ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. — Selection of the 1956 Miss America, heiress to a \$50,000 jackpot of prizes and personal appearances, will be made late tonight by a team of 11 judges.

Three finalists, winners held a commanding lead today as the beauty contest moved into the final stage. The judges' decision, expected about midnight EDT, will end a tense, exciting week for the 49 contestants from 15 states, Chicago, District of Columbia, Hawaii and Canada.

The new Miss America, to replace 1955 winner, Miss Lee Ann Meriwether of San Francisco, will be selected on the basis of beauty, talent and personality.

Three nights of preliminary judging have brought valuable point honors to these winners:

Swim suit division—Barbara Mamo Vieira, a tall, tanned Honolulu hula dancer entered as Miss Hawaii; Ann Campbell, a 21-year-old Oklahoma City art student; and a blonde, Clara Faye Arnold of Raleigh, NC.

Talent division—Soprano Patricia Byrd Huddleston, hazel-eyed Southern belle from Clanton, Ala.; honey blonde Sandra Wirth of Miami, Fla., a baton twirler; and drama student Virginia E. Maffucci of Watertown, Mass.

Normally, the growth hormone is most plentifully supplied and active in infancy, childhood and early puberty, the periods when most growth takes place. With the onset of puberty the sex-stimulating hormone gains dominance over the growth hormone, because the period of growth dominance is now over and a period of increased sex development is to begin. Rhythm and timing of hormone activity is an important factor in glandular balance and its normal function. If estrogen, the female sex hormone normally secreted during the first two weeks of the menstrual cycle is secreted too late in the cycle, certain menstrual disorders will appear. On the other hand, if progesterone, the hormone normally secreted during the last two weeks of the menstrual cycle is secreted too early in the cycle, menstrual disorders of another type will occur. In order for glands to function normally they must work in close harmony. They must secrete their hormones in a normal cycle, at a normal rate and in normal quantity and quality. They must be assisted by good nutrition and adequate vitamin and mineral intake and such harmony in glandular function is dependent upon a well balanced body chemistry. (Pd. Adv.)

Ike 'Likes' GOP But Doesn't Give Dope On Running

DENVER — President Eisenhower told GOP state chairmen Saturday that "I like the Republican party better than ever" but gave no public indication of whether he would run again in 1956.

John Feikens, Michigan State chairman, told newsmen that Eisenhower expressed at a breakfast conference with the GOP leaders appreciation for a telegram they had sent him expressing hope that he would run again next year.

Feikens quoted the President as saying that he was "complimented and deeply flattered" by the telegram, and adding: "After receiving your telegram and seeing you men here this morning, I want to say I like the republican party better than ever."

Feikens said GOP national chairman Leonard W. Hall opened the session by telling the President that the state leaders were not going to mention the issue of whether he would run again. Hall added, Feikens said, that one state chairman asked what if Eisenhower didn't run, the chairman replied, "When I come to that bridge, I will jump off of it."

The President was reported to have laughed heartily at this. Murray Snyder, assistant White House press secretary, briefed reporters on the President's remarks. Snyder quoted Eisenhower as saying, "I don't think I am really lacking in leadership that it has to depend on one man."

Snyder reported that Eisenhower made one other allusion to the idea of the indispensable man in the White House—then he discounted it.

expert in financial matters. The measure basically was a tax bill, and it came up with many bad features in it, the legislator said.

Program Given Study
The President did not pull his proposed program out of a hat, the congressman said. It was based largely upon the work of a committee headed by retired Gen. Lucius Clay which made an exhaustive study of the nation's highway system.

But when it got to Congress "this bill, as so many others, ran into a political buzz-saw," Ellsworth noted.

The President's plan was to set up a government corporation to direct the program, with retirement of bonds over a 10-year period.

The administration proposal was an attempt to relieve the strain of an inadequate highway network in the shortest possible time, at little variance from year-to-year cost, Ellsworth said.

Believing a compromise bill is in the offing, the congressman said it may not be a corporation-type measure like the President's, but probably will contain some type of amortization plan and will probably include a one-cent gas tax increase as originally proposed.

Lesson Learned
Although the President's proposal was defeated, Ellsworth said he believes members of Congress learned they "must keep politics out of a practical thing like building roads."

At the onset of his talk, the representative told his listeners they need another branch—that of "political engineers." He urged that there be more individual interest on the part of engineers in the legislative field.

Ellsworth was introduced by Roseburg attorney George W. Neuner who lauded him for "diligently working for the best interests of this district."

Tom Edwards, State Highway Dept. division engineer, was program chairman at the dinner meeting in the Hotel Umpqua. The business session was presided over by Ellsworth Ricketts of the State Board of Engineering Examiners.

Besides members of the three PEO districts — Mid-Willamette, Rogue Valley and Southwestern — several others were present, including President Paul Christerson of Portland.
