Postmaster Lists Overseas Mailing Dates, Restrictions

The Post Office Dept. has designated Oct. 15 to Nov. 15 for acceptance of Christmas parcels destined for servicemen serving overseas, according to Roseburg Postmaster Clyde W. Carstens.
The early mailing dates were set to insure delivery by Christmas. Due to the large volume of mail addressed to members of the armed forces during the pre-Christmas rush, transportation facilities are taxed heavily.
Carstens cautioned senders to use cartons of strong construction because parcels are handled many times. Each box should be securely packed with strong cord and firmly packed to eliminate crushing. The address should be legible and prepared in typewriting or ink. He said it is preferable that addresses be hand-printed directly on the wrappers rather than on adhesive labels.
Senders shouldn't send foodstuffs, for armed services personnel are well-fed, the postmaster pointed out. Then, too, foodstuffs are subject to spoilage.
It's prohibited to mail money to countries where the dollar isn't the medium of exchange, so money orders should be purchased.
Customs declarations tags must be attached to packages sent to some Army and fleet post offices and cigarettes and tobacco products are prohibited in others. Further information on that point may be obtained at the Roseburg post office.
Air parcel post may be sent to overseas destinations, but size and weight are limited. The parcel may not exceed two pounds and a resume to 30 inches in length and girth combined.

For Chronically Ill**
Plans for a monthly magazine to be distributed to all children who are or will be confined to bed over a period of time have been completed by the Oregon Heart Assn., Inc.
The first issue is scheduled to be released this month. It is designated for youngsters between the ages of 3 and 14. Five other groups are joining with the association in the planning, preparation, organization and distribution of the publication.
Designed as a free public service, it will be sent to children with rheumatic heart disease, polio, surgical operations, kidney disease, arthritis or "any other long term chronic illness or injury."
Douglas County special education consultant Mrs. Jessie Baker has requested that persons knowing of youngsters who qualify for the magazine please contact her at her office in county school Supt. Kenneth F. Barneburg's office in the courthouse.
Mrs. Baker will notify the association. Persons unable to contact the consultant may mail the name of the child, along with age and address and the names of the parents to Oregon Heart Assn., Inc., 905 SW Taylor St., Portland 5. Joining with the association are the following groups: Alpha Delta Kappa Teachers' society, Portland chapter; Alpha Phi sorority, Multnomah County chapter; Portland City Schools, Dept. of Child Services, Special Education Division; State dept. of education, state health department and the Portland public library.

Passenger Sues Driver After Highway Collision

A passenger in a car involved in an accident two years ago has sued the driver for \$10,000 general and \$3,647.80 special damages, circuit court records show.
Marvin F. Fuller filed the suit against Clarence A. Earls, claiming Earls was reckless and negligent when his car struck one driven by Gladys Soders on Oct. 7, 1953. The accident occurred about two miles east of Reedsport on Highway 38.
Earls, who says he was confined to a hospital until Nov. 14 that year, claims he received permanent injuries.

Couple Prove They Can Eat On \$8.56 A Week

SAN ANGELO, Tex. — A San Angelo couple claim they have proved that they can eat on less than \$8.56 a week.
Mrs. Burdick Myre said she had all the food needed for her menus through Sunday night and has 72 cents left over.

Officers' Commissions Available To Volunteers

WASHINGTON — The Army is holding out the prospect of officers' commissions for young men who volunteer to take six months active duty training under the new reserve program.
This additional inducement for pre-draft age men followed a slow start in getting volunteers for the new reserve program that got underway officially on Oct. 1. Only 1,167 men under 18½ years signed up in time to join the first class of short-term reserve trainees.
The Army said Thursday that young reservists who complete their active training and continue active in reserve units can become eligible to compete for commissions after they reach the grade of sergeant in the reserves. A board of officers will recommend young reservists for commissions based upon their demonstrated qualifications.
The Army said also that most reserve units have vacancies and that promotion in grade can be attained in a reasonable time.
