

Salk Vaccine Program Said Complete Success In Oregon

THE DALLIES — The State Board of Health, meeting here Friday, reported that the Salk anti-polio vaccine has been 100 per cent effective in Oregon in cases where two or more shots were administered.

The board said not one case of paralytic polio had been reported among first and second graders receiving two or three shots.

The three cases among the 40,000 who received only one shot were not considered in the figures since one shot does not provide immunity, the board said.

There were 17 cases of polio among children in the same age who did not receive any shots, according to the board.

Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer, said the polio season has apparently reached its peak in the state. He said there were 20 cases in the week ending Sept. 10, compared with 27 for the same period last year.

Some 280,000 shots of vaccine are expected to be available soon for free distribution to persons who cannot afford the vaccine, the board reported.

Physicians may charge for administering the shots but cannot charge for the vaccine under this program.

The board also heard a report that some 655,800 shots may be available for use in Oregon by next February. Should this be the case, the board is expected to consider lifting the ban limiting the vaccine to pregnant women and to children between 5 and 9.

In other action the board approved grants of Hill-Burton Act funds for hospitals at Hood River and Newport.

large and small, who contributed towards the amelioration of conditions and to all those responsible for my release," he said.

In contrast, the Italian prelate, identified as Bishop Alphonsus Ferroni, was so weak he had to be carried across the Schumchun River border.

The prelate said six or seven Americans had boarded his train at Hankow and probably were now in Canton, 80 miles from Hong Kong.

Budd's release came just 24 hours after the arrival of two other Americans — Walter A. Rickett of Seattle, a Fulbright scholar, and the Rev. Harold W. Rigney of Chicago, Roman Catholic educator. Both had been held since 1951.

All three were set free as a result of the Geneva negotiations between representatives of the United States and Red China. The Chinese agreed to release at least 10 of 41 American civilians held.

manager at Pacific Plywood, said his company had been getting about 63 per cent of its needs. He said the plywood was "piling up in the warehouse."

McKee said despite the shortage, he felt the SP in this area was doing the "finest job it can." He said on an overall basis, the mills in this area had been treated fairly in distribution.

All companies contacted in the Roseburg, Winchester and Winston areas agreed that a shortage continues, but there was a wide range of opinion on the degree of the shortage.

Umpqua Plywood Corp. here reported that the last week had "not been tight," but it was reported that the plant was not working at capacity.

Clarence Wheatly, assistant sales manager at Young's Plywood Lumber Co. said his company has been experiencing a shortage, particularly since the middle of the week. He said about 50 per cent of the company's quota of cars was arriving. He said the mill wasn't "hurting yet," but if it keeps up "we will be hurt."

C. R. Ralph McKay, manager of Evans Products at Winchester, reported that his mill was getting roughly 60 per cent of its requirements. But he said the SP had been fair in its distribution. "We have been discriminated against," he said.

The Joelson Lumber Co.'s owner said: "We're just like the rest." Earl Biele, of the Roseburg Lumber Co. and member of the Governor's Emergency Transportation Committee, said he thought the B. B. Baldy closure was an isolated case.

No figures were yet available from the Public Utilities Commission on the percentage of cars provided by the SP. But the weekly report from last week revealed 97 per cent of the cars ordered had been provided along the route from Eugene to Ashland.

Police Handling Of Case Probed

PHILADELPHIA — Police Commissioner Thomas J. Gibbons has ordered his personal staff to look into police handling of the investigation of the abortion death of Mrs. Doris Jean Ostreicher, 22-year-old food chain waitress.

Gibbons said the inquiry was prompted by a statement by Dist. Atty. Samuel Dash that men from the D. A.'s office had found instructions used for abortion purposes when they combed the apartment of Mr. and Mrs. Milton Schwartz last Monday night. Mrs. Ostreicher, an attractive bride of two months died in the apartment the night of Aug. 24.

Two earlier routine police searches failed to uncover the instruments.

Dash said the equipment was found in an unlocked cardboard chest of drawers in a hallway. He emphasized, however, that when the police made their initial search—the night of Mrs. Ostreicher's death—they had no inkling of the nature of the case, and on a subsequent visit they were lacking a search warrant.

Search activities for two elderly uranium prospectors centered Saturday in an old mine where a fresh cave-in was found Friday.

The mine is about a mile from the spot at the foot of Mt. St. Helens where Charles Alizer, 85, Tacoma, and Charles Dickens, 70, San Diego, Calif., were last seen six days ago. Hope for their survival was abandoned previously.

Police said it was not a gang fight and gave this account: Daniel Hendricks, 17, Richard McGuire, 16, and John Comerford, 17, had been sitting on a house step drinking beer. An unidentified fourth boy was with them.

The quartet started to take a walk and "accidentally" bumped into two strange youths coming up the street. The two strangers, about 19 years old, stabbed three of the boys, then fled.

Hendricks died of chest wounds at a hospital. McGuire's condition was described as critical, while Comerford was treated in fair condition.

Judge Sets Aldo Icardi's Perjury Trial Date

WASHINGTON — A Feb. 1 date has been set for the trial of Aldo Icardi of Pittsburgh on perjury charges growing out of a congressional investigation of the World War II death of OSS Maj. William F. Holahan.

Federal Dist. Court Judge Matthew F. McGuire fixed the trial date, although Icardi's lawyer, Edward Reenitt Williams, asked an April date to permit the interviewing of 52 persons abroad. Williams said he needs to talk to these people in preparing the defense.

Six Gridiron Fans Die In Car-Truck Collision

GRAHAM, Tex. — A truck loaded with heavy oil field equipment and a car carrying six persons to a high school football game collided near here last night, killing the gridiron fans.

The dead were Fred Masters, 42; Mrs. Masters, 38; L. L. Brown, 26; and Mrs. Brown, 23; Walton Corral, 14; and Clifton Hodges, 19. All lived at Breckenridge, Tex.

Youth Confesses Shooting Father In Family Tiff

OTTAWA, Ill. — A prosecutor says a teenage high school boy gave this version of events in connection with the fatal shooting of the youth's father:

"I yelled for him to stop beating mom. He slipped on a rug, got up and started beating mom some more. I yelled at him again. Then I went into the kitchen, got a .22 rifle and came back."

"He came toward me and I backed up. I told him to stop. When he didn't, I fired once and he kept coming. I fired the second bullet and he kept coming. I fired the third bullet and he kept coming. I fired a fourth time and he stopped and fell on the floor."

Dead, with all four bullets in the body, was Irwin Augenbaugh, 41-year-old farmer of near Mendota.

The son, William, 16, a high school junior, was freed from custody after he told how he shot his father in their farm home Thursday.

State's Atty. Harland D. Warren said the mother and son told him William was struck by his father after he returned home late from school. When Mrs. Augenbaugh told her husband to stop beating William, he then started beating his wife.

There was no sign of the men at the spot where the raft was discovered, and hopes of finding them alive dimmed further.

Surviving are three sons, Emmet L. of Eureka, Marvin L. of Eureka and Charles A. of Roseburg; brothers and sisters, Jim Ashley of Spokane, Wash., Jessie Lindsay of San Francisco and another sister in Alamogordo; and four grandchildren.

Funeral services are pending in Eureka.

Three More Japanese War Criminals Released

TOKYO — Three of Japan's remaining seven "Class A" war criminals were released on parole Saturday from Tokyo's Sugamo Prison.

They went immediately to the Imperial Palace grounds to bow in the direction of the Emperor—a symbolic "reporting" of their freedom. Then they went to the nearby Yasukuni Shrine, the memorial for Japan's modern war dead, to bow to the spirits of the deceased.

Their release was approved by the Allied powers this week after each had served 10 years of a life sentence.

The three are: Okinori Kaya, 66, former minister in the Japanese government; Teichi Suzuki, 66, former lieutenant general and wartime cabinet minister; and Kingoro Hashimoto, 65, former ultranationalist army colonel.

Elephant Handlers Hope To Take Runaway Vicki

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — A crew of experienced elephant handlers from the Ringling Bros. and Barnum and Bailey Circus was expected here today to take charge of the hunt for the runaway Vicki, a 6-year-old Indian elephant.

Louie Reed, head elephant trainer for the circus, was to fly here from California by way of Sarasota, Fla., Ringling's winter quarters. Reed said yesterday he plans to catch Vicki with kindness.

The hunt for Vicki was called off yesterday after the elephant wandered off from the area where she had stayed since leaving her amusement park home.

CABLE CAR CRASHES

SAN FRANCISCO — One of San Francisco's picturesque cable cars carrying more than half a hundred passengers careened out of control down Nob Hill Friday, turned over and injured 20 persons.

None of the injuries was serious. The car's brakes failed shortly after it started to descend Powell Street.

Placement Law Used To Exclude Boy From School

ANDALUSIA, Ala. — Alabama's new placement law, enacted to preserve segregated schools, was used for the first time yesterday to disqualify a 6-year-old boy from attending a white school.

The Cavinton County Board of Education quoted the recently adopted act to exclude the son of a white farm wife from the grammar school at nearby Gantt, Ala., where the mother tried three times to enroll him.

There was no immediate comment from the chubby, sun-tanned mother, Mrs. Ruth Wheeler of Red Leth, Ala. But while the board's decision was announced, she had said she would appeal to "higher authorities" if necessary to get the boy, Troy Ammons, admitted to the white school.

The child's race was left unmentioned by the board in a prepared statement announcing its decision. Neither was it discussed at a stormy public hearing before the school board Tuesday.

Casey Tibbs Hurt In Bull Riding

PENDLETON — The Pendleton Round-Up rodeo went into its final events Saturday with one of the top cowboys sidelined by an injury.

Casey Tibbs of Fort Pierre, S. D., winner of seven world championships in rodeo events, suffered a foot fracture in the Brahma bull riding event.

He was hurt as the bull charged out of the chute. Tibbs managed to hold on for a time, but did not qualify for the full 40-second ride.

Abe Large of Lander, Wyo., also was hurt Friday. He was thrown by a bucking horse. Both injured men were hospitalized here.

The elimination of Tibbs left Barney Willis of Visalia, Calif., in a favored position. He pinned a steer in 7.2 seconds to establish a Round-Up record Friday morning. His time in the afternoon show, attended by some 10,000 spectators, was 9.1 seconds.

Highlight of Friday's events was the annual Westward Ho! parade. Some 25,000 persons lined the streets to watch the procession in which hundreds of Indians, bands, marching units and more than 1,000 horses took part.

Rock On Columbia River Highway Causes Fatality

THE DALLIES — Tragedy struck a young Portland couple as they sang happily while driving east to the Pendleton Round-Up Thursday evening, their two children asleep in the back seat.

Donald Ray Pullen saw the shadow of a rock plunging down the hillside slope south of the highway at Watchman's Dip 20 miles west of Arlington. Before he could check his speed, which he estimated at 50 to 55 miles an hour, his 1951 model sedan struck the rock of nearly two feet diameter as it flashed out onto the highway.

The car veered up the south bank, rolled three or four times, and came to rest on the highway 150 feet beyond the rock.

Pullen, 28, was dead on arrival at the hospital here.

Pullen and the children, Dennis Keith, 9, and Cordie Jean, 6, were only shaken and bruised. They were released from the hospital after examination, and Pullen told the details of the accident.
