Radio Equipment Delay Defers Broadcast Debut

Delay of shipment of equipment has caused postponement of the first broadcast of Roseburg's newest radio station, KYES.

Manager Leroy Hiatt said Monday that construction on the station is stalled until the equipment arrives from the East. The transmitter was delivered more than a week ago, but was damaged and had to be repaired.

The 160-foot tower about two miles south of the city has been erected and work on the studios on SE Pine Street is virtually complete.

Hiatt said he has no idea when the vital parts will arrive. It had been anticipated that the station would go on the air the first of this month.

Equipment is being supplied by the Radio Corp. of America, Camden, N.J.

Glendale Phone Company Plans Sale Of Stock

The Glendale Telephone Co. is planning to offer for sale a limited number of \$50 shares of preferred stock, bearing 6 per cent interest, for modernization and expansion of phone service.

Telephone officials said subscribers to the service will have first chance to buy the stock, which may be purchased outright or on a time-payment plan.

The announcement followed a recent public hearing at Glendale by the Public Utilities Commission, in which it was explained by Bob Jones, company president, that delivery of a new switchboard at the Azalea branch has been delayed by the recent floods in the East, reports Mrs. G. B. Fox, News-Review correspondent.

Emergency shipments by the equipment manufacturers to the disaster area brought about the delay. The switchboard would have been delivered this month, but a new delivery date of Dec. 16 has been set. It will be in use in January, company officials said.

The new dial board will include six local circuits and four long-distance circuits. Long - distance calls will go direct to Roseburg. Some single-party lines will be available for Azalea businesses after the changeover.

Sam Maere, a PUC engineer, said the problem in Azalea, where the telephone company is trying to keep up with the rapid growth in population, is being repeated in public utilities throughout the Northwest.

September Traffic Deaths Show No Drop

Oregon's 1955 traffic death toll has climbed to 288, Secretary of State Newberry reports.

September accidents claimed 33 lives according to a tentative count of reports received to date, and the figure may go higher if delayed reports are received or if persons now listed as injured later succumb, the secretary said.

The September fatality count last year was 38 and the end-of-September toll was 285.

August traffic deaths, reported earlier as 39, now have reached 41 with the receipt of two more August fatality reports. One more death was charged to the Labor Day weekend, raising Oregon's traffic death count during the final three-day holiday of the summer season to seven.

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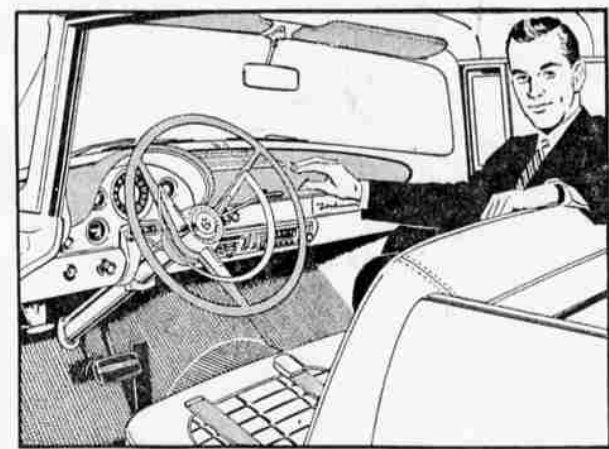
