Bowlers Hear ABC Field Man

Charlie Fleming, field man for the American Bowling Congress, gave a fine talk and showed an extremely interesting reel of moving pictures at the local pin emporium Sunday afternoon.

Appearing in the film, which was taken at the Chicago ABC tournament in 1953 were most of the country's top keglers, and it was quite a thrill to watch them go through their gyrations of "body English" just like our local boys and gals do.

Fleming lauded the coming local tournament, saying it is, as far as he knows, the only tournament on the west coast sponsored by the bowlers themselves. All other tournaments are sponsored by proprietors or alley owners. Fleming thinks the committee has done a remarkable job in setting up the tournament and setting out the rules.

The tournament has been named the "Timber Capital Fall Handicap," with divisions for both men and women, and a special four-game Christmas fun classic. Another unusual feature is that it is the only tournament of its kind conducted in the fall months. Winter and spring seem to be the usual dates, so this tournament is expected to draw a great many entries due to this feature.

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New Cardinal Manager Scheduled Wednesday

ST. LOUIS — It appeared certain Tuesday that Frank Lane, new St. Louis Cardinal general manager, was speaking of Fred Hutchinson when he dismissed the question of the club's 1956 field manager with one sentence: "We'll name him Wednesday."

Lane, the trading wizard of baseball, wouldn't say much more Monday about the managerial job. As a week-long Cardinal organizational meeting began, Lane preferred to speculate about possible trades to help the club.

He had previously mentioned Hutchinson, manager of the 1955 pennant-winning Seattle club of the Pacific Coast League and former Detroit Tigers manager; Harry (The Hat) Walker, who took over as Redbird pilot when Eddie Stanky was fired last May and a third party he wouldn't identify as still in the running for the job.

Since then, reports have persisted Hutchinson has the job sewed up.

The unidentified third party was believed to be Johnny Keane, Omaha manager.

Golfing Congressman Proud Of Constituents

SEATTLE — Congressman Jack Westland of Everett, a fair country golfer himself, has picked a team of four girls from his Second Washington District and challenged the nation.

Westland, who was National Amateur champion in 1952, dared any other congressman to field a four-woman team from his own district against Westland's quartet.

He isn't likely to find any takers. This is the Westland team: Patricia Anne Lesser of Seattle, National and women's Western Amateur champion.

Ann Quast, Marysville, runner-up in the Western Junior and state women's champion.

Ruth Jensen, Seattle, Pacific Northwest amateur queen.

Sale Of Duck Stamps Continues Decrease

WASHINGTON — Federal duck stamp sales totaled 2,181,566 during the year ended June 30, continuing a downward trend first noted during the preceding 12 months.

Director John L. Farley of the Fish and Wildlife Service said sales fell 89,864 below the 2,271,430 reported by the Post Office Department for 1953-54. They compared with a record 2,296,628 stamps sold during 1952-53.

California reported the largest sale last year, at 176,881 stamps. Then in order came: Texas 151,831; Minnesota 143,886; Michigan 129,937; Wisconsin 127,258; and Illinois 110,507. Sales in other states were under the 100,000 mark.

Pro Standing Due For Trabert

LOS ANGELES — Amateur tennis champion Tony Trabert is expected to turn professional today.

Promoter Jack Kramer said the signing awaits only completion of attorneys' studies of the fine print in the contract and "I don't expect anything to hold up the deal."

Kramer expects not only to bring Trabert, the U.S. and Wimbledon champion, into the pro ranks but also the Australian Davis Cup ace, Lewis Hoad and Ken Rosewall. Soaring this trio, rated as the world's three best amateurs, would constitute the biggest pro tennis raid in history on the simon pures.

Oregon State Squad Crippled By Injuries

CORVALLIS — The Oregon State College football team was back home Monday, badly crippled after its 38-0 loss to powerful UCLA at Los Angeles Friday night.

Six men were hurt: Halfbacks Joe Francis and Ray Westfall, tackles Howard Buettgenbach and John Witte, end Norm Thiel and guard John Sniffen.

Thiel, with a badly sprained ankle, seemed to have the worst injury.

It was not known immediately how many of the six would be able to play next Saturday night against College of Pacific at Stockton, O.P., which polished off Idaho, 20-0. Saturday, is expected to be a tough foe. Assistant coaches Bob Zelinka and Dick Twenck scouted O.P. and reported their findings Monday to Head Coach Tom Prothro.

Ronnie's Second-String State Comes Naturally

SAN FRANCISCO — In case you've been worrying about whether Ronnie Knox will start at tailback for UCLA in its football game with Stanford Saturday, don't. He won't.

"Sam Brown is our first string tailback, regardless of whether Knox is physically able to play," Vic Kelley, Bruins' publicity man, told Northern California football writers Monday.

"He moved Knox out of the starting job on ability alone. He's one of the best tailbacks we've ever had."

As a matter of fact, Kelley added, UCLA is loaded in the line and has the backs to produce "what might be the nation's highest scoring team."

"We are not embarrassed by the many remarks by Ronnie's stepfather, Harvey," Kelley said. "The only Knox we're interested in is the boy. If anyone's embarrassed by the constant talk, it's possibly Ronnie himself."

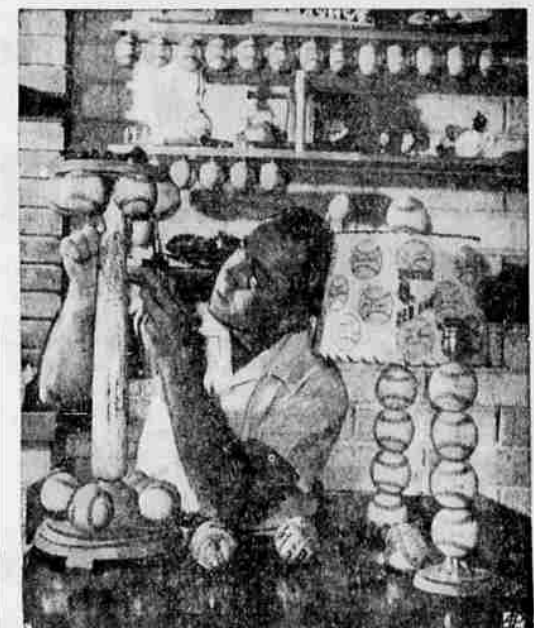
English Boat Racer Due For Speed Test

Sen. Morse Again Demands Action In Car Shortage

WASHINGTON — Sen. Morse Sunday repeated his demand for "remedial action" in Oregon's freight car shortage.

He said in a statement, "The American railroads should realize that as public utilities they should strive to meet the peak demands rather than the minimum requirements of rail freight shippers."

"There are several aspects of the Oregon boxcar shortage that deserve intensive study and quick remedial action by the Interstate Commerce Commission," he said.

"In my opinion there is strong evidence of discrimination against Oregon lumbermen and favoritism of California shippers in the distribution of boxcars."

"The time appears opportune for a re-appraisal of the whole rail freight transportation system. The American railroads should realize that as public utilities they should strive to meet the peak demands rather than the minimum requirements of rail freight shippers."

"From the long range point of view such voluntary action of the railroads could solve the boxcar problem. But if the railroads can not solve the car shortage themselves, Congress, in co-operation with federal and state agencies, should roll up its sleeves and do the job."
