Admitted Forger, Age 75, Finally Out Of Circulation

SPOKANE — A 75-year-old admitted forger who made a specialty of bilking the clergy and used 93 different names — starting in 1912 with Woodrow Wilson — was taken out of circulation Thursday.

John Bernard Sawey pleaded guilty to first degree forgery and was sentenced to not more than 20 years in the State Penitentiary.

Deputy Prosecutor Robert Fraser said Sawey has spent 34 years of his life in prisons and told him, "If you cut off my right arm, probably would learn to forge with the left."

Fraser said Sawey, using the name "Patrick Burke," came here last July and was hired by a Catholic priest as a handy man at a parish at Chewelah, Wash.

He was well liked there, worked hard and said he didn't need any money, just wanted to help the church, Fraser said.

2-Month-Old Baby Suffocates Sunday

Robert Wayne Hall, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Clifford F. Hall, Roseburg, died Sunday morning, Oct. 9.

The child, born Aug. 4, apparently died of suffocation, according to Coroner L. L. Powers. The parents found the infant lying face-down in his crib Sunday morning.

Graveside funeral services will be held in the Roseburg Memorial Gardens Tuesday, Oct. 11, at 10 a. m. in the John Hall of the Church of God and Body of Christ, Oakland, will officiate.

Portland Taken Off Preference Contracts List

SALEM — The Portland-Vancouver area has been reclassified so that it no longer is entitled to special consideration in awarding defense contracts, the U. S. Labor Department advised the State Unemployment Compensation Commission Thursday.

Because of a high level of unemployment, the area has been classified in group D for the past year. This classification gave the area a preference in award of contracts for defense.

But reduced unemployment in the region has resulted in reclassifying it to group C. The area includes Clark County, Wash.; and Multnomah, Washington and Clackamas counties in Oregon.

The area now has 248,000 non-farm workers, compared with 229,900 last winter, and 242,400 a year ago.

Average weekly earnings in the four counties rose to \$83.66 in August, a gain of \$6.67 above a year ago.

As a result of being placed in group D, a Portland firm got a big ship conversion contract that will give jobs to 1,900 workers.

Molotov Upsets Belief He Won't Go To Geneva

MOSCOW — Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov said Monday he will leave by air on Oct. 25 for Geneva Big Four foreign ministers' conference opening two days later.

The veteran Soviet diplomat made the disclosure to Lester B. Pearson, Canada's foreign secretary, during a luncheon which the visiting Canadian gave for Molotov at the Canadian Embassy.

Molotov's announcement stopped cold speculation in Western diplomatic circles here that his self-criticism, published in the latest issue of the magazine Communist might mean he wouldn't be going to Geneva.

American-British Link Holds World Peace—Churchill

NEW YORK — Sir Winston Churchill says the safety of the world depends on "the essential and fundamental unity of the English-speaking people."

This unity, he says, is "not at the expense of other countries, nor by the creation of elaborate machinery, but as the natural realization of a great truth."

Britain's wartime Prime Minister spoke by recording Sunday at the annual Freedom House dinner as the recipient of its 1955 Freedom Award for services to the cause of freedom.

Churchill said: "At all times when America and the British Commonwealth have stood together, things have gone more or less right for us. Whenever we have drifted apart in the present century we have met with calamity, and we have had to come closer together to save ourselves from destruction."

What improvement there may have been during the past few years in international affairs we owe to the unity of the Western world and to the sacrifices we have made to maintain a strong, bold and united front.

Split Means Disaster This improvement continues, there may well be felt on either of these sides of the Atlantic a temptation to drift apart again, and for nations to go their own way.

"Nothing could be more disastrous than that, and it would surely lead sooner or later to a catastrophe such as mankind has never known."

Saying the United States and Britain are closer today than ever before, Churchill declared: "That is the most significant fact of this postwar era, and so long as it continues so, we need fear no foe."

Freedom House, which was incorporated in 1941, is dedicated to perpetuation of the "one world" concepts of the late Wendell L. Willkie.

Kefauver Tells Ike Democrats Due For Sweep

SEOU, S. — Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn.) said Monday he recently told President Eisenhower the Democrats will sweep both the presidency and Congress in next year's elections.

Kefauver, who tried unsuccessfully to capture the Democratic presidential nomination in 1952, refused to say whether he will try again next year. Asked about Adlai Stevenson, he replied: "He is a very good man. But I am not running anybody's campaign now."

Kefauver arrived from Japan after a tour of Russia and Southeast Asia. He said he came to Korea to obtain information for his Senate Armed Services Committee. He plans to meet with President Syngman Rhee Tuesday and to visit U. S. troops before leaving for Tokyo and home Wednesday.

He said earlier in Tokyo he thinks America's big Far Eastern aid program needs "reappraisal" in some countries but is generally "well handled."
