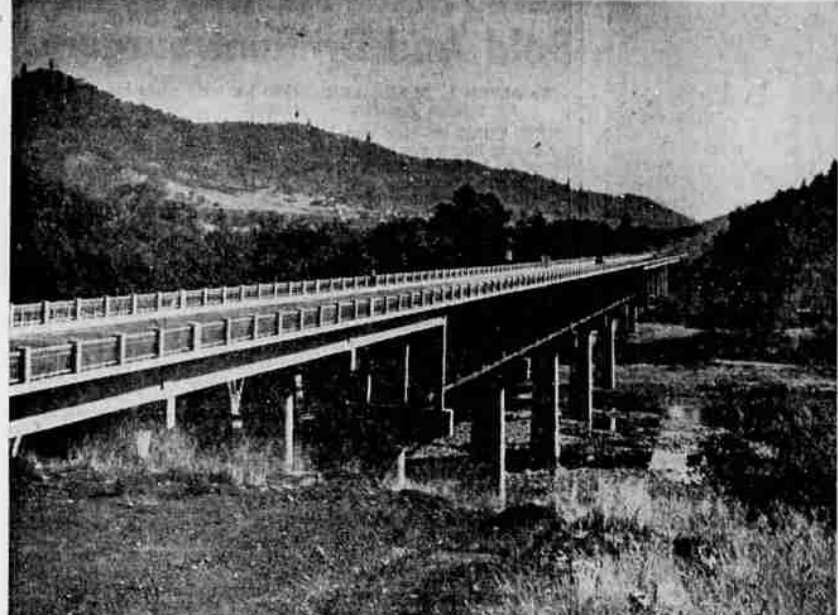
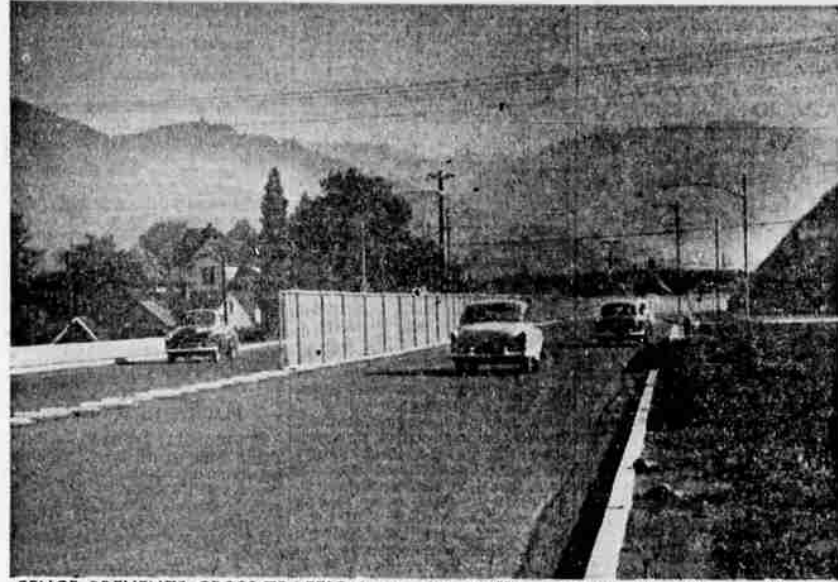


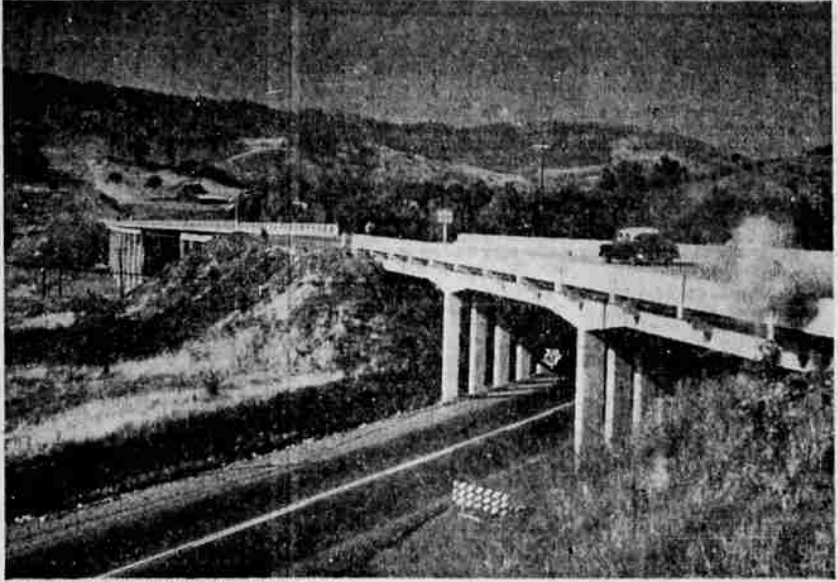
Camera Catches Scenes Along Roseburg Bypass

Now that the summer vacation season is drawing to a close, camera fans whose interest centers on color slides will be displaying their work in increasing numbers. Although these slide shows are meant to be entertaining, many might have just the opposite effect unless a few common sense rules are observed.



The number of slides shown is the first consideration. Approximately eighty in a thirty minute presentation is maximum. It is always better to finish the show with the guests wanting more — and eager to attend the next display — rather than by showing too many.

Only the best slides should be presented. Over- and under-exposures, and other technically poor ones should automatically be eliminated. Quality, not quantity, makes a good show. If a series of slides closely duplicate each other, only one should be used, even though all of them are good. "Family album" type slides should be separated from those for general viewing, as their interest is usually limited to relatives only.

Any commentary should be planned and brief, seldom over 20 seconds per slide. If a longer description than this is needed, the slide's merits are doubtful. If the shots are grouped according to related subjects, the show will be considerably smoother, and the commentary can thereby be shortened.

Slides can be effectively displayed with a hand-held viewer, but only to very small groups—a limitation that can be overcome only through projection. Several low cost projectors are now on the market, so, if you are without one, let us be of help.



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
