Dominating every phase of play from start to finish, Marshfield's top-rated and talented Pirates routed over Roseburg's Indians 49-0 in a district 5-A-1 football game at Coos Bay Friday night.

The win by the defending state co-champs was a repeat of a 1953 game between the two teams at Coos Bay when the Pirates handed the locals a 55-6 lacing. Last year Roseburg lost 13-0.

Scoring for the Pirates came in a variety of ways and included seven touchdowns, five conversions and a safety. They registered in every period, holding quarter margins of 8-0, 28-0 and 42-0.

The youthful and unskilled Indian team unfolded a spread formation offense that proved to be no puzzle to the big Marshfield line. Final statistics credited the Indians with exactly no yards gained rushing and passing.
