

Rose PTA Has Discussion On Development

A panel discussion, "Developing Civic Responsibility," highlighted the Rose PTA meeting Monday evening.

Al Flegel acted as moderator. Mrs. Alfred Tyson, Mrs. Paul Geddes, Dist. Atty. Robert Stults and Arthur Judd, assistant superintendent of the Roseburg School District were panel members.

Flegel opened the discussion with the statement, "Civic responsibility must be developed in children as well as in adults." If children are to participate on the state level, they must learn on the home and school levels, he stated.

Judd pointed out that the school begins in the first grade to teach responsibility.

Mrs. Tyson stated that the churches are the mirrors of the community. The gap between the present and future must be faced by homes, PTAs, churches and local government, she said.

Stults said that the chief problem is that of more idle time now than in previous years. He said that each child must be given an opportunity for some form of success.

Mrs. Geddes emphasized the growing attitude of adults toward a government for the people, instead of one for, by and of the people.

Opinion was that to make the community better for children and to develop in them a feeling of civic responsibility, the homes, churches and schools must work closer together.

Judd stated that the welcome mat is out for the parents. The school needs their support and help in the physical, mental and moral development of students.

The discussion closed with the feeling that when these forces have been raised to a high standard, the need for civic responsibility will be realized by individuals.

The first grade mothers served refreshments.

The council also approved a proposal to change the name Vista to Overlook and have Cass extend east to the point where it intersects with Vista.

Altogether, there were nine objections at Monday night's hearing, but after much discussion, the council agreed that the planning group's proposals were the best under the circumstances for most of them.

Some were overruled because the change would go beyond the planners' work of merely changing names to avoid duplication and confusion. For example, some objected to the name Lookingglass because it is long. But, it does not conflict with any other street, so was left as is.

Fire Chief W. E. Mills objected to having "state names" on streets. More than one area of town. But the council went ahead with present plans, whereby there will be a few of them in southeast, one in west and one in northwest areas. It was pointed out that some streets already have such names outside the city limits to the east. Complete revamping of the system could eliminate the problem, but would go beyond present plans. Directional designations will be an aid in locating the streets.

Much discussion centered around changing E. Second Ave. S. to Diamond Lake Boulevard, mostly on the suffix designation. Only that street and Garden Valley would be boulevards, but it was noted the ordinance designating types of arteries is confusing in that respect.

It was decided that the ordinance would be to be modified to eliminate boulevards to which avenues could be called boulevards.

A public hearing on proposed rezoning of property adjacent to SE Chadwick Street was not held at Monday night's regular Roseburg City Council meeting in the City Hall.

The matter was postponed after it was learned a wrong hearing date had been listed in an advertisement.

In other business before the council, George Luoma of the finance committee commended the purposes of the PAL Club but said his committee had turned down a proposal for the club to construct a building on city property between the railroad tracks and VA Hospital south of Garden Valley Blvd. Plan turned down.

The recommendation, accepted by the council, was based on (1) poor access to the property and (2) legal aspects, including the difficulty in selling or leasing the land it was brought out, the city cannot give away property, even to worthy organizations. Allen Clute of the club told the council he would report the recommendation to the board tonight. He noted

Coos Bay Area Craft Encounter Storm Troubles

COOS BAY, Ore. — The disabled tug Saltair, with its four crewmen, was towed into port Monday morning by the Coast Guard cutter Bonham.

The tug was out loose Saturday by the motorship Tannin because of heavy seas and almost sank. The cutter, dispatched from here, took it under tow Sunday.

A 75-foot gas barge, also cut loose by the Tannin Sunday, was located Monday morning by an unidentified vessel, the Coast guard said. The vessel was towing the barge to Coos Bay. The barge was found about 15 miles south of Hecla Head and some 40 miles offshore.

The Tannin, the Saltair and the barge were headed from Vancouver, B.C., to San Diego when the tug developed pump trouble, 60 miles offshore.

Crewmen told the Coast Guard the Tannin was forced to drop the tug when 25-foot waves battered the craft but the motorship stood by long enough to radio for help.

Crew Forced To Bail
The crewmen—Ray Roberts, Cory Frank, Robert Finchen and Norman Watt—had to bail water at times to keep afloat until the Bonham arrived to escort the tug to safety. The men, all from Vancouver, were unhurt.

The motorship had to release the tug Sunday morning as the storm continued. The report to the Coast Guard said the barge was found drifting this morning.

Meanwhile, the Coast Guard here said it had no word of a two-masted schooner, a Manahat Beach resident reported seeing wallowing about in the ocean off Weekawau on Oct. 31. The Coast Guard officials were skeptical of the report.

Civil Air Patrol Auxiliary Has New Commander

WASHINGTON — The Air Force Monday named Maj. Gen. Walter R. Agee, 50, as the next commander of its civilian auxiliary, the Civil Air Patrol.

Agee will be assigned as vice commander until Maj. Gen. Lucas V. Beau, CAP commander in chief for the past eight years, leaves active Air Force duty. Beau retired from the Air Force Aug. 31, but was voluntarily recalled the next day for an indefinite term.

Agee has been commander of the 329th Technical Training Wing of the Air Training Command at Amarillo Air Force Base, Texas, for the past two years.

He served in the Philippines, Hawaii and California before World War II, and in 1941 and 1942 was stationed at Fort George Wright, Wash., first as executive officer of the Second Bomber Command and later as assistant chief of staff of the 2nd Air Force.

He also served as commander of the 98th Air Depot Wing, Elmendorf Air Force Base, Alaska, in 1951, and as deputy commander of the Alaskan Air Command in 1952.

Two Deny Guilt

A Roseburg couple, Glen Dale Munter, 45, and Frances R. Munter, 49, each pleaded innocent in district court Monday when arraigned on drinking charges. They posted bail bonds of \$300 and \$100 on charges of drunken driving and being drunk on a public highway.

They were arrested Oct. 31. The Munters were arrested Sunday by a state police officer.

The sick pay is given only for that part of the illness which occurs during the term.

LAS VEGAS, Nev. — The three-million-dollar Moulin Rouge, only interlacial hotel and casino here, has been padlocked because of mounting financial troubles. It is the third Las Vegas hotel known to have undergone financial difficulties in recent months.

Whittles Down Lead

JAKARTA, Indonesia — The pro-Western Muslim Masjumi party whittled down the lead of the Indonesian Nationalist party to about 600,000 with the help of revised unofficial returns. More than 28 million ballots had been counted, about 80 per cent of the anticipated total.

The finance committee suggested the possibility of using park property, which the city is trying to obtain from the government, along the west boundary of the VA grounds. City Manager George W. Farrell reported that a survey by the National Park Service has been made and he believes the city can buy the property from the General Services Administration "in a very few weeks."

Trailers Discussed
Trailer houses again came up for discussion. Farrell said City Atty. Paul E. Geddes has given a verbal opinion that trailer houses cannot be located on premises except on a 90-day basis unless they are dismantled and made permanent (no longer mobile) and comply with fire safety and building code regulations. A trailer court was proposed. Opinion was that a dismantled trailer could not possibly meet building code regulations, but the council asked the attorney for a written opinion on the matter.

The council approved partial payments to Roseburg Paving Co. and Coast Construction Co. for paving and sewer work. A low bid of \$1,190 for construction of fence around the Fowler Street playground was accepted. One other bid of \$1,147, plus alternate, was received. Winning bidder was Colorado Fuel and Iron Corp.

Negotiations Approved
Councilmen gave approval to finance committee recommendations that negotiations be entered into with Shirley Wardle in connection with proposed revamping of the municipal airport facilities, and for leasing sign space to Foster & Kleiser Co. and West Coast Airlines.

It was decided that geographical and number requirements in liquor license applications will be abolished by the council. The factors now duplicate requirements of the State Liquor Control Commission.

Other reports were on the library board meeting and status of proposed sewer and gas-delivery ordinances. Councilman Robert Harris was named to a special committee to study the need for an ordinance outlining regulations on billboards and signs. The matter will come up again next Monday night at a committee of the whole meeting. Harris and Rudie Ritzman were absent because of illness. Mayor Ernest M. Barker Jr. and Councilmen Sidney Luoma, William Adair, George Luoma, Ken Ellison, Rosemary Myers and James Knudson were on hand.

Oil Information Speaker Defends 'Largest' Industry

A representative of the Oregon Oil Industry Information Committee Monday noon told Roseburg Chamber of Commerce members that the industry isn't operating on a "giveaway" program.

Gene Connell, Portland, struck out at critics of the industry and claimed that "we are producing our own oil." He backed up his statement by pointing out that 16 per cent of the land mass of the continental United States is under lease by the industry, usually only for the subsurface mineral rights.

The program at the Hotel Umpqua was in observance of Oil Progress Week. Harold Monaghan was in charge of the program.

Connell said the week has been set aside "to clear up misconceptions" about the industry, which he claimed is largest in the United States, with the exception of agriculture.

He told a small audience that there is no "collusion" or price-fixing within the industry and that competition is at its keenest among the major oil companies.

Explorations have been a great expense to the oil companies, Connell asserted. He stated that of nine wells drilled, only one is a producer and only one in seven in areas where oil is known to be.

Some royalties from an oil strike in Douglas County could accrue, he said, but it will cost a great amount of money before oil is brought in.

The industry has been protecting its reserves in the United States, largely through imports of crude oil from abroad, notably from Saudi Arabia and Venezuela.

Lightning Bolt Damages Property In Seattle

SEATTLE — A bolt of lightning which slashed down from the sky shattered a popular tree here Monday broke windows in 15 Greenwood district homes. There were no injuries.

The bolt coursed from the tree through the concrete foundation of a nearby home, blasting a foot-wide hole as it went through. The bolt ripped a cover from an automatic washer in the home, smashed two concrete laundry tubs and melted wires throughout the house. An insurance agent estimated damage at "at least \$3,500."

Damage caused by the bolt in surrounding homes was not known, although the charge ruined 150 telephones and numerous television and radio sets and appliances.

The storm which sent the bolt downward in the Greenwood district also unloosed other strikes which knocked out power in other sections of the city and set an unknown number of utility poles ablaze.

Integrated NATO Command For Europe's Air Force Urged By Gen. Gruenther

PARIS — Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther Tuesday urged the free nations of Europe to integrate their air forces to meet any surprise attack by Russia.
