

Canyonville Board Reviews Plans For New Building

Preliminary plans for the new eight-room primary building at Canyonville were viewed at a special meeting of the Canyonville School Board Tuesday night. Bonds for the new building were passed Sept. 29.

The architect, Van Svarverud of Freeman, Hayalp and Tuft, presented the plans to the board. He will bring two finished plans and rough estimates to the next regular meeting Oct. 18.

The site chosen for the new building was the John Hamlin property, according to Virginia Proctor, News-Review correspondent. This site was picked by the board, a five-man advisory committee and the State Board of Education last summer.

The board has various plans for access to the property. This will be discussed at the next meeting of the board.

Atty. George Neuner Jr. will open bids Nov. 15, Mrs. Proctor said.

Two Lost Hunters Found Following Ordeal In Woods

DALLAS, Ore. — Two Salem hunters, near exhaustion after being lost overnight in the woods near here, were found by searchers at dusk Tuesday.

First clue to the missing men's whereabouts was provided by a woman motorist who said she had heard muffled shouts while driving the Falls City-Valsetz highway late Tuesday afternoon.

The woman, whose name was not learned, said she had heard the shouts on the south side of the road. Until then searchers had been concentrating on the north side.

Jack Vann, a state forest department employee, took a crew into the area pointed out by the woman and the two men, Fred Gebhardt, 28, and his companion Bill Zueck, were found preparing to spend another night in the cold rain.

The two men, who became the object of a widespread search when they failed to return Monday night from a hunting trip, told of wandering throughout the night without coats. Zueck had given his companion his shirt at one time in an effort to keep him warm. Zueck's undershirt, as well as the men's other clothing, had been torn by the heavy underbrush.

The two men's wives were in the area when the men were brought out of the woods.

Gebhardt was so weakened by the ordeal that he had to be carried.

Longtime Resident Of Drain Dies Tuesday

William David Cary, resident of Drain for 50 years, died Tuesday at the age of 77, following a long illness.

Bludgeoned Body Thought That Of Eugene Woman

RIVERSIDE, Calif. — A bludgeoned body, found beside a lonely road near here last month, may be that of Mrs. Cecil Allard, 57, a missing Eugene, Ore., woman.

She disappeared while on a trip to California at about the time the body was found by two Marines who had stopped on the road to watch a squirrel. The squirrel led them to the body of the woman, its skull crushed, perhaps by a heavy instrument or by being thrown from a car.

Mrs. Allard's daughter, Mrs. Earl Snook, Milwaukie, Ore., had reported her mother missing.

Robert Presley said there are some similarities in fingerprint classifications and in the dentures of Mrs. Allard and the dead woman. Additional tests are to be made.

Diary, Twisted Plane Wreckage Tell Pilot's Story

EL CENTRO, Calif. — A diary, twisted plane wreckage and the undrinkable waters of the Gulf of California testified Wednesday to the unsuccessful fight for survival of a 21-year-old pilot who crashed in Mexico last Sept. 18.

The Civil Aeronautics Administration said that Clifford Shinn, of Los Angeles, reported that he spotted the body of Aviation Mechanic's Mate 3-C William E. Falls, 21, near his smashed small plane.

The Air Force and Coast Guard had conducted a four-day search for Falls. He was reported flying from Brown Navy Field near San Diego to visit his parents in Phoenix.

D. W. Crisp, a CAA official here, said Shinn found a diary at the scene that indicated Falls was unhurt in the crash about 35 miles south of San Felipe.

Crisp said Falls apparently died 10 days later from thirst, starvation and drinking the salty waters of the gulf. Crisp said Shinn turned the diary over to Mexican authorities after reading a story that went like this:

"After the crash Falls surveyed the arid, deserted country bordering the gulf. There was no water nor food. Several times he saw search planes flying over head.

Once, in desperation, he tried to burn the plane's propeller as a signal fire. But it was fireproof.

On the tenth day Falls wrote: 'Today I drank salt water.' The last entry was two days later.

Star Farmer, 15, Operates \$46,000 Farm Business

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Joe Moore, who works a 15-hour day, is only 23 years old but he operates a \$46,000 business.

Tuesday night Moore was named the 1955 Star Farmer of America, the most coveted award among farm youth of the nation. The presentation of the award and a check for \$1,000 is annually the highlight of the Future Farmers of America convention.

Moore runs a 505-acre farm in a hilly section of central Tennessee near Granville. He owns 85 acres and rents the rest. He raises registered cattle, hogs, sheep, hacco, small grains, corn and hay.

His parents gave him a jersey cow when he was eight years old and that gave him his start in farming.

He plans to use the \$1,000 to pay off some loans.

"I'm not so far in debt that I could be tripped," Joe said, "but I want to get those debts paid off. It makes you feel free. But I think a little debt is good for a man. It keeps a man working."

Three regional Star Farmer winners also were named. They are: Lynn Lovell, 20, Ashton, Idaho; Richard K. Arnold, 21, Paul, Mich.; and Ross Edward Smith Jr., 22, Monkton, Md. Each received \$500.

Bus Operators Defy Order For Return To Work

ST. LOUIS, Mo. — Striking AFL bus and streetcar operators loudly and overwhelmingly shouted their refusal Wednesday to end their day-long transit walkout here.

The vote was by voice, not ballots. Union leaders had urged the men to return to their jobs and abide by a state law under which the utility was seized Tuesday, eight hours after the strike began, on orders of Gov. Phil M. Donnelly.

Reporters, allowed in the session at one stage, said only four members stood up when leaders asked who wanted to go back to work. The four were loudly booed.

The union leaders had notified Gov. Donnelly Tuesday night they would urge members to return to their jobs, but under protest. They said then they didn't know what the reaction of the operators would be.

Newspaper Says Harriman Will Announce Candidacy

NEW YORK — The New York Journal-American said Wednesday New York Gov. Averell Harriman will announce his candidacy for the Democratic presidential nomination at a \$100-a-plate dinner here.

Date for the dinner will be set soon, the report said. Adlai E. Stevenson, the party's standard bearer in 1952, is expected to announce his candidacy at a Democratic dinner in Chicago Nov. 19.

Snack Bar Restaurant Sold To Langlois Pair

Sale of the Snack Bar, 310 N. Jackson St., was announced today by the former owner, Edward J. Kalivoda.

The new owners are Mr. and Mrs. Arthur E. K. K. formerly in the restaurant business in Langlois. They contemplate no change of service in the restaurant. Kalivoda said the change in ownership was effective Monday.

Kalivoda had owned the business since April 1949. He said he has no immediate plans for the future.

Prosecutor Shot To Death By Ex-Mental Patient

ASHDOWN, Ark. — Prosecutor R. Coker Thomas, 48, was shot to death in front of the Little River County Jail here last night, and a former mental patient whom Thomas was sending to jail was arrested on an open charge.

Sheriff Aubrey Thrash said a murder charge would be filed against 67-year-old Spence Furlow, who lived alone on a small farm three miles outside this small southwest Arkansas town.

Townsend's Visits Arouses Rumors About Statement

LONDON — RAF Group Capt. Peter Townsend returned to England Wednesday amid increasing speculation that a statement soon will settle whether he is to marry Princess Margaret.

He arrived for almost a month's vacation from his job as British air attaché in Belgium.

"Do you intend to see Princess Margaret?" he was asked.

"I am not answering questions like that," he responded. He made the same answer when a reporter asked if he expected a "startling announcement to be made in the next week or two."

Princess Margaret is due in London Thursday from Scotland. The pretty sister of Queen Elizabeth II has not met Townsend publicly for three years but rumors of their romance will not die down.

Outside the inner circle, nobody knows if a decision is coming.

Jazz Loving Clergyman Shares TV Quiz Honors

NEW YORK — A jazz-loving clergyman shared the spotlight on The \$94,000 Question CBS television and radio show last night as time limitations nudged out a baseball expert for another week.

The Rev. Alvin Kershaw, rector of the Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Oxford, Ohio, won \$8,000 in his chosen category of jazz, which he has been studying for a number of years.

He had advanced through \$128 last week when time ran out. Last night he advanced through a number of questions some of which required the playing of records and consumed considerable time.

On the \$8,000 question he identified a 1925 recording as "St. Louis Blues," composed by W. C. Handy, sung by Hattie Smith, with Louis Armstrong as trumpet accompanist.

The Rev. Mr. Kershaw, 35, will appear on the program next Tuesday night to announce whether he will take his \$8,000 or try the \$16,000 question.

The girl's father signed the complaint. He said Marsh didn't get home with his daughter until 9 a.m. Tuesday. The boy said he picked up the girl about 10 p.m. Monday.

In district court today, Marsh waived preliminary hearing and was held to answer to the charge in circuit court. Bail was set at \$1,000 by Dist. Judge Warren A. Woodruff.

Rotary Club To Hear University Professor

Dr. Kenneth S. Ghent, associate professor of mathematics at the University of Oregon, and the school's foreign student advisor, will be guest speaker at the Thursday noon meeting of the Roseburg Rotary Club.

He will discuss the international relations aspect of educational opportunities available to young people.

Program Chairman Clifford Norris said the Oregon District of Rotary would select the 1955 recipient of a Rotary Foundation Fellowship. The award provides the winner with an expense-free year of study in any foreign country he selects.

Norris said the only prerequisite requires the recipient know the language of the country in which he studies.

Film Stars Purchase No. California Ranch

KLAMATH FALLS — Film stars Kirk Douglas, Doris Day and Gordon MacRae have purchased part of a huge northern California cattle ranch, its owners reported Tuesday.

Also buying part of the ranch was Texas oilman George Darnelle. Warren and Roy Farnam, who operate the 13,160-acre ranch, reported the sale.

The new owners plan to build summer homes and participate in building up the cattle herd, the Farnams said. The ranch has a lake which provides excellent waterfowl hunting.

Roseburg School Board Slates Meeting Thursday

Roseburg's District 4 school board members will hold their monthly meeting Thursday night at 8 in Supt. M. C. Deller's office in Central Junior High School.

Agenda items set for discussion include: A report on repairs now being made to the Roseburg High School gym; selection of paint colors for Hurst School; discussion of a revised elementary athletic program recently set up by the state board of higher education and a report from buildings and grounds Supt. Guy Davis.

Deller stressed again the board's hope that as many residents in the district as could would sit in on the meeting to learn about school matters.

Some Residents Oppose Inclusion Within Green Sanitary District

Proposed plans for effecting a sanitary district at Green were presented at a board meeting this week at Green School. Authorization for such a district was given last month in a vote by residents.

At the meeting, opposition to inclusion in the district was expressed by some residents of the western part of the district. A petition of 52 names was presented to the board by attorney William D. Green, representing those people, a minority of residents.

The board accepted the petition, but Edward M. Murphy, attorney for the district, pointed out that the law does not provide for a portion of the district to withdraw from it.

The only way it could be accomplished, he said, is to dissolve the district and organize a new one. An area can be annexed, Murphy said, but can't be "de-annexed." At last month's election, the present district was approved by a substantial majority.

On hand to give estimates of costs, values of sanitation improvements and methods of activating the district were Archie Rice of Cornell, Howland, Hayes & Merryfield, Corvallis engineering firm; Claude Baker, senior county sanitarian; and Clarence Landis, of North Roseburg Sanitary District, who was instrumental in establishment of that district.

Rice explained that expense is prohibitive for a small group to build its own disposal plant at a later date when the state might require they have adequate sewage facilities.

Toppled Dictator May Be Exiled To Ranch In Paraguay

ASUNCION, Paraguay — Authoritative sources said Wednesday Juan D. Peron, Argentina's toppled dictator, would be interned on a ranch in interior Paraguay. This would meet demands by the new Buenos Aires government, which accused Peron of making political statements in exile.

The informants said Peron probably will be sent to a ranch near the town of Villarica, 165 miles southeast of Asuncion. This would get him away from the capital, which is just across the Paraguay River from Argentina. The Argentines are afraid his present proximity to them will inspire diehard Peronists to make trouble for the regime headed by Provisional President Eduardo Lonardi.

Argentina complaints of Peron's conduct in exile stemmed from his remarks last week to a newspaper that he still considered himself constitutional president of Argentina, despite his overthrow in the revolt last month.

Peron also was quoted as saying the Peronistas would win at least 70 percent of the votes if an election were held in Argentina now. Since then, Peron has been quoted as telling Bob Meyers of the National Broadcasting Co. that the provision Argentine government is only transitory and will have no effect. Sources at the foreign office in Buenos Aires were reported to have said they would "not dignify" these latest remarks by lodging another complaint with Paraguay.

Sutherland Resident, Issac Wesley Lyon, Succumbs Tuesday

Issac Wesley Lyon, 77, died at a Roseburg hospital Tuesday. He was born Sept. 7, 1878, at Augusta, Iowa. He came to Oregon about 10 years ago, and has been engaged in farming near Winchester until his retirement five years ago when he moved to Sutherland.

Survivors include his wife, Evelyn, Sutherland; two daughters, Mrs. M. J. Cloud, Sutherland, and Mrs. Jessie Roofner, Dowdy, Ark.; two sons, Fred Lyon, Troup, Texas, and Arlie McNutt, Rydewood, Wash.; 15 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.

The body has been removed to Stearns and Little Mortuary. Funeral arrangements are pending.

Canyonville Prune Dryer Saved By Fire Fighters

Prompt work by members of three fire fighting groups has been credited with saving the Ravenswood ranch prune dryer, according to owner E. E. Church, Canyonville.

Church said the agencies, the Canyonville Volunteer Fire Dept., the Riddle Volunteer Fire Dept., and a Douglas Forest Protective Assn. crew, saved the dryer Saturday.

Correspondent Virginia Proctor said the fire started in one of the dryer tunnels as the last load of prunes was being dried. It spread rapidly. Firemen and neighbors had the blaze extinguished before it destroyed the structure. Mrs. Proctor said an aluminum roof on the building helped prevent further destruction.

No estimate is available on the damage, but the loss was covered by insurance, Mrs. Proctor said.
