**Portland Milk Prices Boosted 1/2 to 2 Cents**

**PORTLAND** — Milk prices in Portland will be higher beginning Saturday. The boost in cream prices will be even sharper.

Milk producers notified distributors this week that an increase is necessary to maintain an adequate Grade A supply, and dairies moved to raise prices to the consumer.

First to announce a revised schedule was Damascus-Carnation Milk Co., which will raise milk prices 1/2 to 2 cents a quart and cream 4 to 5 cents a half-pint.

This will jump single quart home delivery from 21 and 21 1/2 cents a quart to 23. Multiple home deliveries under the new schedule, however, will keep the quart price at 21 cents. It also gives stores a long-sought 2-cent differential, the store price remaining at 21.

Other dairies are expected to follow Damascus' lead.

Dream prices, reduced up to 9 cents a pint last year by the new defunct state milk control board, will go up considerably. Whipping cream will advance from the present 47 cents to 55 cents in stores for a half-pint.

The retail price increases were ordered after producer groups said their prices would go up 35 to 40 cents a hundredweight on Oct. 1.

New prices to farmers will be 70 cents a pound butterfat plus \$2.79 a hundredweight of milk, compared with the present schedule of 66 cents and \$2.69. The new prices total \$5.59 a hundredweight for 4 per cent milk, compared to \$5.24 at present.

**Wisconsin Democrat Invited To California To Check On Program Of Feeding Ducks**

**WASHINGTON** — Rep. Younger (R-Calif) Friday urged Rep. Reuss (D-Wis) to go to California "in the interests of accuracy" for first hand information about that state's duck feeding program.

The California program issued the invitation as a result of a statement made by Reuss in Wisconsin criticizing California's waterfowl feeding regulations.

Reuss made public on Monday what he called a suppressed report by a United States Fish & Wildlife Service biologist on waterfowl basting in California. Reuss declared in the light of the report, "Interior Secretary McKay and Service Director John Farley ought to have the good taste to resign."

The report by federal Biologist Clinton H. Lottier states among its conclusion and recommendations that the present California state waterfowl feeding regulation is "used as a disguised attempt to circumvent federal regulations."

"This week Congressman Henry Reuss of Wisconsin had some angry words to say about the California program to protect farmers in my state from losing millions of dollars through crop depletions caused by hungry ducks," Younger said.

"This blast... is only the latest in a series of attacks by me on the Fish and Wildlife Service of the Department of the Interior under its fine director John L. Farley... I want to give Mr. Reuss an opportunity to demonstrate to his critics that this charge is false."

Washington AP members and editor and publisher of the Walla Walla Union Bulletin, told the 50 Duck Hunters Assn. of California also had invited Reuss to visit and see for himself.

"Mr. Reuss has not accepted any of these invitations and I feel he should in the interests of accuracy," Younger said.

**Teacher Contracted To Teach Adult Education Course**

It will include review of grammar, sentence structure, punctuation and spelling. The final form the course will take will be determined at the organizational meeting, she said.

The instructor is a graduate of the College of Emporia, Kan. She received her master's degree from the University of Colorado.

**Heavy Artillery Duel Thunders Off China Coast**

**TAIPEI, Formosa** — The heaviest artillery duel in months thundered Friday between Red Army and Nationalists on their Quemoy outposts across the strait from Formosa.

The Defense Ministry said Chinese Red artillery on Amoy fired 717 shells at Quemoy, Little Quemoy and the adjacent islet of Chu-yu.

The ministry claimed the Communist artillery was silenced by heavy Nationalist counterfire.

The official Central News Agency said Nationalist jets flew over Quemoy during the cannonading, presumably to cheer the garrison.

**Juvenile Gang Attacks Traced**

**SEATTLE** — One of Seattle's first outbreaks of organized juvenile gang attacks has been traced to a North End high school group and their activities have been characterized by "viciousness," Police Chief H. J. Lawrence said Friday.

A half dozen attacks on other youngsters have been investigated. Seven youths, some of them suspected leaders of the group, have been detained at the King County Youth Service Center the past three weeks.

Members of the gang, calling themselves the "Dukes," wear two-tone jackets, police said. They created a recent popular motion picture with giving the group the "blue prints" for their activities.

A mass gang fight at a neighboring high school was thwarted the night of Sept. 16. That same night, a student threatened a teacher with a pistol when he was asked to leave a school party because he had been drinking. The youth was taken into custody later.

**Betty Benedicto Confesses Act**

**SAN FRANCISCO** — Betty Jean Benedicto sobbingly confessed the Marcus baby kidnaping in Municipal Court Friday, said she didn't want any trial and later collapsed on the corridor floor outside the courtroom.

The plea of guilty was not official, however, Judge Alvin E. Weinberger ordered a continuance for a week and appointed attorney Edward T. Mancuso to represent the tearful 27-year-old woman.

She snatched two-day-old Robert Marcus from his hospital crib on Sept. 19 and remorsefully surrendered him 10 days later at a church in Stockton.

She said she stole the baby because she could not have one of her own but had deluded her Filipino husband into believing she was pregnant.

"I did it, and I want to plead guilty," she told the judge while in court answering to a kidnap complaint.

**Missing Boys Return, Pleased To Be Home**

**PORTLAND** — Two boys, 4 1/2 and 11 years old who were missing overnight, were back home safely Friday and pleased to be there.

Clifford Collins, 11, and Tommy Eggleston, 4 1/2, were found by Oak Grove Fire Chief C. C. Puderbaugh, 15 miles from home. They set out to hitchhike to Oregon City Wednesday afternoon, pulling a red wagon. They slept that night in the basement of an abandoned apartment house. Tired, hungry and grumpy, they agreed they were happy that Puderbaugh had found them.

**Farm Products Prices Increase, Reports Reveal**

**WASHINGTON** — The Agriculture Department reported Friday that prices of farm products increased 1 per cent between mid-August and mid-September.

This increase halted a four-month decline in prices that has brought sharp criticism of administration farm programs from some Democrats.

The department said higher prices received by farmers for eggs, milk, cotton and commercial vegetables were primarily responsible for the increase during the past month.

Lower prices for corn, oilseeds, chickens and meat animals partially offset increases in the other prices.

Prices received in mid-September were about 4.5 per cent below those of a year ago and about 21.4 per cent below the record high set in February, 1951.

Prices paid by farmers for goods and services declined 1.3 of 1 per cent. This left the prices paid at 1/4 of 1 per cent below those of a year ago and 4 per cent below the record high set in May, 1952.

The general level of prices received by farmers in mid-September averaged 85 per cent of parity compared with 88 per cent a month earlier, an 88 per cent a year ago and the record high of 123 per cent set in October, 1946.

**Washington Will Spend Big Sum On New Highway**

**BELLINGHAM** — Washington will spend 147 million dollars for highway construction during the present biennium, State Highways Director W. A. Bugge announced Friday.

"This is by far the largest sum ever appropriated by a Washington Legislature for state highways," the director said in a speech prepared for delivery at the 57th annual convention of the Washington State Good Roads Assn.

Bugge said about 148 million dollars was spent on Washington highways during the last four years.

The director said four new toll bridges are in the design stage. They are the proposed second Lake Washington bridge; a new interstate bridge across the Columbia River between Vancouver and Portland; the Warren Avenue Bridge in Bremerton; and the Oak Ash bridge in Spokane.

He said construction on the Vancouver bridge will begin early next year.
