A new break in the spring chinook run that saw 131 migrants cross the Winchester Dam counting station board in the final two weeks of September gave rise to hopes of the season's final figure approaching last year's record-breaking run.

The 131 fish registered constituted the highest number of adults ever recorded for the two-week period ending Sept. 16-30. Fifty-four crossed the board last year at the 99.9 per cent complete by that date.

Teams Split For Jamboree

Peewees To Play 18 Quarters Of Football

A new idea of scoring will feature this year's Roseburg peewee football jamboree scheduled for Saturday night at Finlay Field. The new scoring system divides the six schools into two sides—North and South. Benson, Riverside and Willbur schools will comprise the North and Green, Rose and Fullerton schools will make up the South side.

Each school's peewee team and each heavy team will play three quarters of football against the schools which compose the other side—depending upon which it is North or South. For example Benson of the North will play Green, Rose and Fullerton in three separate periods of football.

Totals To Be Added
The total score of each period will be added to the North and South sides to determine the winner. A total of 18 five-minute quarters of football will be played. A total of six games will be played at a time. Three will be played on the north side of the field and three on the south side of the field.

Touchdowns will count six points but there will be no try for extra points. Time-outs are called only if there is an injury. Penalties are one-half the regular penalty distances.

This is the seventh annual peewee football jamboree sponsored by the Kiwanis Club. The jamboree is part of the recreation program which finds 400 grade school boys participating in the peewee grid program during the fall season and 550 girls taking part in the pep squads.

The procession kicks things off at 7 p.m.

Archie Ranked 2nd In Boxing Ratings

NEW YORK — Despite his knockout loss to heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano, Archie Moore still was ranked as the leader in the heavyweight contender Friday in Ring Magazine's monthly boxing ratings.

The 38-year-old light heavyweight king was rated ahead of Bob Baker, Pittsburgh, Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson, New York, and Cuba's Nino Valdes.

Baker and Jackson retained their places while Valdes, who had slumped to seventh following successive defeats to Moore and Bob Satterfield, moved up again on the strength of his kayo of England's Don Cockell. The pudgy Briton dropped from fourth to eighth.

These were new No. 1 contenders listed, however, for the three lightest divisions, the flyweight, bantamweight and featherweight. Leo Espinosa was named flyweight champion Pascual Perez top contender in place of Britain's Dai Dower. Dower was knocked out by Spain's Young Martin.

Willie Towel of South Africa became the leading bantamweight contender instead of Italy's Mario d'Agata on the strength of his draw with champion Robert Cohen of France.

Cito Moransen of Cuba replaced Alan (The Horse) Ameche as a pro. (The Horse) was an All-America fullback at the University of Wisconsin last year and used to do most of his galloping at Madison, about 80 miles west of County Stadium. George Shaw of Oregon is Ameche's teammate.

Oregon State Rose Bowl Contender (This Afternoon)

LOS ANGELES — Oregon State invades Memorial Coliseum to battle UCLA Friday night, and believe it or not, both teams are entitled to nourish Rose Bowl dreams at this early stage of the Pacific Coast Conference football race.

The rival coaches, Red Sanders of UCLA and Tommy Prothro of the Beavers, the ex-teacher-pupil combination at Bruinville, will shudder at the very mention of Rose Bowl.

But the fact remains that Oregon State is undefeated and unscathed in two games, and missing from its schedule this season is powerful Southern California.

Oregon State must play such conference foes as Washington State, Washington, Idaho, California and Oregon, but the Beavers already have toppled Stanford in a major upset.

Hutchinson Appointment To Cardinal Post Rumored

ST. LOUIS — The naming of a new field general will be the first act for Frank Lane, new St. Louis Cardinal general manager, and he reportedly has Fred Hutchinson all but signed up.

Lane, former Chicago White Sox general manager, told newsmen Thursday he had three men under consideration for the job—Hutchinson, pilot of the 1955 pennant-winning Seattle club in the Pacific Coast League, Harry (The Hat) Walker, the present Redbird field director, and a third prospect who Lane didn't name.

But despite Lane's refusal to put the finger on his field pilot choice it was learned Hutchinson will be the man to succeed Walker within a week or 10 days.

Lane said he hoped to have the manager problem out of the way by Oct. 10—date for a Cardinal organizational meeting.

Hutchinson and Lane have had preliminary talks and are to meet again in a day or two, it was learned. The Seattle manager was voted Manager of the Year by Pacific Coast League writers and has a reputation for good handling of young men.

Top Oregon Schools Draw Rough Schedules

Oregon's top high school football teams are favored in Friday night action although some face rugged tests.

Marshfield, No. 1 in the Associated Press poll, will be host to Roseburg and is expected to continue its march toward another district 5 title.

South Salem, ranked second and favorite in the district 8 race, will be confronted with an upset-minded team in host Eugene.

Gresham, No. 3, will be at home to strong Astoria in district 3. La Grande travels to Pendleton for a try at knocking over the Buckaroos, rated fifth in the poll, in district 7.

Marshfield, South Salem, Gresham and Pendleton each is unbeaten in four games this season.

Corvallis Hosts Bend
Corvallis, upset by Gresham last week, will try to get back into winning stride when it hosts Bend in a district 8 game. Corvallis is No. 5 in the poll.

Jefferson, No. 6 and unbeaten in the Portland play, could just as well sew up another city championship by downing Washington, second in the league race.

Cottage Grove, another unbeaten, united team and seventh in the poll, looks for a tough district 3 contest at North Bend.

Hillsboro, No. 8, travels to Forest Grove. Hillsboro is tied in district 4 with McMinnville, which will host Oregon City in another league game.

Rams Play New School
Central Catholic, No. 9, should have an easy time with David Douglas, a new school, in a district 3 contest.

Vale, No. 10 and defending state class 2-A champion, will be out for its 16th straight victory when it invades Payette, Idaho.

In other Friday night action Klamath Falls plays at Boise, Grants Pass entertains Longview, Hermiston plays at Milton-Freewater, The Dalles is at Baker, Burns is at Prineville, Coquille at Dillard, and Yreka, Calif., at Ashland.

Fish And Wildlife Crack Mystery Of Summer Salmon

SEATTLE — The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has "cracked open the whole mystery" of the salmon's summer hiding place in the North Pacific.

C. E. Atkinson, chief of the FWS Pacific salmon investigations, said Wednesday exploration by two FWS vessels last summer traced the southern limit of salmon distribution to approximately the northern edge of the Japanese current.

For years, scientists and fishermen alike have watched salmon vanish in the sea," Atkinson said. "We set out to trace them and not only found the southern limit of salmon, but supplemented our knowledge about albacore (tuna)."

Two chartered boats, the Mitkof and the Paragon, made the explorations following a carefully planned course in the Gulf of Alaska and along the Aleutian chain, Atkinson said.

The Mitkof worked south of Dutch Harbor and found salmon immediately. The vessel continued south, but ran out of salmon and encountered albacore. When the Mitkof moved west the yield changed again to salmon.

"Our findings formed a neat pattern and when the results from the two boats were pieced together about Sept. 1, the jigsaw began to make sense," Atkinson said.

The Paragon is completing its part of the project and will report here in about two weeks.

"This information opens the door to many future studies," Atkinson said. "Why do we have a big run of salmon one year and a small run the next? What are the migration habits?"

The International Pacific Fisheries Commission, which sponsored the study, has tentative plans to expand it next season, he said.

Oregonian Appointed To Lead Boxing Tour

PORTLAND — Ben Harris, chairman of the Oregon AAU boxing committee, will manage a 10-member team of amateur fighters on a European tour this month.

His appointment was announced here late Wednesday.

Members of the team include Jackie Pucias, Eugene, who holds the national lightweight title.

Harris and Pucias will leave Portland for New York Oct. 14. The team will appear in Ireland, England, Scotland, Sweden and Germany.

Bucky Harris Signed To Boss Tigers Again

DETROIT — Bucky Harris signed a one-year contract Thursday to manage the Detroit Tigers again in 1956.

The Tigers also announced that Schoolboy Rowe is being dropped as first base coach and will be given a minor league managerial post.

Harris, 58, piloted the Tigers to a fifth place finish this season. They had a 79-75 win-loss record and were 17 games behind the league-leading Yankees.

Roseburg Ready To Travel To Rough Test At Coos Bay

Roseburg's Indians, taking a 1-3 record into the game with them, face what may be the toughest of all Marshfield High School football teams when they meet the Pirates Friday night at Coos Bay.

The district 5-A-1 football clash finds the veteran-loaded home team favored by at least two touchdowns to win. The last time a Roseburg team traveled to Coos Bay to play the count was 55-6 for the hosts.

There are few veterans of that losing Roseburg team on this year's squad. In fact, as is characteristic of all Roseburg teams,

there are few veterans from last year's team, which lost 13-0 to the state co-champion Pirates, returning to this year's team.

Indian Letterman Lost
To go even further, a check of the roster reveals that there are only a few veterans of this year's starting team ready to start against the Pirates. Coach Bob George had, at last account, somewhere between five and six lettermen to face the 18-letterman strong Pirates.

The Pirates are undefeated in four games this year, having outscored opponents by 121 points to 26. A staunch defense seems to be Roseburg's best forte as the Indians have given up only 33 points while scoring 27 themselves.

Another thing in Roseburg's favor is that the Indians have many veterans back from the Roseburg javayee team which beat the Pirates javayees by two touchdowns last season. The Roseburg javayees also won this year's game.

Roseburg Outweighed
Marshfield has a well-balanced team which outweighs the locals about 25 pounds per man in the line and two backfield stars who are heavier than any Roseburg player on the roster. They are 190-pound three-year letterman Sandy Fraser at quarterback and 202-pound "renegade runner" Denny Baker at fullback.

For good measure, the Pirates have 6-1, 190-pound Roger Johnson at end.
