

Prosperity Runs High This Side Of Iron Curtain, Says Treasurer Sec. Humphrey

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey told a meeting of free world economic leaders in Istanbul, Turkey, today that prosperity runs high this side of the iron curtain and United States policy is aimed at keeping it that way.

Humphrey's remarks, released here by the Treasury, were prepared for the opening session of the 10th annual meeting of the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund.

The annual reports of the 58-nation bank and fund, also made public here, noted record-breaking economic activity in most parts of the non-communist world, but the fund's optimism was tempered by inflationary threats it found in some places.

Humphrey said:

"Business activity is at record levels throughout most of the world. World trade is at a high and healthier volume. Prices are more stable. There has been a sharp reduction in governmentally imposed barriers to financial and trade transactions.

"Genuine progress has thus been made during these 10 years (since the founding of the bank and fund in 1945) toward the fund's objectives of strengthening economies, removing restrictions, and promoting a more realistic and freer system of healthy exchange and trade.

"In the United States, we have enacted a three-year extension of the reciprocal trade agreements program, permitting a gradual and realistic approach to increasing mutually beneficial trade. Most important of all, we have strengthened and increased the high level of economic activity in the United States, and thus provided an increased demand for the world's goods."

"The over-all prospect is that the dollars available to foreign countries should provide a basis for a continued growth in mutually beneficial international trade. . . . The value of our total imports of goods in 1954 was more than 60 per cent above the 1947-49 level, and in 1955 our imports are still higher. . . ."

Jubilant Relatives Await Release Of 10 Americans From Prisons Of Red China

HONG KONG (AP)—Jubilant relatives began collecting in this British crown colony today to await arrival of 10 American civilians whose quick release has been promised by Red China.

It was not known just when the 10 would cross the border into Hong Kong, but a Peiping radio broadcast indicated they may already be heading for freedom.

When their release was decided, three of the Americans were believed to be in Peiping, three in Fochow, two in Canton, one in Chungking and one in Shanghai. Since all were expected to cross the border together, they would have to meet at some assembly point—probably Canton—for the train trip to Hong Kong.

Mrs. Sue Buol, who arrived here from Taipei, said she "had not been able to sleep a wink" since hearing that her husband Lawrence was among the 10.

Mildred Lovegren, daughter of the Rev. Levi O. Lovegren, said she was "all aglow" when she received a telegram yesterday from her father dated Chungking, which read, "Expect me very soon."

Lovegren's wife also was awaiting his arrival. She and Mildred have lived in Hong Kong for the past three years, doing missionary work among refugees.

Other relatives waited back in the States for the prisoners to return.

In Yonkers, N.Y., Mrs. Adele Austin Rickett, herself a prisoner in Red China for three years, expressed happiness that her husband Walter is among the 10. She said she recently had a "long letter" from her husband and that he "seemed fine."

The 35-year-old graduate student, who praised the Reds when she was freed last February and was described by U. S. officials as "thoroughly brainwashed," said, "I made the comments then and still have the same feeling."

Negotiations at Geneva between representatives of the United States and Red China involved about 41 Americans in all.

Restrictions Removed On Berry Containers

The State Dept. of Agriculture has removed all restrictions on the size and kind of containers used in Oregon for strawberries, raspberries, loganberries, blackberries and dewberries.

The container standards (unchanged since 1941) no longer meet the purposes for which they were established, department officials say. Berry crates must continue to be marked with the name and address of the grower or shipper and the net contents.

Standards for containers for potatoes, apples and pears were also removed recently. All removals followed public hearings.

Two Sutherlin Youths Held On Vagrancy Counts

Two 18-year-old Sutherlin youths, who wouldn't listen to Roseburg police orders to leave the city early Sunday morning, wound up in the city jail, each charged with vagrancy.

Officers said they warned Orville Gene Gulseth and Donald Nelson Hong to quit driving their cars through alleys in the business district and in and out of used car lots on several occasions.

Each time, police said, the two were found later still riding around. At 5 a.m., the officers had enough. Both boys were hauled in. Court appearance was set for today.

3 Roseburg Girls Return From Trip To Europe

Three girls from Roseburg were back in town from Europe today with some wide-eyed reports on the YMCA world conference in Paris and their grand tour of seven European countries.

The three are Charlene Boyles, Joleen Lyda and Carmen Ford. They were delegates to the YMCA conference.

They had many refreshing words about the conference, but one of the highlights pointed out was the final resolution made at the conference by the more than 1,000 girls and boys from 46 countries.

It was agreed that the one common basis which drew them together was "our belief in Jesus Christ." The resolution went on to say the YMCA would seek to unite these young people, who "regarding Jesus as their savior, according to the Holy Scriptures" desire to be "His disciples in their doctrine and in their life, and to associate their efforts for the extension of His kingdom amongst men."

The resolution says the "peace of the world is on the shoulders of youth of the world, and appeals to 'our fellow YMCA members and youth of the world to protect from the dangers of another war.'"

The resolution also took a stand in an effort to "continue to dispel the misunderstandings between our peoples and our nations."

During their visit to Europe, the three Roseburg girls toured seven countries, saw the opera "Aida" in Rome, Queen's Park in London and a host of other sights. One sight that remains firmly in their minds is the children's re-education camp for youngsters orphaned by war. Most of them were still suffering from the effects of malnutrition, said Miss Ford.
