

Book Selection Policy Adopted By Library Board

A general book-selection policy based on the principle that first purchases must be varied was adopted Tuesday night at a meeting of the Douglas County Library Board.

Other factors in setting up the county library were also discussed at the meeting, including consideration of ways to extend library service to various parts of the county.

The library, to be housed in the west wing of the new courthouse construction probably won't be opened until March.

In the meantime, many things, including book purchasing, must be accomplished. Librarian M. L. Trimble said the board decided to use standard methods of selecting books, with about half of the purchases being for adult volumes and half for children's and young people's books.

The board also approved two field trips for Miss Trimble. She will go to Klamath Falls where the county has just established a new library building, and she will take a trip to the state library at Salem to coordinate service to Douglas County.

Chairman Gordon Carlson of Roseburg presided at the meeting. Also present were Secretary Mrs. Hal Schiltz, of Myrtle Creek, Mrs. Jack Randall of Drain and Miss Bess Clough of Canyonville. James Bovingdon of Oakland was unable to attend.

New Storm Boils Up After Hilda Smashes At Cuba

MIAMI, Fla. — A new tropical storm boiled up in the Atlantic Wednesday just as Hurricane Hilda completed her smash through the towering mountain ranges of eastern Cuba.

Reconnaissance aircraft located the new storm, some 520 miles east of San Juan, Puerto Rico, and 1,400 miles southeast of Miami. Her highest winds were estimated at 65-70 miles an hour, but she was expected to grow into hurricane force by mid-afternoon.

She was moving between west and west-northwest, on a course that placed the northern Leeward Islands in immediate danger and offered a potential future threat to the U.S. mainland.

Forecasters in the San Juan Weather Bureau said Hilda's present course would bring her strong central winds close to St. Bartholomew, St. Martin's and Anguilla in the Leeward Islands in 10 to 12 hours.

Meanwhile, Hurricane Hilda was weakened by her encounter with the mountains of eastern Cuba, but Miami forecasters said she probably would regain her full strength within 24 hours as she moves across the Caribbean Sea.

Beside his wife, he is survived by a son, Rodney, and a daughter, Ardella, both of Sutherlin; a grandson, Tony Hague; his mother, Mrs. Sarah Cheever of Sutherlin; and five half-brothers, Elmer Williams of Oakland, Wilbur Williams of Oakridge, Vernon Hague of Redding, Calif., Clarence Hague of Lenoak, Calif., and Ralph Hague of Napa, Calif.

Tammany Gains In N.Y. Election

NEW YORK City—A New York City district attorney, under federal indictment in connection with his activities while a congressman, lost a bid for the Democratic nomination for another term as prosecutor.

Queens County Dist. Atty. T. Vincent Quinn lost by a slim margin in yesterday's primary election to State Sen. Frank D. O'Connor, who was backed by the county Democratic organization. Complete returns from the county's 940 election districts gave O'Connor 34,178 votes to 32,955 for Quinn.

Another highlight of the primary results in New York City was Tammany Hall victories in contests for Democratic district leadership in Manhattan.

Tammany Leader Carmine G. DeSapio, who is New York state Democratic national committeeman, hailed the primary results as a "clear mandate" for the program and policies of Tammany under his leadership.

Heiress' Death Search Widens

PHILADELPHIA — The district attorney's office widened its probe today into the past activities of a couple held in the abortion death of heiress Doris Silver, Osterreicher in the wake of reports of other abortions allegedly performed by the pair.

Officials awaited results of a chemical analysis of bed linen taken yesterday in a thorough police search of the couple's North Philadelphia apartment where the 22-year-old bride of two months died Aug. 24.

The couple, Mr. and Mrs. Milton Schwartz, are free in \$5,000 bail each pending a hearing Monday on charges of performing the unsuccessful abortion that caused the death of Mrs. Osterreicher.

Asst. Dist. Atty. Jacob Kalish said yesterday that investigators had a "great deal of information" about other abortions allegedly performed by the Schwartzes.

Huge Damage Suit Entered Against Freight Company

A Roseburg man, John Yarborough, 23, who was involved in a traffic mishap last month which took the life of a truck driver, has filed suit in Douglas County Circuit Court for \$125,000 general and \$1,200 special damages. The action is against Consolidated Freightways, Inc., and Pierce Auto Freight Lines, Inc. Yarborough alleges their drivers were at fault in the accident.

The crash near Canyonville on Aug. 23, claimed the life of the Consolidated driver, Robert Tice, 43, Portland.

The suit here followed on the heels of a \$70,500 action entered at Portland last Thursday by Consolidated for loss of the truck and its cargo of kerosene and turpentine. Yarborough, Pacific Motor Sales and George D. Dunning were named defendants.

In Yarborough's complaint, he alleges the pickup he was driving for Pacific Motors was forced off Highway 99 by the Consolidated truck.

He says he was passing the Consolidated truck when a Pierce truck, immediately ahead of the other truck, signaled to the Consolidated driver that the road was clear for passing.

Without signaling, Yarborough contends, the Consolidated driver pulled to the left to pass, forcing Yarborough's pickup over a bank on the west side of the highway. He also alleges the Consolidated truck was going faster than the law allows.

The resultant crash, in which the Consolidated truck went over a bank and burned, left Yarborough with permanent injuries, he claims.

Judgment Favors Defendant In Civil Case Here

A decree by Judge Charles S. Woodrich has been filed in circuit court whereby the defendant in a suit over sale of timber is to recover a judgment of \$62,250.

The case, Multnomah Plywood Corp. vs. West Fork Logging Co., grew out of a contract entered into in October 1951 whereby the defendant would log certain timber for the plaintiff in the area west of Glendale near the West Fork of Cow Creek.

In an 11-page accompanying memorandum, Judge Woodrich notes that the contract called for delivery of 30 million board feet of timber, with a statement to the effect that new arrangements would be made after that had been accomplished. The parties evidently anticipated that the original contract would cover twice that amount of timber harvesting.

Judge Woodrich ruled that the contract is unenforceable because of its indefiniteness, but that the defendant company have judgment of \$62,250 because the lands of the plaintiff were enhanced by construction of access roads.

In the original complaint, the plaintiff sought to have the tract, which ended at the point where 30 million feet had been delivered, with provision that the defendant be paid \$36,000 for road building costs.

Fresh Tracks Reported In Search For Two Men

SPIRIT LAKE, Wash. — Fresh tracks were found yesterday by searchers looking for two aged uranium prospectors who disappeared Sunday in rugged country near Mt. St. Helens in the Cascade Mountains.

Findings of the tracks spurred weary crews to new efforts early today, aided by a bloodhound brought from Gary's Harbor County by Deputy Sheriff Ian Kilcup. The tracks were near the spot that C. H. Allger, 85, Tacoma, and Charles Dickens, 70, San Diego, last were seen.

Their disappearance was reported by J. F. Castle, 91, Tacoma, who said the other two men started toward Bismarck Mountain after getting a strong "blip" on their geiger counter from that direction.

Saturday Closing For Court House Established Here

Practically all county offices will be closed Saturday, Sept. 17, and on subsequent Saturdays.

Members of the Douglas County Court have signed a resolution authorizing Saturday closing, following the lead of some other counties where state employees already are given Saturdays off.

In line with the resolution, office opening time will be jumped up to 8 a.m. on week days, effective Thursday.

There are certain exceptions: The county clerk's office will be open on the last day of voter registration, from 8:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. when that day falls on a Saturday.

Also, the tax collector's office will be open on Saturdays during a taxpaying period of about three months each year.

The sheriff's office will be open until noon on Saturdays, as usual, but women office deputies will not be on duty.

All office hours, after today, will be 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., but Judge Carl C. Hill pointed out that the law prohibits the clerk's and tax offices from doing business before 8:30, so those two offices will be open to the public at that time.

The resolution closing the offices on Saturdays is authorized by a 1955 law for counties with population less than 200,000. No objections were received at a public hearing held by the County Court on Sept. 7.

Government Signs Contract For Big Aluminum Plant

WASHINGTON — The government Tuesday signed a contract with the Harvey Machine Co., Torrance, Calif., calling for prompt construction of a 65 million dollar aluminum plant at The Dalles, Ore.

Edmund F. Mansure, General Services administrator, announced the signing of the contract designed to add 108 million pounds annually to the nation's capacity to produce primary aluminum.

Mansure said the company is to begin construction of the plant promptly and to produce and sell 270,000 tons of metal by June 30, 1963.

The General Services Administration gave Harvey a letter of intent in 1953 covering the project. The signing Tuesday converted that into a contract which runs until June 30, 1963.

Harvey will become the fifth producer of primary aluminum in the nation.

The government will have first call on output of the new plant. If it does not take all the production, a proportion must be made available to non-integrated users of aluminum.

Mansure said the contract was signed immediately after Harvey entered into an agreement with the Bonneville Power Administration for the power lines and power.

Secretary of the Interior McKay had earlier announced the agreement to advance \$2,638,000 of material and equipment in lieu of cash, to cover costs of the transmission

He is a professor of chemistry at Trichy Graduate College besides his duties with the Katmandu schools which he has held down for the past 2½ years. Previously, he had been a teacher and headmaster at Bhadgaon, near Katmandu.

He gave FOA credit for bringing technical development to the backward nation in roads, agriculture, dams, education and health. Disasters, malaria in particular, is on the downgrade in the nation now.

Deller confirmed Rama's amazement at commonplace machines in the United States.

A Hindu, Rama holds the cow as a sacred animal. Deller said he asked Rama if milk is drunk in his country. Rama replied that it is milked by machines. Rama said they don't because "they might hurt the cows."

Deller took the visitor to a local dairy to prove that milking machines probably are less hazardous to cows than fingerails of a milk-er.

Rama stated that a fellow countryman, Tenzing Norky, is a national hero. Norky, a Sherpa guide on the British Mt. Everest expedition two years ago, shares with Australia's Sir Edmund Hillary the honor of having been the first men ever to climb to the peak of the earth.

Thursday, Rama and his seven fellows at the university will go to Pendleton to inspect schools in Umatilla County.
