Huskies Stop Oregon, 19-7

Washington Controls Ball In League Win

PORTLAND — The University of Washington Huskies took their third straight Pacific Coast Conference football victory Saturday night, defeating the Oregon Ducks, 19-7, before 29,113 paid witnesses.

And until this Saturday afternoon, at least the long underdog Huskies are sniffing the rarified ozone of first place in PCC football standings. Washington is tied at the top with Southern California, each holding two conference victories and no losses.

Of course, the experts say the Huskies will revert to 1954 form when they tangle with the Trojans this Saturday in Seattle.

The Huskies, borrowing a tactic from basketball, practiced ball control against Oregon. Washington ran off 56 plays while Oregon originated only 37.

Score in Second Period
After a scoreless first period, the Huskies counted in the second quarter. They went 28 yards in six plays, with halfback Jim Jones leading the final three yards. Dean Derby of Walla Walla missed the kick.

Both teams scored in the third quarter. Washington took 19 plays in traveling 77 yards. The last one was made by Credell (Incredible) Green. Derby dubbed the kick.

Oregon came back to score on a 13 yard pass from Jack Crabtree to George Slender. It was a desperation fourth down flip after the more sizeable Husky linemen had been blunting the Oregon ground game.

Oregon Kicks Point
Jack Morris kicked the point for Oregon, and it meant Washington must get another touchdown to stay safely in front, because of the paucity of PAT's after the first two six-pointers.

In the last period, Washington recovered an Oregon fumble 24 yards out. On the seventh play thereafter, Green lugged the ball to pay dirt from two yards out. This time, Derby kicked the point successfully.

Whitman and College of Idaho posted their first Northwest Conference football victories of the season Saturday. Whitman edging Pacific 13-12 and College of Idaho downing Linfield 19-7.

A placekick by Roger Strawick after a touchdown provided what proved to be the winning Whitman margin in the game at Walla Walla.

Fullback Ken Johnson blocked a Pacific punt in the first quarter and Dean Lodmell recovered on the Pacific two Johnson scored two plays later from one yard out and Strawick converted. George Sullivan clinaxed a fourth-quarter Whitman drive with a five-yard scoring plunge, after Pacific had taken a 12-7 lead.

Fumbles Hurt Whits
Two Whitman fumbles resulted in a pair of Pacific touchdowns in the second quarter. Danny French and Duane Baker did the scoring on short plunges.

The game was the first Northwest Conference contest of the season for the two teams.

College of Idaho, which lost last week to Lewis and Clark, had little trouble downing Linfield in a game at Caldwell.

Ed Collins opened the scoring in the third quarter with a nine-yard drive through the left side of the Linfield line. In the fourth quarter Collins ran 50 yards to put the ball on the Linfield five and Ed Lodge went the rest of the way. Collins scored the final touchdown for the winners with a 33-yard charge.

Pass Good For TD
Linfield's lone touchdown came in the fourth quarter on a pass from quarterback Ron Parish to Dwight Umbarger.

Willamette was beaten 33-7 by Fresno State in a non-league game at Fresno. Keith Harris scored the losers' only touchdown.

Lewis and Clark had touchdowns in every quarter as it rolled over Central Washington College of Education in Saturday's other non-conference game at Portland.

Scoring was: Mel Gillett, Gene Flippin, Earl Engbreton, Bill Stempel and Jim Clayborn.

Linfield plays Lewis and Clark and Willamette meets Whitman in next Saturday's conference games. Pacific faces Pacific Lutheran and College of Idaho plays Notre Dame of Canada in non-league games.

WASHINGTON — Sen. Aiken (R-Vt.) said here that if President Eisenhower decides to run for a second term he can win re-election by a campaign "limited to television and radio and similar less strenuous activities."

"We have elected presidents who were in poorer physical condition than he is now," Aiken said in an interview after reading reports of Eisenhower's continued recovery from a heart attack.

PHILADELPHIA — Baseball's beloved Connie Mack, in "remarkably good condition" at 92, is reported headed for a swift recovery after suffering a fractured hip at his home over the weekend.

The veteran manager, who led his Philadelphia Athletics to five World Series championships, fractured his right hip while getting out of bed from his afternoon nap on Saturday.

His physician, Dr. Marion L. Gopadre, expressed satisfaction with the old gentleman's condition Sunday and, barring complications, forecast a "speedy recovery," adding that Mack, who will be 93 Dec. 23, was in "remarkably good physical condition."



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
