SEOUL (AP)—An Oregon rancher leaves for home next week with eight American-Korean orphans he will adopt and four others for friends.

The 12 range from a girl of 10 months to a sturdy little boy of 3 years. All are children of American servicemen and Korean mothers.

Harry Holt, 50, of Creswell, Ore., said he and his wife will take four boys and four girls into his home.

Kiwanis Observes 200th Birthday Of John Marshall

The 200th birthday anniversary of John Marshall, fourth chief justice of the U.S. Supreme Court, was observed in a program by the Roseburg Kiwanis Club Tuesday noon in the Hotel Umpqua.

George Neuner, Roseburg attorney, had charge of the program. He spoke briefly on the life of the man, who was on the bench for 34 years, from 1801 until his death in 1835. Neuner cited several of Marshall's more important decisions and called the early jurist "the great expounder of the Constitution."

A film describing events leading up to one vital opinion was shown. That was in the case of Marbury vs. Madison (1803) which established the power of the court to rule Congress.

Foreign-Born Candidate Wins As Cleveland Mayor

CLEVELAND (AP)—Anthony J. Celebrezze, the first foreign-born mayor ever elected in Cleveland, crushed both the Democratic and Republican organization candidates Tuesday to win unprecedented re-election in the primary.

The 45-year-old Italian immigrant, an independent Democrat, polled nearly 50 per cent of the vote in a five-man race, clinching a second two-year term in the \$25,000-a-year post.

Accompanying Holt and the children will be Miss Kathleen Cowan of Belfast, Ireland, the nurse who cared for the 12 at the Presbyterian Mission at Seoul while Holt was handling the necessary paperwork.

Holt and his party will leave Tuesday for Tokyo and leave Tokyo the same day for Portland, via Honolulu, aboard Pan American flight 854, due at Portland at 6 a.m. Oct. 12.

Holt told newsmen his wife and children are "very happy and most enthusiastic" about the mass adoption.

He said the children will "get all the love and care it is possible to give them."

Holt came to Korea June 3 "for the sole purpose of adopting and taking home" orphans of mixed parentage.

He said he decided to take the step after hearing of the plight of

such babies and children in Korea from the Rev. Bob Pierce, a leader in World Vision, a Christian organization that in recent years has supported 4,000 war orphans in Korea.

"I hope others in the United States will also cooperate in World Vision's great program and also adopt other orphans," Holt said.

"Care of such children should be the responsibility of Americans rather than Koreans."

Some of the 12 children Holt found in orphanages. The rest were brought to him by welfare workers.

At first, Nurse Cowan said, the children were "a bit frightened in

the presence of a stranger but they became acquainted and now they swarm all over Mr. Holt.

"They call him 'Aboji' (father)—a word they never had a chance to use before."

In America, Holt said, the children will have American first names but will retain Korean middle names.

Most of the 12 are blond youngsters but their features are slightly Eurasian.

Holt said he would bring his eight up as "Americans in America."

He said he foresees no difficulties to normal upbringing of the children—"I simply don't believe

good Americans will show any discrimination against them."

Till's Mother Returns From Stay In Hospital

CHICAGO (AP)—Mrs. Mamie Bradley, mother of a Negro boy slain in Mississippi, has been released from Provident Hospital after treatment for a cold and nervous disorder.

Her son Emmett Till, 14, was killed last August while on a visit at his uncle's home in Mississippi. Two men, Roy Bryant and J. W. Milam, were acquitted of murdering Till in a trial at Summer, Miss.

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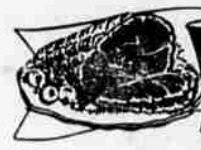
