Six Killed When B25 Plane Crashes

UNIONDALE, N. Y. — Six men were killed Tuesday when a B25 military plane crashed into a cemetery here five minutes after taking off from nearby Mitchell Air Force Base on Long Island.

Three of the victims were crew members and three were passengers.

An eyewitness said two bodies were thrown out of the plane when it crashed and exploded in Greenfield Cemetery. Four others were seen in the wreckage.

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Faure Names Men To Depose Sultan Arafa

PARIS — Premier Edgar Faure's cabinet Tuesday named a four-man "hatchet committee" to depose Sultan Mohammed Ben Moulay Arafa as the first step in a reform program for Morocco.

The four ministers are to supervise the deposition stated in a letter to the Sultan from France's President Rene Coty. Coty promised the monarch an honorable exit and a generous financial annuity.

This was France's answer to terms set by the Sultan in an earlier letter to Coty. He demanded a guarantee that pro-nationalist former Sultan Mohammed Ben Youssef, would not be restored to the throne. On this point, according to reliable informants, the French government was vague, replying merely that France has no intention of reestablishing Ben Youssef in power.

Moroccan nationalists regard Ben Youssef, whom the French ousted and exiled two years ago, as the legitimate ruler and Moulay Arafa as an usurper. The French have promised the nationalists to bring Ben Youssef from Madagascar to France, pending a final decision on his future.

The four men appointed by the cabinet are Vice Premier Gaston Palewski; Pierre Joxe, minister for Tunisian and Moroccan affairs; Justice Minister Robert Schuman; and Overseas Territories Minister Pierre-Henri Teitgen.

City's Death-Free Accident Record Cited By Police Chief Olson; Mishaps On Decline

Only three traffic injuries, compared to 43 in the same period last year, have been recorded in the City of Roseburg during the first eight months of 1955.

Police Chief Stan Olson credited the astonishing injury reduction on the continuation of a strict traffic enforcement program started three years ago.

The record for this year shows only two bad months. Olson said those were February, when police eased off temporarily on the program, and in June, when the one-way street grid was reversed downtown.

Through the first eight months of this year, 303 accidents were investigated by police. Of those, 48 were in February and 47 in June. Last year, 319 accidents were recorded through August.

The concentrated enforcement program this year brought about the arrests of 1,155 persons for moving "hazard" violations. The figure for the same period last year was 1,200.

The chief pointed to a chart on his office wall to bear out his contention that "strict, but fair and impartial," enforcement does the job for the city.

The chart shows that in 1951, only 803 citations were issued. That year, there were 690 traffic accidents and 62 injuries. The next year, 933 citations were issued, with 672 accidents and 61 injuries.

Longshoremen Continue Strike On East Coast

NEW YORK — Most of the teeming activity of Atlantic Coast ports was still Tuesday in support of New York's defiant longshoremen. The show of strength was not unanimous, however, and failed to bring any federal government intervention.

The stoppage was most effective in the northeast, from the Philadelphia area to Maine. Baltimore and Hampton Roads longshoremen hesitated, and work continued as usual in New Orleans and several other Gulf cities.

Meanwhile, New York dockers, spearhead of the tie-up, scheduled a meeting for Wednesday to hear progress reports. There was no hint as to whether a change in tactics might be under consideration.

Two men received injuries, not believed serious, in a head-on collision about 9 a.m. today south of Yoncalla on Highway 99.

Taken to Cottage Grove Hospital for treatment were Arthur Wlod of Portland and P. D. Lloyd of Nehalem. The men were taken to a local hospital and on to Cottage Grove. Medical personnel at Cottage Grove said the injuries do not appear to be serious.

Couple Indicted For Heiress' Death; Mother Committed

PHILADELPHIA — A man and his wife in whose apartment Mrs. Doris Jean Silver Ostreicher died have been charged with performing the abortion, which resulted in the death of the 22-year-old heiress.

Mr. and Mrs. Milton Schwartz, arrested Monday night, were accused of conspiring with the dead girl's mother to commit the crime of perjury at the inquest which determined Mrs. Ostreicher's death "a homicide." They also were accused of being accessories before the fact of a criminal abortion.

The Schwartzes, who refused to talk to anyone but their attorneys, were freed in \$5,000 bail each pending arraignments before a magistrate on Thursday.

Detectives said they found Schwartz, 48-year-old bartender and his wife, Rosalie, 45, a beautician, in the backyard of a relative's West Philadelphia home—in files from the North Philadelphia apartment they have shunned since the 22-year-old heiress' death.

Monday afternoon the dead girl's mother, Mrs. Gertrude Silver, 49, was held in \$1,500 bail for a hearing, date not set, on a charge she conspired in and was an accessory to the abortion.

Mrs. Silver was unable to testify at her scheduled hearing and three psychiatrists testified she was incapable of understanding what was going on about her. She will be committed to a mental institution until such time as she can appear and testify.

Hurricane Hilda Moves Toward Cuba, Bahamas

MIAMI, Fla. — Hurricane Hilda, now packing 90-mile winds over a small area near its center, moved on a westward course Tuesday that threatened eastern Cuba and the southern Bahamas with high tides and heavy winds.

The eighth tropical storm of the year moved south of Great Inagua Island and at mid-morning was centered 590 miles southeast of Miami. It was expected to continue its westward movement at another 12 hours or more.

Storm forecasters in the Miami Weather Bureau advised interests in the southern Bahamas and eastern Cuba against rough seas, high tides and gale to hurricane force winds Tuesday afternoon and Tuesday night.

Small craft in the Bahamas, Cuba and southeastern Florida were advised not to venture far into the open sea.

Great Inagua, about 650 miles southeast of Miami, is the site of a big plant where coastal salt is extracted from sea water and shipped to countries around the world. The island's population of about 2,500 is mostly native.

Eugene Woman Reports Theft Of Billfold

Mrs. John L. Whitsett, Eugene, complained to Roseburg police Monday that her billfold, containing \$18 and papers, was stolen from a room at an Oakland service station.

She said she left her purse, the billfold inside, in the rest room. Later, she discovered she hadn't brought it with her. Returning, she said she found the purse still in the rest room, but the billfold was gone.

The police turned the case over to the Sheriff's Dept. for investigation.

YOUNG GIRL KILLED

SALEM — Mildred Messner, 17, of Salem, was killed Monday night in a two-car intersection collision in the Salem residential district.

The impact of the collision threw her car out of control. It sheared off a utility pole and landed upside down. She was alone in the car.

The occupants of the other car were not injured.

Racial Segregation Factor In Choosing Site For Convention

HOUSTON, Tex. — Racial segregation today appeared the big issue before delegates at the Protestant Episcopal Church convention in selecting a site for its next convention in 1958.

The issue arose yesterday when the Joint Committee on Bishops and Deputies met to consider invitations from Miami Beach, Fla., and New York.

The present convention was shifted from Houston, Tex., to Honolulu because of segregation in Texas.

Supporters of Miami Beach said there would be no segregation between Negroes and whites. New York supporters said they had the facilities and no segregation problem.

The House of Deputies quickly approved Monday a \$6,807,917 budget for each of the next three years. It represents an increase of nearly one million dollars over the current budget.

The deputies beat down a motion by John Ebaugh of Birmingham, Ala., to adopt a budget of slightly more than \$8,000,000.

The bishops must approve the budget before it becomes effective. They may act today.

The budget, as approved by the deputies, increases the church's spending on missionary work from \$4,228,135 to \$4,929,826. It also recommends spending \$100,000 a year on radio and television material for church work.

City Presented Plaque For No Traffic Deaths

Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry Monday presented Mayor Ernest Barker Jr. a plaque in recognition of its death-free streets during 1954.

The plaque was given to towns between 3,000 and 10,000 population which weathered the year without a single traffic death. The plaque was awarded by the National Safety Council through the secretary of state's office.

Mayor Barker lauded the previous city administration for being largely responsible for the record, but he urged cooperation from the city's residents to repeat the record this year. So far, no death has been recorded in the city.

Adenauer Finishes Talks In Moscow

MOSCOW — West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev ended their historic talks Tuesday night.

They signed a statement which was not immediately made public. Bulganin was asked by a reporter, "How did things end?" He replied with a smile and handshake, "Everything is fine."

Adenauer and Bulganin had talked for an hour and 45 minutes Tuesday morning in an effort to break the stalemate on conference started Friday on the restoration of relations between the two governments.

They resumed sessions Tuesday afternoon that carried over until Tuesday night. They signed their statement at 9:10 p.m.

Council Slates Ordinance Calling For Renumbering Of Business Houses, Homes

Opponents Of Change Cite Time As Principal Objection To Plan

The proposal to change house and business address numbers and duplicated and confusing street names cleared a major hurdle Monday night.

The Roseburg City Council approved a motion to set the official wheels in action. City Attorney Paul Geddes was requested to write an ordinance allowing a change in home and business numbers to become effective Oct. 1.

Council Acts On Many Items

What The Council Did
1. Ordered city attorney to write ordinance allowing changing of house and business numbers.
2. Gave Roseburg Transit Co. a temporary extension of franchise until the council studies the request for a 3-year extension. Present franchise expires Saturday.
3. Approved resolution to engage the services of the League of Oregon Cities to revise and codify city ordinances.
4. Approved request by George Smith for a liquor-by-the-drink license at the Rose Hotel.
5. Authorized the mayor to select a committee to review policy of the council on liquor applications.
6. Approved a dancing and entertainment license for Leonard Zacher's Friendly Tavern on South Stephens.
7. Approved a business license by J. Sayre for Sayre's Volkswagon Sales and Service at Stephens and Mosher streets. Sayre has a five-year lease with owner Jim Bevin. Bond was waived.
8. Approved proposal by School District 4 for possible hookup of Huerfano sewer lines with future Roseburg sewer system in that area.
9. Approved partial payments on street and sewer improvements totaling \$29,432.44.
10. Referred a request by West Coast Airlines for a sign board permit to the finance committee.

No action on allowing street name change was taken despite the Roseburg Planning Commission has not entered a detailed request. It is expected this will come up at the next meeting.

The council intimated its decision was indicative of approval of such a number-changing ordinance when it is written. Thus, the present operation of designating and giving new numbers will continue.

The decision by the council was not reached, however, until after a two-hour discussion from a crowd of about 40 people who jammed into the council chambers.

The dissenters were largely businessmen who protested the cost of the necessity of address changes in advertising and other printing. Petitions against the changes were entered by six people or businesses. The petitions included 243 names. One petition in favor of the change was entered by The News-Review. It commended the council for its "wisdom and foresight."

Petitions against the change were entered by: G. M. Denton, Robert K. Simmons, Bill Evans, Mrs. Oliver Boyer, Family Finance Corp., and C. M. Howard. Despite the heavy list of petitioners, however, the audience was balanced among the pros and cons.

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Hearing Necessary Before Any Street Names' Changing

Although Monday night's council action approving formulation of an ordinance allowing house and business address number changes was a major step toward systematizing the city's address system, at least one more public hearing was called for.

City Attorney Paul Geddes reported that under state law, full names of streets could not be changed without a public hearing. (As an example, Rose could not be changed to Powell Street without a hearing.)

Although the prospective streets to be renamed have been listed, no new names have been recommended at the council yet. It is expected that the next meeting of the City Planning Commission will introduce such name changes. A public hearing can be held at that meeting if such name changes are introduced, Geddes said. But it must be held.

The City Planning Commission has announced it has no plans for sweeping name changes. It will only request some changes for streets having the same names or names causing confusion. O. J. Felt Jr., former chairman of the city planning commission, cited one glaring example of what he considered streets ready for change. He said there are seven First streets or avenues and seven Second streets.

No public hearings will be necessary for the destinations of quadrants. Streets will fall into one of four quadrants to be preceded by SE, NE, SW and NW. Thus, an address would read 1514 SE Stephens St.

If the council approves an ordinance allowing renumbering, it will be the second ordinance in the direction of systematizing the city's address setup. Last year, an ordinance was passed to make all north and south thoroughfares "streets" and all east and west thoroughfares "avenues." As an example, Jackson will remain a street, and Cass will become an avenue.

Four-Way Stop Light Scheduled At Triangle

A four-way stop light to replace the present three-way installation at the intersection of Winchester Street and East Second Avenue South will be in operation probably by the end of the week.

Police Chief Stan Olson said today that traffic going west on Second Avenue will be halted by a red blinker light to be installed by the city at the intersection.

Reasons are that the intersection is "blind" and that traffic going west on Second Avenue has been too fast for safety. The chief pointed out that the blinking red light means for drivers to come to full stop before proceeding across the intersection.

Charge Says Pair Gave Intertidated Person Wine

Two persons each pleaded innocent today in district court to identical charges of giving liquor to an intertidated person.

Dist. Judge Warren A. Woodruff placed \$25 bail each on Alene Lund, 45, of 315 S. Rust St., and Garry Carroll, 49, of 516 S. Oak St., and set trial for next Monday at 2 p.m.

City police arrested the two Monday and charged they gave Francis Tyrer, 747 S. Pine St., a bottle of wine. Carroll pleaded guilty to a charge of drunkenness and Judge Woodruff fined him \$25.

WRECKAGE RETURNED

SEASIDE, Ore. — The Communists have returned wreckage of an armed U.S. Air Force training plane they shot down Aug. 17 near the demilitarized zone. The pilot, Lt. Guy H. Bumpas of Jackson, Miss., was seriously injured and his observer, Capt. Charles Brown of East Louisville, Ky., was killed. Bumpas returned Aug. 23.
