The state board meeting of the American Association of University Women has been called for Friday and Saturday, Sept. 16 and 17, in Klamath Falls, according to the state president, Mrs. Willard Duncan, of Klamath Falls. Some 80 delegates, branch presidents, and state chairmen, will be present.

Three members of the national association board have been invited to speak. They are Mrs. C. D. Winston, Ashland, regional vice president; Mrs. Cecelia A. Sariss, national status of women chairman, and Mrs. Robert Y. Thornton, national art committee member, Portland.

Guest speaker at the Saturday luncheon is Mrs. Percy Collier, professor emeritus of Reed College, Portland, whose topic is "Liberal Arts, the Keystone of Our Culture."
