Tragic note in the news: Egyptians are giving thousands of dollars voluntarily to buy arms and equipment for Egypt's army. A delegation of transport workers from Alexandria today handed Premier Nasser a check for \$200 Egyptian pounds (\$749) representing workers' wages for one day.

Another worker sent \$1.50, suggesting it be used to buy a soft drink for the crew of the first ship bringing arms to Egypt.

Why is that tragic?

The answer is tragically simple. These poor devils of Egyptians (90 per cent of whom are poverty stricken beyond American capacity for belief) are digging into their pockets to buy guns and ammunition that may be used to help start another war in the explosive Middle East. 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Haggarty Says Eisenhower Still 'Not Out Of Woods'

Says President Has Progressed Satisfactorily

DENVER (AP) — President Eisenhower's news secretary cautioned Saturday against "over optimistic" reports indicating that the President is "out of the woods."

James C. Haggarty told a news conference the "healing process" are continuing but there is still a long way to go. And he added: "There is no intention of removing him (the President) from the hospital for some time."

Haggarty issued his statement as the President passed satisfactorily the first important two week period since his heart attack Sept. 24. Since Dr. Paul Dudley White, the Boston heart specialist, had described this period as the most dangerous one, steadily increasing optimistic reports have emanated from the Denver White House. For instance, White has said that if there were no complications it might be possible to fly the President to Gettysburg, Pa., within ten days to two weeks after the first milestone had been passed.

Haggarty said some of the news reports had dropped qualifying phrases.

"I have noticed certain reports in the press Friday and Saturday that gave the impression that the

Truman, Adlai Blast Eisenhower's Policy On Farms

Two top Democrats lambasted the Eisenhower administration last night as "special privilege government" and operator of a farm program that's doing away with farmers instead of helping them.

Republican talk for the moment centered on the party's choice for president in 1956 and on a split in GOP ranks in California.

Hitting at the Republican administration in campaign style were Adlai E. Stevenson, the unsuccessful Democratic presidential nominee in 1952, and former President Harry S. Truman.

Stevenson told a Wisconsin Democratic party convention at Green Bay, Wis., that the present GOP farm policy of flexible price supports "is not working."

"Instead of eliminating surpluses, as advertised, it is eliminating farmers, not as advertised," he declared.

"Export subsidies, import quotas still sharply conflict with our

Exiled Peron May Transfer From Paraguay

ASUNCION, Paraguay (AP) — Juan D. Peron may pack his bags and leave voluntarily for a life in exile elsewhere in order to ease strained relations between Argentina and Paraguay.

This unconfirmed report circulated in Asuncion Saturday as diplomats debated the fate of the fallen Argentine strongman, who is observing his 60th birthday Saturday.

Pouring rain pelted this capital as reporters and officials awaited a reply from the Paraguayan Foreign Ministry to Argentina's protest against Peron's continued presence in this country, which borders Argentina on the north.

There have been reports he might go to Spain or Switzerland. Argentina's protest to this country said he should get off this continent entirely.

In Buenos Aires, in a continuing drive to call members of the ousted Peron regime to stern accounting, the provisional government established by the victorious revolutionaries arrested four of the former president's close associates as they left asylum in foreign embassies.

Idelfonso Cavagna Martinez, Peron's last foreign minister, voluntarily left the Paraguayan embassy and gave himself up to the authorities.

Air Force Brig. Gen. Jose Ignacio San Martin, who was arrested,

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Price Increase For Milk Seen In Roseburg Area

MEDFORD (AP) — A retail price increase of 1 cent a quart for milk is expected at Eugene and Roseburg as a result of producer price increases.

Dick Westenberg, president of the Oregon Milk Producers, Friday said producers' prices would rise 2 cents a hundredweight in the two cities Oct. 15.

Milk now is selling for 22 cents at Roseburg and 23 cents in Eugene and Grants Pass.

Westenberg said similar increases could be expected at Grants Pass, Medford and Corvallis markets.

A local dairy spokesman had little comment on the report that milk prices would be boosted, except to say that "some change" may occur in the near future. An increase of 1 cent per quart was neither confirmed nor denied.

Another local dairy's producers do not belong to the producers' organization, and a dairy spokesman said no information had been received on the matter. The dairy's producers now receive prices higher than those given to members of the Oregon Milk Producers, it was pointed out.

Couple Reunited Following Two Year Effort Of English Bride To Gain Entry To U.S.

A sudden downpour of Oregon rain in no way dampened a reunion scene at Roseburg Municipal Airport Friday when Ross Chamberlin, Myrtle Creek, was reunited with his English bride.

The reunion, nearly two years in coming, was fraught with misfortunes until this most recent trip and the joyous moment at 11:45 a.m. when Mrs. Chamberlin and her adopted son descended from a West Coast Airlines plane. There she was welcomed "home" by Chamberlin, her daughter, Mrs. Charles Wallis and the Wallis' small daughter, whom she'd never seen.

The peppy Englishwoman from Birmingham appeared untired and her boy, Harry (Jimmy) Williams, held on tightly to a small piece of luggage. The travellers left England Sept. 30 on the French liner Liberte and completed the near 7,000 mile journey by air from New York City without complication.

Friday's story began two years ago when the soon-to-be Mr. Chamberlin came to Douglas County to visit his daughter, Mrs. Wallis had married an American serviceman and returned with him to Myrtle Creek. A family friend introduced her to Chamberlin, and in November, 1953, they were married. Both had been married previously and were grandmothers. Just two weeks later her visa expired, and she returned to England.

That trip started the long struggle. Last year, another visa in hand, she and Jimmy got as far as New York City. There, because of technical complications with visas, she and the lad were placed on Ellis Island and then returned to Birmingham.

This time William Jelski of the Lewis Travel Service, Roseburg, was called in to help by Chamberlin. With Jelski's assistance and many others, the long wait was ended yesterday. And, for the Chamberlins, life started anew at slightly past 60 years of age for both.

By noon Friday Ross had his bride in tow and was directing Jimmy and Mrs. Wallis to an awaiting car. With the party was Mrs. Eugene Bellman who had introduced the couple originally. They were headed to the Chamberlin house on Myrtle Creek's Christian Street, undoubtedly one of the happiest groups in America.

Conscientious Objector Assessed Fine Of \$3,000

SACRAMENTO (AP) — Ivory J. Poindexter, a self-styled conscientious objector from Lakeview, Ore., was fined \$3,000 in federal court Friday for ignoring a draft board order that he report for Army induction.

Judge Sherill Halbert put Poindexter on probation for five years and ordered him to begin paying his fine at the rate of \$50 a month.

Poindexter, a Jehovah Witness, had claimed his religion prevented him from taking part in military service.

Judge Halbert found the case did not involve religious freedom and that Poindexter deliberately violated the law.

"He is a law violator and can not expect treatment different from any other," said the judge.

James M. Evans Freed Of Bad Check Charge

James M. Evans, 31, Glendale, Friday was freed of a charge of passing a check without sufficient funds in the bank, following his appearance in district court for a preliminary hearing on the matter.

Judge Warren A. Woodruff found that there was insufficient evidence to turn the matter over to circuit court. Evans, arrested Sept. 17, has been free on \$1,000 bail since he first was brought into court.

J. Woosley In Hospital From Burns

Myrtle Creek Man Blown Out Of House; Building Destroyed

A 27-year-old man was seriously burned when butane gas exploded, blasting a house apart, at Tri-City at 9:30 a.m. Saturday.

The injured man is James Woosley, who moved with his wife to Tri-City only recently. His wife, standing in the kitchenette of their apartment, a converted garage attached to the house, was unhurt, according to News-Review correspondent Ruth Evans.

Attending at Myrtle Creek Clinic, where Woosley was taken, said he suffered burns to both arms and his abdomen. They refused to state his condition, though.

However, an investigating deputy sheriff said the victim has second and first-degree burns to his face, hands, legs and feet.

Mrs. Woosley told neighbors her husband, who was in the living room, smelled gas. He turned on an electric light and the explosion followed immediately.

Force of the explosion apparently hurled Woosley outside, where he was found stunned by a neighbor, Dr. Keebler. An attending physician gave the victim first aid and accompanied him to the hospital in a Ganz ambulance.

All windows in the house and apartment were smashed, the doors blown off and the north side of the house was caved in. The building was shifted around on its foundation. Mrs. Woosley was shaken, but unscathed.

The house was unoccupied at the time of the blast. It is owned by Dr. A. K. Fowler and is located in Briggs' Acres.

A fire flared briefly after the explosion, but neighbors formed a bucket brigade and had the flames licked before the Tri-City Rural Fire Dept. could arrive.

Though an investigative conclusion was known today, Mrs. Woosley and neighbors speculated that a leak in the butane system filled the house and apartment with gas. A spark, probably created when Woosley switched on the light, was believed to have set off the explosion.

Plant Opening Poses Possible New Violence

NEW CASTLE, Ind. (AP) — Gov. George H. Craig of Indiana was hurrying home from Miami today to take personal charge of the explosive Perfect Circle Corp., strike in New Castle, where the piston ring firm proposed to reopen Monday in spite of a riot Wednesday that left eight wounded.

Officers of a National Guard battalion on duty in New Castle said they would pull their troops away from the Perfect Circle foundry if it reopened but would remain in the vicinity.

The governor's aides professed not to know what orders Craig might bring for the heavily armed guardsmen. With martial law not declared, the Guard's authority in this city of 18,000 in east central Indiana was indefinite.

Doyle Moore, Craig's administrative assistant, said only that the governor will meet in his office Sunday with leaders of the company, the striking CIO United Auto Workers, and New Castle and Henry County officials.

Hypnotized Student Couldn't Break Spell

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — A hypnotized college coed couldn't break the spell and so she didn't get the \$100,000 on a TV show.

Pat Morris of the University of Southern California received, instead, a consolation award of \$1,000 and a new car on the NBC "Truth or Consequences" show Friday night.

In the stunt, night club entertainer Arthur Ellen hypnotized Miss Morris and told her she was physically unable to rise and pick up the \$100,000 from a table a few steps away.

Master of ceremonies Jack Bailey urged her to "get up, Pat," but she didn't budge within the 20-second time limit. Ellen seemed relieved. He aroused Miss Morris by clapping his hands.

She said later she couldn't remember what happened during the 20 seconds. When a reporter asked if she felt sorry about losing, she cheerfully replied: "I never had it to lose."

TRANSPORTS DUE

SEATTLE (AP) — Two Navy transports are scheduled to arrive here next week with 3,313 passengers from the Far East.

The Gen. H.B. Freeman is due Tuesday with 1,342 passengers, including 59 Republic of Korea army officers.

The Gen. W.A. Mann is due Saturday with 1,971 passengers from Okinawa, Korea and Japan.

GOP Discusses '56 Campaign Issues

There was no indication Friday night that Douglas County Republicans had slipped into obscurity.

Some 100 Grand Old Party members came to the Roseburg Women's Club to hear public reports from the state central committee Chairman Wendell Wyatt and Cong. Harris Ellsworth. Most of the county's communities were represented at the initial fall county committee session.

Wyatt, a barrister, assured them "We're not out to smear the senior senator" (Morse). He said state Republicans had a special crusade, that of sending to Washington a man who "will support the Eisenhower program."

A fluent and able spokesman, Wyatt reviewed a meeting he and the 47 other state GOP chairman had two weeks before the President's illness. He referred to his fine health then and the manner in which the President had imparted to the chairman the necessity of government "of, by and for the people."

He chided Cong. Ellsworth for "one big failing." Spending too much time in Congress "getting things done" rather than "writing and speaking about it as Oregon's Democratic representatives in the national legislature do." Wyatt pulled no punches and referred often to the state's two senators and one congresswoman. He listed
