commander in chief of the U. S. Atlantic Fleet, will take over from Vice Adm. Alfred M. Pride as head of the Seventh Fleet.

The plans for Ingersoll to take command of the powerful fleet in the Formosa Strait were disclosed with announcement that Ingersoll is being promoted to the rank of vice admiral.

Carrier Lexington Puts To Sea Under Own Power

BREMERTON — The aircraft carrier Lexington put to sea under her own power Tuesday for the first time in eight years.

The modernized attack carrier set out from the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard for three days of tests of her engines and guns. The 41,000-ton ship has undergone a 22-month modernizing job at the yard where it has been in "mothballs."

The Lex is scheduled to go to its new home port of San Diego in mid-November.

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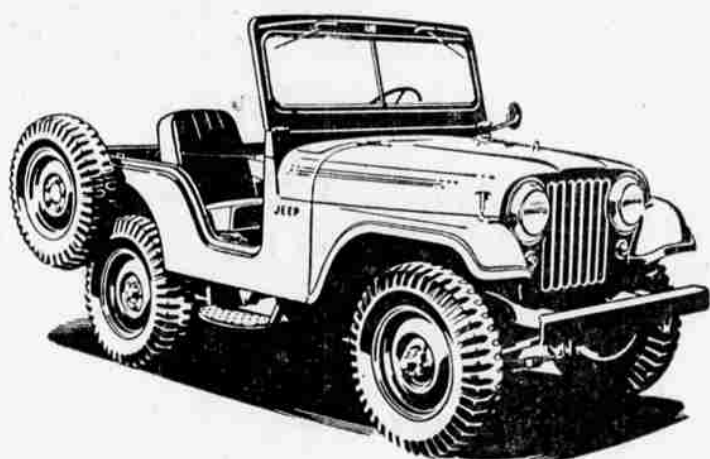
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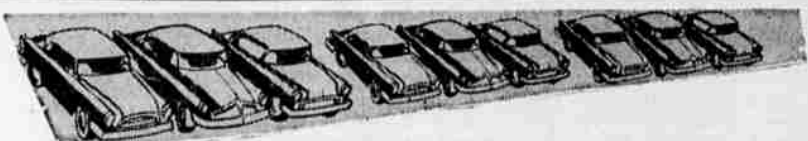
