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NEWSBOYS HONORED

That this is Newspaper Week has been mentioned previously in this column.
Saturday is designated as Newspaperboy Day. Throughout the country special tribute is being paid to the boy who delivers the paper to your door. And the tribute is deserved.

Have you ever noticed that when a crowd of successful business men start discussing their early activities about nine out of ten "point with pride" to the fact they once carried newspapers? Ask a successful man if he ever had a newspaper route and, if he did, he'll launch out into a detailed account of that job. He'll tell you more about his work as a paper carrier than about how he made his first million.

Every man, it seems, takes more pride in his success as a newspaperboy than in any of his later achievements.

There is a reason why his experience stands out in his mind: why he is proud to relate his employment.

The newspaperboy is laying the foundation for a business career. He is learning how to meet the public. He is learning the necessity for responsible service, the importance of doing his job regardless of handicaps. He is learning to handle money. He is learning the value of a dollar. He is building good habits.

Carrier Boys Good Citizens

Perhaps you read in the last issue of *This Week* magazine the statement by J. Edgar Hoover, head of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, who reported that very few newspaperboys become juvenile delinquents. His statistics were backed up by reports from numerous sources.

It was Hoover's opinion that much of today's juvenile delinquency stems from the fact that young people do not have "chores" to do as in earlier years. The boy who has a job, and who has responsibilities, he contends, seldom gets into trouble.

This has long been one of my favorite peeves, as readers of this column well know. It is my belief that we could remedy much of our juvenile delinquency problem if we would dispense with the foolish restrictions made upon the employment of young people in non-hazardous occupations; if we would remove the red tape which now makes it too inconvenient to an employer to hire a young person for odd jobs.

This belief is backed up by our experience with our own newspaperboys. I cannot recall an experienced newspaperboy serving *The News-Review* who has ever been in trouble with the juvenile courts. At the same time I can point to many fine citizens, some of them now serving in high places, who gained their start carrying *The News-Review*.

But we have placed so many obstacles in the way of employment for young people, through laws, regulations and red tape, that a great many odd jobs are denied young people who would like to be doing them. Unable to earn their own money, and seeking some diversions to fill their idle hours, they succeed in getting themselves into trouble.

Learn Business Methods

It is regrettable that newspapers can't employ more newspaperboys. If they could, we would have fewer juvenile delinquents. For the statistics show clearly that the boy with a paper route is not getting into trouble.

Not only is he staying away from bad habits, but he is learning to conduct his own business. He is a "Little Merchant" buying a product, distributing it to a customer, recovering his capital and earning his profit as he collects for his services. If he is a good merchant, he is studying ways and means of adding customers, and, in that effort, learns salesmanship.

In all this activity he builds confidence in himself. He has his own money to spend, and thus develops a sense of responsibility and self-reliance.

At the same time, through his daily exercise in the open air, even though it be in inclement weather, he has better-than-average health. He also stands high in his classes at school, for statistics show that the newspaperboy is usually above average in scholastic achievement.

There is good reason, I think, why successful businessmen are proud of their experience as newspaperboys. There is good reason, I believe, why the nation can well pay tribute once each year to its newspaperboys, who will mature into good citizens.

For our part we wish to speak our appreciation of the fine work being done by the Little Merchants who represent *The News-Review*. We "graduate" a number of our newspaperboys this year—boys who have been with us through high school and are now entering college. Some moved away during the summer months. We have a number of new newspaperboys, and we know that with but few exceptions they will follow the pattern established by the hundreds of boys who have given this service in the past.

We also pay our tribute to the many boys who deliver metropolitan papers in this area. They're a fine group of boys of whom the community may well be proud.

with a different mental cast now lin's leaders almost certainly operate from a complex of motives.

There is evidence to suggest that the Kremlin is generally aware of the impartial horror that nuclear war would visit on both aggressor and victim. No rulers, totalitarian or democratic, could count on surviving if they did live; they would find only ruins to preside over.

For a second thing, Russia's Cold War tactics did not, in the end, produce winning results. At the outset they did. But the advance into Korea alarmed the West and aroused it to strong counterpreparations. They reached their height in the pulling of Germany into the Western orbit.

This was a turning point. Perhaps if Stalin were alive Russia might be brazening it through on the old line. But different men

Kinsey Robinson Denies He Authored Partnership Bill

Kinsey M. Robinson, president of Washington State Power Co. of Spokane, issued Friday morning a statement in which he said "Mr. Neuberger, as usual, is talking through his hat."

He was referring to Senator Richard Neuberger's accusation that he (Robinson) was the author of the bill Rep. Coon (R-Ore.) introduced for partnership construction of the John Day Dam.

"Certainly Congressman Coon did consult with the three private companies involved in the John Day power construction, as well as representatives of several public bodies," Robinson said. "How else could he be assured of financing and participation by both public and private agencies?"

The Robinson statement, issued after he was asked for comment, added:

"Mr. Neuberger is surely well enough informed to know that none of the private utilities will earn profit on the John Day construction."

Economic note in the news: The U. S. department of commerce reports today that publicly disclosed cash dividends in the first eight months of this year amounted to five and a half BILLION dollars.

It adds: This was a gain of 7½ per cent over the first eight months of last year.

That raises an interesting question: WHO OWNS AMERICA'S CORPORATIONS?

That question can't be EXACTLY answered, because there are thousands of little corporations whose stock ownership isn't listed in existing records that are available.

But the Brookings Institution estimates that the total of individual share owners of publicly owned corporations in this country is now about 7,500,000. In an exhaustive study made in 1952 it was able to track down a total of 6,490,000 persons who own shares in America's better known corporations.

It separated them into family income groups, with this result: Under \$5000 income, 2,050,000 people.

Five thousand dollars to \$10,000 income, 2,880,000 people.

Ten thousand dollars a year and over, 1,560,000 people.

This is the point: America's corporations are no longer owned by a few big shots. They are owned by MILLIONS of Americans of all kinds.

This \$½ billion dollar dividend income in the first eight months of this year went into the pockets of MILLIONS of Americans who had been thrifty enough to put their savings into the stock of American corporations.

Lighthouse Keeper Rescues Prospector From Boiling Surf

PORT BENFREW, B.C. (AP)—A courageous lighthouse keeper plunged into boiling surf near here Wednesday to rescue a seagoing prospector whose boat was swamped off the west coast of Vancouver Island.

Jerry Wellard, attendant at the lonely lighthouse, 15 miles west of here, saw several hundred yards out in the churning waters to the half-drowned man and brought him to shore.

The prospector, Karl Von Hottann of Seattle, told his rescuer he was headed for California, but didn't say how far he had sailed in his 28-foot, double-ended craft.

The story of the daring rescue was told over radio-telephone by Mrs. Wellard, who watched through a telescope her husband's valiant swim.

She said the boat, carrying a home-made sail and with a plastic-topped cabin, drifted toward the jagged rocks surrounding the lighthouse point.

Mrs. Wellard said the craft took three waves right over the top and then sank. The man aboard grabbed a nearly-empty suitcase and jumped overboard.

"Terry tried to launch his small boat from the beach but the surf was too heavy. He took off some of his clothes and dove into the sea," said Mrs. Wellard.

Both men were badly cut and bruised from the pounding of the waves and the rocks, but were not seriously injured.

A U. S. Coast Guard cutter was contacted and said it would attempt to pick up Von Hottann Thursday if the seas permit.

Port Benfrew is 75 miles north-west of Victoria.

Lamar Toozee Announces He May Run For Senate

PORTLAND (AP)—Lamar Toozee, Portland attorney, said Friday he will seek the Republican nomination for U. S. senator next year if Gov. Paul Patterson does not.

Toozee, long prominent in Oregon GOP circles, said he would support Patterson if he tried for the nomination against Democratic Sen. Wayne Morse. But he said he would become an active candidate if Patterson gave the word he was not interested.

Patterson, advised of Toozee's statement, had "nothing to say," Toozee, whose brother, Walter, is an Oregon Supreme Court justice, said.
