Trial Of Quant At Albany Ends In 'Hung Jury'

The trial of a Roseburg man, Joseph L. Quant, at Albany resulted in a "hung jury" early today. Circuit Judge Pro Tem Walter H. Evans of Portland dismissed the jury deliberating the case at 12:40 a.m. after jurors became hopelessly deadlocked.

The case, in which Quant, 36, is charged with negligent homicide, went to the jury 7 hours and 40 minutes before the judge stepped in.

Linn County Dist. Atty. Courtney Jones told the Albany Democrat-Herald he would arrange for a new trial as soon as possible. Quant is still free on \$1,000 bail bond.

The trial follows a charge filed near Halsey July 23 in which Lemuel E. Blitner, 37, Roseburg, was killed.

The state charged that Quant was driving the car and that he was negligent through speeding, not keeping a proper lookout and not keeping the car under control.

Defense attorney Mark Weatherford contended that Blitner, not Quant, was driving the car when it crashed into the rear of a truck.

Wednesday, Mrs. Quant also took the stand to testify on her husband's behalf. She pointed out that he is diabetic.

ACQUITTED OF KIDNAPING

DETROIT (AP) — A recorder's Court jury has acquitted Murray Sisk, 26, of kidnapping his former girl friend.

Sisk was accused of abducting Miss June Dallen, 21, at gun point and taking her on a wild car ride to Ohio last May 19 in an attempt to persuade her to marry him.

Sisk claimed she went willingly. Police said Sisk still faces a charge of felonious assault.

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United Air Lines Airplane Crashes

61 Passengers, Crew Of Three Said Aboard

DENVER (AP) — A United Air Lines DC4 with 61 passengers and a crew of three vanished Thursday between Denver and Salt Lake City. Several hours later search planes sighted wreckage of an aircraft at the base of 11,162-foot Elk Mountain in Wyoming.

Lowry Air Force Base, which reported sighting the wreckage, said it could not be determined immediately if this was the missing UAL air coach. There appeared to be little doubt, however, that the four-engine DC4 had crashed at that spot on the northward flight.

Elk Mountain is 180 miles north of Denver, and is the site of several other airliner crashes in past years.

The missing DC4 left Denver at 8:33 a.m. en route to San Francisco by way of Salt Lake City.

Company officials said the air coach failed to make a radio report over Rock Springs, Wyo., a regular check point.

Flight 408 originated in New York Wednesday night and had made regular stops at Philadelphia, Detroit, Chicago and Omaha en route to Denver.

Wyoming Aeronautics Director George Nelson said in Cheyenne the aircraft had been reported at 8,000 feet over northern Colorado and southern Wyoming early Thursday.

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Judge Grants Man Probation On Polygamy Charge; Check Passer Gets Year In Prison

Three men received two-year probationary sentences and one man was sent to the state penitentiary on a one-year sentence Wednesday afternoon when they appeared before Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly.

One of those granted probation was Richard Lloyd Teel, 24, a preacher's son who was charged with polygamy. He waived his right to a grand jury hearing and pleaded guilty to an information filed by Dist. Atty. Robert M. Stults.

Teel was accused of marrying while he was still legally married to Stella Teel, the complainant. The defendant admitted "I did wrong," he said he had tried to divorce his wife and she would not give him a divorce because of her religion. He got a legal separation, but no divorce.

After a warrant was issued for his arrest, he turned himself in to a deputy U.S. marshal at Medford, then was returned here.

As a condition of probation, Judge Wimberly warned Teel he must support his family. Teel has three children, the youngest about 5 months old. It was brought out that Jackson County had had trouble with Teel in regard to support payments.

Glenn Man Imprisoned

Frank G. Horrace, 33, also known as Lee Robinson, who has been living a glitzy about a year, was sent to Salem by the judge. Horrace pleaded guilty to obtaining money under false pretenses.

He was accused of giving Roen's Office Supply, formerly Ken's Office Supply, a \$30 worthless check as a down payment on a typewriter. Judge Wimberly said he might have granted Horrace probation if Horrace had not been imprisoned once before on a similar count.

When it was brought out that Horrace had served more than three years on a 15-year sentence in Washington, Judge Wimberly asked the defendant why the sentence was that long. Horrace replied that it was set by the parole board and probation board.

This brought a comment from Judge Wimberly that Washington's law allows such a thing is "no good" — that it gives the parole board judicial powers, which they

Two Men Sent To Hospital Here With Injuries

Accidents sent a Roseburg resident, Dwight Coder, and a Salem man, Donald Rae, to Douglas County Hospital Wednesday.

Coder, 25, was injured around noon when he worked in the cutup plant of the Hub Lumber Co., Garden Valley Road. He suffered a partially amputated left hand, hospital personnel reported. His condition was described as "fine."

Details concerning the mishap were scant.

The Salem man was tossed from the tractor he was driving near the south scales on Highway 235 (old Highway 99). State police said he was traveling north on the vehicle and that an attached roller sweeper was creating dust.

A northbound car driven by Wilford Kincaid, 24, Rt. 1, Sutherlin, struck the right rear wheel of the tractor. The impact tossed Rae to the pavement. Hospital attendants said he suffered head injuries but was in "fine" condition. Officers issued no citations. The accident occurred about 1:30 p.m.

Yoncalla Council Passes New Curfew Ordinance

The Yoncalla City Council this week passed a much-discussed curfew ordinance, reports correspondent Mrs. George Edes.

The ordinance prohibits minors under 18 from being on the streets or in public places during certain hours at night unless they are accompanied by parent or guardian. Any parent or guardian permitting a child or ward to violate the ordinance can be fined up to \$10.

Another ordinance, relative to adults leaving children under 12 unattended in vehicles, provides for a minimum fine of \$25, Mrs. Edes reports.

Mrs. June Bowman, city recorder, has resigned, and Mrs. Verle Rodgers has been hired to replace her. Mrs. Bowman said she resigned because of the difficulty in judging some court cases.

Fire Destroys Residence On Road To Riddle

An early morning fire destroyed the Sidney Hemphill residence, situated 2 1/2 miles west of Canyonville on the Riddle Road.

The flames consumed the wooden structure and its contents. Hemphill, his wife Wilma and two small children made their way from the house without injury.

Hemphill told News-Review correspondent Mrs. Virginia Proctor he carried no insurance. He estimated the loss at \$15,000.

Hemphill discovered the flames around 5 a.m. when he arose to dress for work. He told Mrs. Proctor he glanced into the front of the house and thought he must have left the lights turned on. Seconds later he knew the truth. He was able to place a call to the Canyonville Volunteer Fire Dept. before the phone line burned.

In scanty attire he and his wife rushed the youngsters from the blazing structure. When Canyonville firemen arrived, the house was a ball of fire. They and Riddle Fire Dept. members who came to the scene shortly after were unable to save anything.

Low Bid Entered For Surfacing Smith River Road

A low bid of \$56,516 for surfacing a section of Smith River and Spencer Creek roads in northwestern Douglas County was submitted to the Bureau of Public Roads by the Bureau of Public Roads.

Entering the bid was Central Heating Co. of Eugene. There were nine other bids, ranging up to \$87,058.

The work is part of the Bureau of Land Management program to build an access road system in the area so that salvage timber can be removed as speedily as possible.

The section to be surfaced begins 13 miles east of Gardiner on Smith River Road. The work covers a stretch about 10 1/2 miles in length.

Douglas County Judge Carl C. Hill, who is president of Assn. of O&C Counties, and Commissioner Elmer Metzger, were in Portland for the bid opening and to attend to other business affecting the county.

Indonesians Ask Ouster Of Caretaker Government

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — A mounting nationalist party lead in returns from Indonesia's first parliamentary elections brought new demands today for the ouster of Prime Minister Burhanuddin Harahap's caretaker government.

Harahap's Moslem Masjumi party was running fourth, behind the Moslem Orthodox Radicals and the Communists as well as the Nationalists. The Prime Minister, whose friendliness to the West contrasts with Nationalist coolness, has said he will step down only after the new Parliament is organized early next year.

However, leaders of several parties represented in the temporary government suggested that their ministers resign to provoke a Cabinet crisis.

New Cabinet Sworn In To Succeed Papagos

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — The cabinet of Constantine Karamanlis unexpectedly asked to form a new government to succeed that of the late Field Marshal Alexander Papagos—was sworn in Thursday.

Opinions are divided as to whether the new premier will be able to win a vote of confidence when he appears before Parliament next week.

Karl Paul picked Maramanis to take over the government reins. The nation, meanwhile, mourned the passing of Papagos, who died Tuesday night after a prolonged gastric ailment, contracted in a Nazi concentration camp. Sorrowful Greeks filed through Athens Cathedral to pay their last respects.

Projected Space Satellite Contract Let To Air Force

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Defense Department announced Thursday that "Project Vanguard"—the creation of an artificial space satellite—is now underway with the award of two contracts.

The prime contract, for a major part of the project, "the rocket launching vehicle, has been awarded to Glenn L. Martin Co., Baltimore aircraft firm.

The General Electric Co. "will supply the rocket motor which will be used in the first stage of the launching vehicle and other important portions" of the system, the department said.

The contracts are being handled by the Navy Department, the agency chosen to manage the military part of the scientific research project. Army and Air Force facilities also will be used, the announcement added.

Although the exact shape and size of the satellite itself has not been decided, the announcement said, it will be small but large enough to contain a number of instruments and to be "tracked" from the ground by optical and radio devices.

First official reports when the project was announced last July by the White House, described the probable size of the satellite as about that of a basketball.
