

Telephone Numbering Problem Explained At Meet Observing 10,000th Phone Installation

The complex problem of telephone numbering to keep growth with the rapid expansion of telephone installations, coupled with plans for a nationwide direct dialing system within the next few years, has been explained here by R. B. Bacon, Eugene district commercial manager for the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co.

The occasion was the celebration of the installation of the 10,000th telephone in Roseburg. A reception marking the occasion was arranged at the Umpqua hotel jointly by the telephone company and the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce last weekend.

Education Board Gives Dormitory Plans Approval

PORTLAND — Committees of the State Board of Higher Education Monday approved dormitory building programs for the University of Oregon and Oregon State College with a total cost in excess of two million dollars.

Also approved was consideration of a one million dollar student center building at Portland State.

Preliminary plans for Oregon State call for a five-story dormitory with a one-story dining and kitchen annex at a total cost of \$1,345,000.

At the university, four three-story units and one four-story unit with a one-story dining room at a total cost of \$1,170,000 are planned.

Earl Pallett, secretary, told the board that enrollment of all the state colleges may exceed the earlier estimate of 15,975 students. Higher than expected enrollments were forecast for Portland State and Southern Oregon College of Education.

In other committee action the board approved:

A \$770,000 addition to the university administration building.

Preliminary plans for a \$350,000 architecture and allied arts building at Oregon College of Education.

Purchase of the Gamble property near Oregon State for \$14,200.

Construction of 500 movable seats for the athletic field at Southern Oregon, \$33,000.

Plans for a heating survey at Eastern Oregon College of Education.

Three Missing In Plane Crash; 2 Others Rescued

CONCRETE, Wash. — A Seattle pilot and two Bellevue dentists were missing Tuesday after the night crash of a chartered float plane on Lake Shannon, seven miles north of this eastern Skagit county town.

Two other dentists, one from Shelton and one from Puyallup, survived without serious injury.

The missing dentists were Drs. William J. Mackey and Frank E. Hayden, both 34. The pilot was Vernon O. Wilson, 21.

The two dentists who were rescued after clinging to wreckage for more than two hours were Drs. Harold Nordeng of Shelton and Robert Aylen of Puyallup.

The party had been on a fishing trip to Ross Dam lake, farther in the Cascades. The plane apparently was on the return flight to Seattle when it attempted an after-dark emergency landing on Lake Shannon, where the water is hazardous with stumps and snags.

Russians Grant Sovereignty To East Germany

MOSCOW — The Soviet Union and Communist East Germany signed agreements Tuesday which they announced restore sovereignty to East Germany, but provide that Russian troops must remain stationed there for defense purposes.

These agreements, which also concerned the remaining German war prisoners held by the Russians, were signed in the Grand Kremlin Palace after five days of negotiations between East German Prime Minister Otto Grotewohl and Soviet Premier Bulganin.

They were assisted in their negotiations by delegations including Soviet Communist Party boss Khrushchev and East German party boss Walter Ulbricht, who also is deputy prime minister.

The agreements provide for the liquidation of the Soviet high commissioner's office in East Germany and his replacement by an ambassador.

Hunter Mauled To Death By Huge Grizzly Bear

ANCHORAGE, Alaska — An Alaska hunter was killed by a grizzly bear Monday.

Territorial police said William R. McBride of Anchorage was mauled to death while hunting with a companion in wilderness country some 50 miles north of Eureka on the Big Oshteta River.

Police said McBride and Vic Vukovich of the Goat Creek Lumber Co., on the Palmer Highway, became separated and Vukovich later found the mauled body of his hunting companion. There was no trace of the bear.

Territorial police, the U.S. deputy marshal and a U.S. commissioner from Copper Center were to fly to the area to recover the body Tuesday.

10 MEXICANS KILLED

CELAYA, Mexico — A speeding passenger bus overturned and rolled down a grade near here, killing 10 Mexicans and injuring 26 others.

Bohemia Lumber Enters \$60 Bid For Timber Tract

In an unprecedented flurry of bidding at the Roseburg office of the Forest Service, Douglas fir and pine reached a record high price of \$60.25 per thousand Monday.

The record price was reached after a whopping 313 bids on a 78-acre tract of top quality timber in the Bohemia Ranger District of the Umpqua National Forest. It is located about 30 miles southeast of Cottage Grove.

Winning bidder for the 5,200,000 board feet of timber was Bohemia Lumber Co. of Culp Creek. The company paid \$270,672.50. The tract was appraised at \$157,355. Douglas fir amounted to 4,350,000 board feet appraised at \$34,200. The remaining 850,000 feet of hemlock and other species sold at the appraised price of \$10.10.

The previous record for Umpqua Forest timber was \$56. Previous high for the Bureau of Land Management was \$54.25.

Four other bidders took part in the spirited sale. They were: U. S. Plywood Corp. of Eugene, Vancouver Plywood Co. of Vancouver, Wash., W. A. Woodard Lumber Co. of Cottage Grove and Kimball Bros. Lumber Co. of Dexter.

Another sale was scheduled today.

Board Of Control Policy Asked On Prisoner Transfers

PORTLAND — The state Board of Control was asked by the Oregon Prison Assn. Monday for a statement of policy on transfer of prisoners to out-of-state penitentiaries.

The request was made as a result of the recent transfer of Donald "Punchy" Bailey from the state prison at Salem to Alcatraz.

Bailey, described by Warden Clarence Gladden as a trouble maker, was moved to the California institution under a new law authorizing the Board of Control to board convicts at other prisons.

Directors of the prison association, a private organization, approved a resolution stating that the association wants to be represented at any hearing on this or other such transfers and that it wants to know what the procedures for such transfers are to be.

The Rev. Rene Bozarth, Gresham, president of the association, said such transfers might deprive a prisoner of usual privileges—visits by relatives and parole board reviews—and also that it might cost Oregon taxpayers an excessive amount to maintain convicts at other prisons.

Molotov Holds Private Meet With Sec. Dulles

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — Secretary of State Dulles and Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov held a private meeting Tuesday afternoon before the opening of the U. N. General Assembly.

They met in Dulles' suite at the Waldorf-Astoria.

A spokesman for the U. S. delegation described Molotov's visit as a courtesy call. But observers said it is not customary for U. N. delegates to pay such calls on the secretary of state.

The meeting took place as the United States marshaled support to knock down any fresh Soviet bid to seat Communist China in the United Nations.

The Red China issue, which comes up each year, was expected to get another test as soon as the acting president, J.M.H.A. Lamm of the Netherlands, rapped the gavel to launch the new session.

Chief U. S. Delegate Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. expressed confidence enough votes to keep Red China out of the United Nations.

Lodge prepared a brief resolution to shelve the issue for 1955, the maneuver which worked at the last session.

Diplomats anticipated that Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, here for his first Assembly since 1946, would make the annual bid to unseat the Chinese Nationalists. There was speculation, however, that the Russians might leave the initiative up to some other power sympathetic to the Peiping regime.

An East-West test of strength was also being shaped up in the hot contest between the U.S.-backed Philippines and Soviet-supported Poland for a Security Council seat.

Fariss' Store Entered Again

For the second time in slightly more than a week, a culprit broke into Jack Fariss & Son Marshall Wells store at 185 N. Stephens.

This time, the break and entry netted the burglar a 22 caliber Remington bolt action rifle and a quantity of Winchester .22 ammunition. Sheriff Ira C. Byrd said that so far nothing else has been determined missing.

Entry to the store was gained after the culprit threw a rock through the glass in the front door. The entry was discovered by a News-Review newsboy, Byrd said.

On Sept. 11, sheriff's officers discovered an entry to the same business. Culprits broke into a storeroom, but nothing apparently was taken.

Michigan Demo Dies Suddenly

WASHINGTON — Rep. John D. Dingell, 60-year-old Michigan Democrat, died unexpectedly Monday night at Walter Reed Army Medical Center. His death was the first in the present 84th Congress.

Dingell had represented Detroit's 15th District since he was first elected to Congress in 1932. He had entered Walter Reed Friday night for a checkup on a suspected asthmatic condition.

A son, James, said his father, apparently died of a heart attack. He said the congressman's condition had not been considered serious until he took a sudden turn for the worse some three hours before his death.

Hearing On Canadian Gas Imports Bogs Down

WASHINGTON — A Federal Power Commission hearing into proposals to import Canadian natural gas into the Pacific Northwest bogged down to technicalities Tuesday.

Attorneys concentrated on questioning Robert L. Gollnick, Houston geologist, about tests and other geologic data used by him in estimating the Westcoast Transmission Co. Ltd. has recoverable gas reserves of more than three trillion cubic feet in the Alberta and British Columbia Peace River fields.

Westcoast would be the supplier for the 300 million cubic feet of gas daily which Pacific Northwest Pipeline Corp. seeks authority to import for its Oregon-Washington-Idaho market area.

Nixon Defends Right Of Artist On Caricature

SAN FRANCISCO — Vice President Richard Nixon Monday defended an artist whose caricature of him was removed from an art exhibit here.

In a telegram to art commission president Harold Zellbach, who ordered the caricature removed, Nixon said the artist had a right to express his opinion of a public official's behavior and the public was entitled to see it.

The caricature was removed after one day. The exhibit closed Sunday.

The caricature was painted by Stanford art instructor Victor Arnautoff. It shows Nixon wearing a black mask and carrying in one hand a brush daubed in red and a bucket labeled "smear." In the other hand is a "pumpkin," an apparent reference to the "pumpkin papers" that were prominent in Nixon's investigation of the Alger Hiss case. The caricature was titled "Dick McSmear."

Zellbach had said "elected public officials should not be the subject of a caricature displayed at an art exhibit financed by all the people," when he had the caricature taken down. He said he received complaints from private citizens.

Would-be Robber Who Wanted Rest Gets One

LOS ANGELES — A machineist who allegedly attempted to rob a bank because he wanted \$50,000 for a rest was resting today—in jail.

Police said Frank McMullan 40, walked into the bank, pulled a plunger from his briefcase and told Manager Craig Edwards: "I want \$50,000 cash or I'll blow you and this whole place to hell."

Edwards said he followed McMullan to the vault. A few feet from the door the manager saw him shove and slammed the grill door. It locked automatically.

Police said the briefcase contained only a hoax bomb. They withdrew McMullan from the bank and booked him on suspicion of bank robbery.

"I was tired of being poor," they quoted him, "and I thought if I had \$50,000 I could get some rest."

Head Of State Police Arson Squad Succumbs

ALBANY, Ore. — Capt. Harold W. Howard, 54, head of the Oregon State Police arson squad, died in a hospital here early Tuesday of a heart attack.

He came here from his Portland headquarters Monday night and suffered the attack in his hotel room.

Born in Iowa, he entered police work as a young man in La Grande, where he was a city of fire. Capt. Howard spent several years with the former state traffic squad, and joined the state police force when it was created in 1941.

He leaves a widow, Dorothy, and three grown children.

Compromise Said Reached On Stalemate Session

GENEVA — U. S. Ambassador U. Alexis Johnson and Red Chinese envoy Wang Ping-nan apparently reached a compromise Tuesday on how to continue their stalemate talks.

A communique issued after their 16th meeting indicated they will discuss simultaneously from now on both return of civilians from their respective countries and "other practical matters at issue between the two sides."

Johnson had made clear from the outset of the conference here that he would not discuss the second item of their agreed agenda—"other practical matters"—until the civilian return issue was disposed of.

The communique Tuesday said the two envoys exchanged views on the second item.

Railroads, Trucks Square Off Over Transport Policy

WASHINGTON — The railroads and the trucking industry square off today in the battle over a new national transportation policy.

A House Commerce subcommittee called as its first industry witness J. Carter Fort, vice president and general counsel of the Association of American Railroads. He was expected to endorse with enthusiasm the administration's plan for rewriting transportation law by relaxing government regulation of railroads and other common carriers.

The second witness, James Pinckney, general counsel of the American Trucking Assn., was expected to denounce the proposals. The ATA contends they would give the railroads "a hunting license and ammunition to destroy competitors."

contributions from Sept. 20, 1954. Under the previous SUCC practice, he says, wage credits to workmen would have started on the first day of the quarter (July 1).

Thus, he says, Sept. 20 was used as the starting date for wage credits. He reports he received wage credits of \$1.173 from this date. Under the previous practice, he relates, he would have received \$2,338.03 in wage credits.

This is the first test of the new practice in this area, according to attorney Roll. He reports the local carpenters union called for the appeal hearing after the original decision was handed down by the SUCC.

He said the union's feeling was that the decision carries a particular significance to carpenters because they often engage in comparatively short jobs. Thus, the job may be ended before a workman becomes eligible to draw benefits.

Roll said eligibility under the new practice is determined on a basis of six weeks and one day after the plant comes under the provisions of unemployment compensation law. Roll said the new ruling is an oral order issued by the local commission. He said he can find "no written order."

On hand for the hearing beside McFarland and attorneys Roll and Daniel Dimmick were two members of the local commission and two labor leaders, Volney Martin, Portland, of the State Building Trades Council, and Robert J. Caley of the local carpenters and joiners union.

The appeals referee made no immediate decision on the appeal.

Pensions For Spanish Vets' Widows Foreseen

LONG BEACH, Calif. — Pensions for Spanish War veterans' widows and free living facilities at veterans' hospitals for elderly vets are on the legislative horizon, the 57th encampment of the United Spanish War Veterans has been told.

William J. Otjen, of Enid, Okla., chairman of the legislative committee, said Monday he expects both issues will be considered at the next session of Congress.

The encampment, which runs through Thursday, was the scene of many reunions.

The average age of the 2,000 delegates is 79 and there is little horseplay. But most of the oldsters are pretty chipper.

Miss Kojima represented Japan at the 1952 Miss Universe contest at Long Beach, Calif.—the first Japanese girl to enter that event.

Peron's Whereabouts Reported To Be Mystery

from Buenos Aires would take about five days.

The ambassador said he had informed the military junta, now in power in Argentina, that the former president and his aides were taking refuge aboard the Paraguayan craft.

He said Peron had asked him: "Can you give me asylum?" He said he replied: "There is an international law and also an Argentine-Paraguayan agreement which obliges us to grant you asylum."

He was referring to agreements dealing with political refugees—persons who for one reason or another are fleeing from possible arrest for political offenses. These agreements are frequently invoked in Latin America after revolutions.

A junta of generals took command of the government as a climax to the four-day revolt that overthrew Peron. They quickly announced peace talks with the rebel forces.

The generals also moved rapidly to tighten their control on Buenos Aires after rebel reports that the six-million-member General Federation of Labor (CGT)—the backbone of Peron's popular support—is planning a general strike. With such a strike Argentine labor returned Peron to power in 1945 after a military clique had jailed him.

The rebel radio at Bahia Blanca, 325 miles southwest of Buenos Aires, said the CGT is preparing secretly, under the inspiration of Peron, a general revolutionary strike for dawn to restore the tyrant, betraying all pledges.

The gravel surfacing is to be on the Smith River Road, starting about 13 miles east of Gardiner. Smith River Road is to be surfaced as far as Spencer Creek, then the surfacing will continue up Spencer Creek. Grading is now nearly complete on Spencer Creek Road.
