## Submarine Disturbances Seen West Of Hawaii

punctured the ocean floor and built up the islands of the Pacific.

A Navy hydrographic officer said the activity west of Hawaii "seems to be part of a stepped-up pattern of underwater disturbances around the Pacific."

A Navy pilot flying to Wake Island Thursday reported sighting "a land mass with surf breaking" 35 miles west of Honolulu. Charts list the depth there as 16,000 feet.

Later flights over the area reported that only sulfurous streaks were visible.

"It is only one of several reports we've had over the past few weeks," the hydrographic officer said.

"Most are unusual in that the ships or planes have actually seen the steam rising and the sulphur scum on the water. You have to remember these are only the ones seen or recorded on instruments."

"There might be others in out-of-the-way areas."

## 40 Mexicans Killed In Truck-Train Crash

MEXICO CITY (AP)—A dynamite-loaded truck and a train collided last night near Torreon, touching off a shattering explosion that took the lives of more than 40 persons.

In a chain reaction, the collision and explosion set off the cargo of a second dynamite-carrying truck.

Reports from the scene said more than 40 bodies had been recovered and the death toll might reach 70. More than 150 persons were injured.

Authorities said the two trucks, both heavily loaded with explosives, were racing without lights when the lead vehicle collided with the Torreon-to-Chihuahua train.

Torreon is about 200 miles west of Monterrey in north central Mexico.

The airline announced cancellation of flights without stating the reason and this started rumors of a revolution. A telephone message from La Paz divulged the strike and said that the Bolivian capital is entirely calm.

## Search Intensified For Two Women Missing 6 Days

PORTLAND (AP)—Sheriff's deputies and volunteers intensified their search Saturday for two women missing for six days in the Larch Mountain area of the Columbia River Gorge.

Searchers feared the two Portland women—Mrs. Avera Ferguson, 33, and her companion, Mrs. William Sharkey, 75—could not have survived the ordeal of being lost in the heavily wooded area.

One additional clue was turned up Friday. A wisp of hair which relatives said came from Mrs. Sharkey's head, was found near a scenic lookout at the top of a 350-foot cliff.

The cliff has been sealed by the Hood River Alpines and the area at the bottom searched thoroughly, but no trace of the women has been found.

Sheriff's deputies again searched summer cabins in the area Friday and came upon one belonging to a woman recluse who has reportedly lived in the woods since 1912.

Deputies said the woman, Hazel Arrington, told them she heard cries Sunday night that sounded "like humans imitating coyotes."

The woman's tiny rustic cabin is only a few hundred yards from where the missing women's automobile was found last Wednesday.

A heavy growth of woods screens the cabin from the road.

## Wind Recorder Gives Up Ghost At Bureau Here

It took a long, long time, but the wind recorder finally has given up the ghost. The Weather Bureau recorder, which had been in service here for 10 years, was found to be inoperative.

Mark Lander, resident meteorologist, said Thursday that a "triple register" which marked down the velocity of each mile of wind here was "kaput" recently and a whole new assembly has been installed.

The old register has been shipped to Washington, D. C. for possible salvage of parts. It also measured each minute of sunshine besides doing a third duty of itemizing every .01 of an inch of rain that fell.

Lander said that the recorder dated back to 1930 and possibly was in service here long before that.

The new probably will please the Chamber of Commerce, which boasts the city has the lowest average wind velocity in the United States—the maximum sustained clocking has been claimed at 40 miles per hour.

But Lander said he's seen momentary gusts of 62 mph.

## Pear Industry Boosted By Trucking Company

Douglas County's pear industry as well as that of the entire state is getting a boost this week with the distribution of 20,000 individually boxed pears.

The pears are being distributed to Consolidated Freightways customers over the nation. District Sales Manager Dick Schultz of Roseburg said the purpose is to promote the West Coast fresh fruit industry and to advertise the fact the company hauls more fresh fruit and perishables than any other trucking concern in the nation.

The individually-boxed pears are being distributed this week in Douglas County and elsewhere by sales representatives, terminal managers and personnel.

The event is called "pear-isha-ble" week.

## Ex-Marshfield Athlete Is Injured Critically

CORVALLIS (AP)—Fred Kroush, 20, Coos Bay, an all-state basketball player for Marshfield High School in 1953, was injured critically and four other Oregon State College students were hurt in a highway accident Friday morning.

A car in which they were riding went out of control, skidded and went into a ditch on a Linn County road two miles east of here.

Kroush, who played on the 1954 OSC frosh team, suffered a serious head injury. The other four were the driver, Donald B. Watson, 22; Phillip H. Miller, 20; Dean K. Dibblee, 19, all Portland; and James M. O'Brien, Albany.

Dibblee was released from a hospital after treatment. The rest remained there.

## Woman Has Heart Attack In Child Rescue Attempt

MYRTLE POINT (AP)—Mrs. Jesse Lenora Lea, 33, suffered a fatal heart attack Thursday while trying to rescue her granddaughter who had fallen into a stream.

The child, Jeannie, 2, had fallen through the wires of a swinging bridge into Elk Creek. Mrs. Lea ran to the bank and jumped in trying to rescue the girl. She suffered a heart seizure.

Vinay White, a logger, heard the child's mother call for help and rescued the child.

## Roseburg Man Succumbs At 73

Henry Andrew Sielert, 73, well-known Roseburg and former Riddle resident, died at a local hospital Friday following a prolonged illness.

Sielert was born at Salina, Kan., July 17, 1882, and came to Douglas County about 1910. He lived at Days Creek and later at Riddle, where he made his home for 25 years before coming to Roseburg in 1944.

Sielert was a member of the first Christian Church of Roseburg, Woodmen of the World and Carpenters and Joiners Local 1961, AFL.

Surviving are his wife of Roseburg, two children, Henry F. and Mrs. Stace (Ruth) Laurance, both of Roseburg; three brothers, Edward of Salina, Fred of Modesto, Calif., and Lee of Los Angeles, Calif.; and two grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of Long & Orr Mortuary Monday at 2 p.m. with the Rev. Newell Morgan of the First Christian Church officiating. Concluding services and interment will follow in the Riddle Cemetery.

## Musician Shot, Girl Badly Beaten By Gunman Friday

DENVER (AP)—A symphony orchestra musician was shot to death and his girl companion was shot and beaten by a gunman early Friday.

The body of Hubert Hahn, 27, was found in a gully near the Rocky Mountain Arsenal, just north of Denver, after a five-hour search by officers.

Joyce Danielson, 23, was in St. Luke's Hospital with a bullet wound in the shoulder and lacerations of the head and face. She is a laboratory technician at the hospital.

Hahn was a trombonist in the Denver Symphony Orchestra and formerly played with the Kansas City Symphony. He played Thursday night at a concert.

About 2 a.m. Friday members of a Rock Island Railroad switching crew saw a woman running along the tracks, screaming for help. It was Miss Danielson.

## American Jet Trainer Missing Over Germany

WIESBADEN, Germany (AP)—The U.S. Air force said Saturday a jet trainer with two American airmen aboard is missing and may have been forced down in Communist East Germany because of fuel shortage.

European headquarters said a T-33 jet trainer with two airmen aboard became lost Friday after taking off on a local flight from the Air Force base here.

The East German border is only a few minutes away by jet. Headquarters officials said a request for investigation of the incident has been forwarded to the Berlin air safety center.

The names of the men were withheld pending an investigation.

## Taylor Says Russ Recoiling From Nuclear War

AIKEN, S. C. (AP)—Gen. Maxwell Taylor said Saturday that the fact no one could really win an atomic war "must incline Communist leaders to recoil from the deliberate decision to initiate such an international catastrophe as nuclear World War III."

The Army chief of staff posed the possibility of general, atomic war as one of two forms war could take if it breaks out again. The other he foresaw as a local, "nibbling" war against the Free World.

But, said Taylor, "whether in large war or in small war, your army must be ready to dispatch sizable forces immediately, either to reinforce our troops under attack overseas or to stamp out brush fires in areas where we have no forces at present."

In an address prepared for the cotton festival here, Taylor said the Army is being made "air-transportable"—capable of carrying its men and all essential weapons and equipment by air to react swiftly in any place an enemy chooses to strike. He added:

"Not only does the Army intend to become air-transportable to do its job but we expect to become an atomic army, equipped with weapons of great power, and transportable by air. The day has passed when the atomic weapon is synonymous with a bomb delivered by an airplane."

"We now have weapons which can be fired by artillery pieces and by rockets easily transportable by army troops. Thus the Army will carry to the battlefield of the future destructive power vastly in excess of anything that has ever been imagined in the past."

## Spies' Scandal May Cause Rise Of McCarthyism

LONDON (AP)—A member of Parliament expressed fear Saturday the "foreign office scandal" of Britain's "runaway spies" might lead to a "resurgence of McCarthyism in America."

The British press lashed out at an official government report on the escape of Donald Maclean and Guy Burgess behind the Iron Curtain May 25, 1951. It demanded a full scale investigation to find the man who tipped them off.

Donald Wade, a liberal member of Parliament, told a party political meeting:

"I hope it will not encourage a resurgence of McCarthyism in America. I hope it will not make cooperation between this country and America more difficult."

Wade, one of the four liberals in the House of Commons who generally support the conservative government's foreign policy, pleaded against making the case a party political issue.

The white paper released Friday was the first government statement on the four-year-old case. It added little to disclosures made last week.

## British White Paper Discloses Story Of Flight

LONDON (AP)—Britain disclosed Friday that diplomat Donald Maclean fled behind the Iron Curtain the day the government ordered him questioned about passing secrets to Russia.

It suggested that Maclean was warned by an unknown person that he was under suspicion.

A government white paper issued Friday said the Foreign Office first knew in 1949 that some of its secrets had been leaked to Russia several years earlier.

By mid-April of 1951 a two-year probe had narrowed the field of suspicion to two or three persons. Within another fortnight, by May, 1951, Maclean, head of the American department of the Foreign Office, had come to be regarded as the main suspect, the white paper went on.

Maclean fled behind the Iron Curtain along with a second British Foreign Office man, Guy Burgess, on May 25, 1951. The Foreign Office itself first learned of their disappearance the following Monday, three days later.

Tetanus is an infectious disease characterized by recurring attacks of violent and persistent muscular spasms.

The exciting cause is the tetanus bacillus, an organism found in dust and dirt, compost heaps, and infected soil. This organism enters the body through some break in the outside protective layer of the skin, but does not pass through the blood stream. It remains at the site of the wound. The symptoms seem to be produced by the distribution through the blood stream by a toxin produced by the bacillus in its original location. Certain locations favor the development of the infecting organism. It is more common in hot climates and hot seasons, in earth mold where putrefaction is taking place, and around stables where horses are kept.

The organism enters through a contused or puncture wound and occasionally at the site of a burn. The period of incubation is the time elapsing between the injury and the appearance of the first nervous symptoms. This may be anything from one day to three weeks. The usual time is from five to ten days. The onset of the attack is quite sudden. It may begin with a chill but the usual symp-

tom noticed first is a slight stiffening of the muscles of the jaw, neck and throat. There is usually some difficulty in swallowing and the stiffness increases and passes down the spinal muscles to the legs. With the spine and legs both becoming rigid. The symptoms may prove comparatively mild or may be very severe depending on the severity of the infection. When the spasms involve the muscles of the jaw, they produce the condition known as "lock-jaw."

The convulsions are accompanied by severe pain. When the chest muscles become stiffened, there is distress in breathing. The nerves and muscles are so sensitive to irritation that the slightest jar, the noise of closing a door or other slight stimulus will bring on an other spasm.

The spasms are not continuous but may be separated by a considerable interval of time, during which the victim may appear quite normal. During sleep the spasms are usually absent.

Often time the infection is more localized and is characterized by rigidity and spasm present only in the muscles around the local wound. Chronic forms of tetanus are occasionally encountered which may persist for months or years. (Pd. Adv.)

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
