Nixon Caricature Out Of Festival As Controversial

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A caricature of Vice President Nixon has been removed from the San Francisco Art Festival on grounds that it is controversial. Harold Zellerbach, president of the City Art Commission, said in a statement here that he had ordered a statement of the color lithograph from the exhibit after receiving numerous complaints from private citizens.

The lithograph depicts a likeness of Nixon wearing an eye-mask. In one hand was a bucket labeled "smear" and a paint brush daubed in red. In the other hand was a pumpkin, apparently a reference to the "pumpkin papers" of the Alger Hiss case, which Nixon—as a U. S. senator—investigated. The caricature was made by Victor Arnautoff, a San Francisco muralist who, the Examiner said, had been associated with leftwing groups for years. The Examiner listed the California Labor School and the American-Russian Institute, both identified by the U. S. attorney generally as subversive, as organizations with which he had been associated.

The paper said Arnautoff, a Russian-born immigrant now teaching art at Stanford University, had appeared as spokesman for Bay area "peace" groups which met the touring Soviet farm delegation here. After his arrival from Manchuria in 1925, the Examiner reported, Arnautoff studied under the Mexican Communist muralist, Diego Rivera. He assisted Rivera in painting the murals in the National Palace in Mexico City and at the Palace of Cortez in Cuernavaca.

Zellerbach said: "While I defend the right of artists to uninhibited self-expression, the proper form hardly applies."

appears to be a municipally-sponsored art festival. Elected public officials of whatever party should not be the subject of a caricature displayed at an art exhibit financed by all the people."

Festival director Felix Rosenthal didn't agree. "I, myself, would not have taken it down," he said. "The way I feel is that the artist derives his inspiration from the world he lives in—whether it is a landscape or a still life or political strife."

Some of the greatest works of art known to mankind have, at the time they were made, been provoked by very bitter political struggles."

The artist, Victor Arnautoff, expressed surprise. Arnautoff, an assistant professor of art at Stanford University, said the work was not a caricature but a "political comment on McCarthyism."

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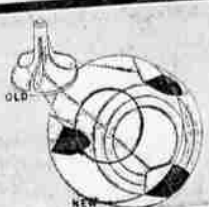
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
