COMPTON, Calif. — Mrs. Elaine Fischer's baby was overdue and the neighbors kept inquiring. Finally she told her husband, salesman Hal Fischer: "We're always flying flags on holidays. Tell them we'll fly a flag when the baby's born."

A 6-pound, 6-ounce boy arrived Sunday, the Fischer's fourth child. Fischer proudly hoisted a flag on the front porch. The flag shows a baby lying on a blanket in a deep blue background with the words: "It's a Boy," the child was named Dwight David and Fischer telegraphed President Eisenhower that his namesake had arrived.

Fischer is known as the founder of President's Day, celebrated every March 4 in honor of all American presidents.

Khrushchev Says U. S.-Russian Trade Desirable

MOSCOW — Sen. Milton R. Young (R-ND) said Monday Communist party chief Nikita Khrushchev told a group of visiting senators U.S.-Soviet trade relations are "not only possible but desirable."

Khrushchev made his statement at an unprecedented reception for the American legislators at the Kremlin, where he and Premier Nikolai Bulganin were their hosts for an hour and 45 minutes.

Young said he introduced the subject of trade while discussing agriculture with Khrushchev.

"I asked him (Khrushchev) if he thought it possible for the United States and the Soviet Union to engage in an exchange of agricultural goods," Young said. "Then the discussion widened to include the possible exchange of other goods. Khrushchev said it was not only possible but desirable."

able to establish trade relations. He also told us that the ban on trade with Russia had helped the nation develop its own industry."

Sen. Dworshak (R-Idaho) said the Russian leaders made it clear at the confab that they felt an exchange of trade with the United States was not vital to them but by such trade they could engender good political relations.

Other senators who met with the Soviet leaders were Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.), J. Allen Frear (D-Idaho) and George W. Malone (R-Nev.).

The same five men, here on an unofficial tour, Sunday were the first American legislators ever permitted to see the new Soviet atomic power station near Moscow.

"They showed us the whole thing," Kefauver said. "They have built a good reactor. I have seen

the installations at Oak Ridge and this compares favorably."

Oregon's Beauty Contestant Wins Friend In Every State

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. — Dorothy Mae Johnson of Garden Home, Ore., who last week was named runner-up in the Miss America contest here, said one of the most important things she gained from the affair was "one friend in every state of the Union."

She was referring to the other contestants.

Other things she gained included a four-foot-high trophy and a \$3,000 scholarship, which she plans to use for attending the University of California at Los Angeles. She will study drama and speech therapy.

After attending a screen processors' convention here, the beautiful 19-year-old brunette plans to tour Washington, D.C., as a guest of the Marine Corps. The guided tour was arranged because she had

been Miss Marine Corps Reserve of Portland, Ore.

At her home in the little community south of Portland, her father watched on television as his daughter advanced in the judging—among the 10 finalists, then among the five finalists, and at last only she and Miss Colorado were left.

The father said that Miss Colorado was a beautiful and talented girl, but that he naturally was disappointed that Dorothy Mae didn't win after coming so close to the title.

Miss Johnson earned the right to represent Oregon in the contest by winning the Miss Oregon competition at Seaside earlier this

summer. She represented Beaverton in the Oregon contest. At Seaside her talent demonstration act was a reading of the sleep-walking scene from Shakespeare's Macbeth. She presented this same reading in the national contest, which was nationally televised.

Miss Johnson said one of the highlights of the trip here was her meeting with radio-television singer Eddie Fisher.

She is the first Oregon girl to win such a high position in the contest. Jo Ann Amodeo, Oregon's first Miss America contestant in 1947, finished seventh. In 1953, Patti Throop was among the 10 finalists.

Midwest Demos Jab Hard At Ike

INTERNATIONAL FALLS, Minn. — Midwest Democratic leaders from nine states scattered Monday after jabbing hard during a two-day strategy session at the Eisenhower administration's handling of farm problems.

"A brazen and ruthless betrayal of America's farmers" — that's the way the Democrats described administration agricultural policies in a resolution containing other strong phrases, like "calculated deceit," "callous indifference," "flagrant neglect."

Paul Butler of Indiana, chairman of the Democratic National Com-

mittee, said the farm issue promises to be No. 1 in the 1956 presidential campaign.

Butler met with high-level Democrats from Michigan, Wisconsin, Kansas, Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Minnesota and Montana. The Illinois organization sent no representatives.

At the conference, he disclosed national committee plans to "out-hustle" the Republicans in employment of advertising techniques next year. He said he expected former President Truman to remain on the firing line during the campaign.
