

Third Suit Filed Against Housing On Newton Creek

The third suit in less than a month has been filed in Douglas County Circuit Court against the builders of a housing area along Newton Creek Road north of Roseburg.

Contractor J. R. McAllister seeks \$3,684.72, plus fees and interest, from two Slaven Bros. Construction companies, the partnership of C. E. and D. D. Slaven and Home Builders Investment Corp.

McAllister alleges the money is owed for sewer installation and grading and leveling. All of blocks 6, 7, 8 and 9 of the First Addition to Newton Creek Homesites are involved.

Also named defendants for security in payment of the judgment are 45 couples buying homes in the addition. C. P. Tallon, Joe Fess, Pacific First Federal Savings & Loan Assn., State Unemployment Compensation Commission and Frank H. Rogers, doing business as I-Deal Concrete.

The suit asks that the plaintiff's lien be decreed valid, and for provision for foreclosure on mortgage if necessary to satisfy the judgment.

Earlier, two suits were filed by a Eugene engineer who claims he is owed \$50 per lot, in part of the development, for platting work.

Chandler Named To AP Office On Radio, TV

H. J. (Bud) Chandler, Klamath Falls, supervisor of Southern Oregon radio stations including KRNZ, Roseburg, has been elected a vice president of the Associated Press Radio & Television Assn., general offices of which are located in New York City.

The Associated Press serves over 1,400 radio and TV stations in the United States as well as hundreds of newspapers throughout the world. The AP Radio & Television board of directors was recently authorized and elected to give equal representation to the electronic media.

Chandler will represent AP member stations in the 11 western states. He returned by air earlier this week from the initial board meeting in New York. The directors serve with all expenses paid by the AP.

Chandler reported to The News-Review today that the initial agenda of work before the board is a study of ways and means by which AP service to the radio and TV industry may be expanded.

U. S. And Red Chinese Hold Their 17th Meeting

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP)—U.S. Ambassador U. Alexis Johnson and Wang Ping-nan of Communist China held their 17th meeting Friday.

A communique said they "exchanged information" in the two-hour talks, on the repatriation of civilians and "exchanged views" on future discussion of other issues.

It was understood the latter exchange did not actually go into the substance of the political and economic issues between Washington and Peking.

Boy Scouts Will Sell New House Numbers In City

Boy Scouts in the Roseburg area have been commissioned by the Roseburg Planning Commission to sell new house numbers throughout the city, according to Pete Serafin, commission president.

The Scouts will begin their sales in the southeast quadrant of the city, where city engineers have finished renumbering residences. Deliveries will follow in other sections of the city. The west quadrant now is being renumbered.

Serafin said profits from the sales will be used for camp supplies and other material needs, and all money raised will be used by local troops and posts. In most cases, the soliciting Scouts will be community neighbors of the people to whom they are selling.

Each of the Scouts will be required to wear at least part of his uniform while soliciting. Property owners may obtain identification by asking the Scout his name and troop.

To insure correct delivery, property owners are asked to show the Scouts their new number notices which have been issued by the city.

Numbers will be of standard four-inch size and will be available in bronze and stainless steel. Serafin said they should be placed about five feet above the ground and to the right of the front entrance wherever possible.

Postmaster Clyde W. Carstens has asked that new numbers be put up as soon as possible to facilitate mail delivery.

100 Believed Dead In Barbados Storm

BRIDGETOWN, Barbados (AP)—More than 100 persons are believed to have perished and thousands were left homeless by Hurricane Janet's furious winds Thursday night and Friday.

Inland communications are knocked out and officials said Friday it was impossible accurately to estimate the number of casualties.

A state of emergency has been declared throughout the 166-square-mile British island, with a population of 200,000.

Damage to the island's main source of revenue—sugar cane—was estimated by authorities in the millions.

Electric power was beginning to be restored to that newspapers could publish small evening editions.

Pinay Arrives In U. S. To Talk World Problems

NEW YORK (AP)—French Foreign Minister Antoine Pinay arrived Friday to discuss "the great problems in the world today" with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and British Foreign Minister Harold MacMillan.

The ministers will meet informally next Monday, then hold formal conferences on the two days following.

Pinay said he also would participate in the work of the French delegation to the United Nations but that his visit would be "as short as possible because of pressing problems in France."

Another Frenchman, perhaps better known in this country than Pinay, arrived with him aboard the liner Ile de France—singer Maurice Chevalier.

Chevalier, now 67, plans to open a Broadway show next week, appear on television and make a movie.

Ceilan Rader's Condition 'Fair', Hospital Reports

A man critically injured in a traffic accident Wednesday night, Ceilan Rader, was reported in fair condition at Sacred Heart Hospital in Eugene today.

Rader, 41, received multiple injuries when his pickup went off the road near Tyee about four miles from the Powell Ranch where he had been working.

A neighbor, Dale Collins, found Rader and took him to the home of a sister, Mrs. Gilbert Wandell, Oakland, Rader, a disabled veteran, was then taken to Mercy Hospital, being transferred later to Eugene, Sheriff Ira C. Byrd said.

Tractor Rolls On Man
Another Douglas County man, Donald Billick, about 26, was rushed to Sacred Heart Hospital Thursday after he was injured in a logging accident near Sawyer Rapids, a deputy sheriff reported.

Billick was reported in good condition today. He received compound fractures of the right arm and broken bones in the right foot when a caterpillar tractor rolled over on him.

Working near the BP & S logging operation between Elkton and Scottsburg, Billick had stopped the "cat" and stepped off. The tractor, parked on a steep hillside, rolled over and the blade caught Billick in the shoulder. He was taken to Eugene by Drain ambulance after a drain doctor gave emergency treatment, officers said.

Scout Improving
A 13-year-old Roseburg Boy Scout, in the same hospital since Saturday, was reported "doing fine" today. Bill Gum was taken to the hospital following a traffic mishap at Scottsburg in which five scouts were hurt. The others have been returned to Roseburg, but one of them, Gary Antonen, is still confined to Community Hospital.

Theft Of Diapers Send Searchers On Kidnap Trail

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—A new theft of diapers, plus a report of a heavyset blonde carrying a bundle in a blanket, sent searchers for kidnapped baby Robert Marcus scurrying to another San Jose area Friday.

Mrs. Lois Freeman phoned police she had seen the woman at daybreak Friday morning, wearing a dark coat and carrying a baby-sized bundle.

Mrs. Freeman called her husband, who ran out to stop the woman, but she had disappeared. A hasty check of the laundry hanging in the Freeman back yard showed four diapers and two baby gowns missing.

The neighborhood is about two miles from the area where previous reports of a wandering woman with a baby originated.

Grand Jurors Dismiss Probe Of Negro's Case

TAHOCA, Tex. (AP)—The Lynn County grand jury failed to indict anyone in alleged threats against a 16-year-old Negro student attending Tahoka's formerly all-white school.

The jury said its probe included damage to three new automobiles owned by the school board president, possibly in revenge for the board's allowing Andrew Nance to go to the white school.

Grand jury foreman J. B. Reasonover, in his report, said the jury spent considerable time probing young Nance's report that he had been threatened with personal harm if he continued to attend the school where his white classmates had elected him vice president of the junior class.

Retarded Children Group Is Planning Kindergarten Here

The Roseburg Assn. for Retarded Children is laying plans to start a kindergarten in addition to its elementary age school launched this year.

The announcement was made Thursday by association president Mrs. Florence Johnson. She asked that anyone having a retarded child up to 9 years old contact her at OR 3-5115.

She reported that Dr. Glenn Wright is now giving tests to children of this age group and to those of elementary age from 9 to 13 years of age. Mrs. Johnson said the school would try to provide a recreational program along the lines of a kindergarten and teach them to color and read.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Johnson reported the association is doing well in its fund and equipment collection. She reports that a sorority and an individual gave the association two phonographs, so no more are needed. She said the contributions and dues have pushed the treasury to a solvent \$266.

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closure if the boxcar shortage isn't alleviated.

The Hult mill has a quota of 10 cars a day, Kelsay said. In the past three days, the railroad has delivered 7.

"We'll be practically forced to shut down in the next few days if there isn't a change," he said, referring to the Hult operation.

At Round Prairie, deliveries have been similarly lacking. Kelsay guessed the mill may be forced to close next week if more cars aren't forthcoming. The quota at Round Prairie is five a day, with "one or two" being delivered.

Martin said a special problem has cropped up in his plant. The box company is manufacturing lumber, plywood and wirebound containers for the California truck markets.

About 50 per cent of the car quota is being supplied by the railroad at the present time.

But the cars are being used primarily for the shipment of plywood. The California - bound containers are being held up. Martin said markets in that state are largely dependent on deliveries of containers from Oregon. He hinted that vegetable and fruit packing there may be held up if producers can't obtain crates.

Cars in excess of those needed for plywood are being loaded with the containers. Meanwhile, Martin said, lumber is piling up in the mill's Oakland yards.

Riggs said his firm has had no particular problem, having reduced inventories greatly in a heavy business month in August. Storage space is available.

Martin scored SP's delivery record and charged the Interstate Commerce Commission with "uselessness" in clearing up the car supply situation. "They aren't getting any place any quicker than we are," he asserted.

He predicted the boxcar shortage will be felt throughout the communities of central Douglas County if mills start closing. He advised shippers and plain citizens to "write your congressman, the IGC and the Assn. of American Railroads."
