### Morse Says FPC Shut Door On Public Interest

PORTLAND — Sen. Morse (D-Ore.) says the Federal Power Commission has "slammed the door" on the public interest in its decision Thursday denying a rehearing of the Hells Canyon case. "The high federal dam at Hells Canyon is indispensable to full development of the resources of the Columbia River Basin," Morse said in a statement. "This unconscionable decision by a stacked commission cannot and will not go unchallenged."

Morse said that "no effort that I can make will be spared to win Hells Canyon for the people of Oregon and the nation."

### Divorces Nearly Equal Marriages In September

The number of divorces granted may nearly match the number of marriage licenses issued.

As of Thursday morning, there were 39 divorce decrees granted in September, and 46 marriage licenses had been issued, according to records in the county clerk's office.

In August, there were 52 marriage licenses and 36 divorces. In July, there was a high number of marriages (65) compared to divorces (29).

## Permanent WCA Certificate Recommended For Roseburg Under Expansion Of Line

WASHINGTON — Granting permanent authority to West Coast Airlines to serve 26 Pacific Northwest cities was recommended to the Civil Aeronautics Board Thursday by CAB examiner Edward T. Stodola.

The CAB had proposed a 25-point route in Washington, Idaho and Oregon, but Stodola recommended adding Pendleton, Ore., on a permanent basis. The board's original order called for a 3-year temporary certification for Pendleton.

Stodola also recommended that West Coast continue serving Olympia, Wash., on its Route 2 between Seattle and Portland, and Route 3, between Olympia and Aberdeen-Hoquiam. The CAB had proposed eliminating Olympia from Route 3 because of a temporary suspension of West Coast service on the

ASTORIA — A couple who Dist. Atty. T. E. Brownhill said kept a 5-year-old girl caged while they went out drinking were under arrest here Thursday.

Two smaller children were seriously neglected, the district attorney said.

Held in jail under \$2,000 bail were Mr. and Mrs. Fred Rabell Jr. on a charge of contributing to the dependency of minors. They were arrested Wednesday night at an Astoria bar.

The children are Mrs. Rabell's by a previous marriage. Their father, James H. Crabtree, lived only a block from the house where the children were found. He told police he knew of the conditions.

Brownhill said neighbors called police, complaining that the children were left alone most of the time. In an upstairs room they found Cheryl Ann, 5, crouched inside a cage two feet high made of rough boards. She was unable to stand or lie down, they said. Bare coil springs served as the bottom of the cage.

Police said Rodney Lee, 2, was inside a baby's crib which was covered with filth. Candace Rae, 7 months old, was on a davenport surrounded by chairs so she wouldn't fall off.

The children were reported in good condition Thursday at a local hospital.
