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Automobile Production To Hit High Mark Soon

DETROIT — Passenger car production, near the year's lowest point, will swing back to near record levels within the next couple of weeks.

The industry has built the last of the 1955 models. General Motors is pushing its changeover to 1956 models; Ford and Chrysler having completed the transition are stepping up their volume. By Nov. 1 all the car makers will be well under way with the year's big final push for a new production record.

Indications are increasing that the factories will hit right on the nose the predicted eight million car assembly total for 1955. More than six million cars already have been built this year. The October program calls for some 532,000 assemblies. November and December projections total almost 1 1/2 million.

Fire Prevention Week Underway; Hazards Listed

Fifty-three persons lost their lives in Oregon fires last year and property damage—excluding forest fires—totalled a staggering \$10 million which included only those properties covered by insurance.

The reminder that fire struck nearly 12,000 Oregon homes in 1954 comes during National Fire Prevention Week. October 9 to 15, from Oregon State College forestry specialist Charles Ross who heads the OSC extension service fire prevention program.

Making a seasonal comparison between hazards of fire and hunting, the specialist noted that the number of riflemen who took to Oregon woods this month far exceeded all combatants at the Battle of Gettysburg. "Yet, about five times as many persons die from fires in Oregon as from hunting accidents."

Matches and careless smoking habits again topped the list of causes for home fires. Second among causes were overheated or defective stoves, furnaces, chimneys and flues.

One hazardous practice alone—use of kerosene to quicken fires—takes as many lives in the state as do hunting accidents, Ross reports. Fires started by electricity, defective wiring and appliances were also in the big class.

Fire losses are consistently higher in rural areas than in towns. Fire Prevention Week, says

Ross, should be a special reminder for rural home owners to check over the tools they have to fight a beginning fire.

An encouraging note, the specialist says, was a \$500,000 decrease in fire damage to homes between 1953 and 1954. Fire deaths were the same for the two years, but were down sharply from 1951 and 1952.

Ross called attention to a new kind of help Oregon families are receiving in preventing fires. Some local fire departments now send firemen to homes for voluntary inspection for fire hazards. Last year such service was offered in 81 Oregon cities, towns and rural fire prevention districts.

Dirt Road Logging Operations Said About At An End

CORVALLIS — Dirt road logging operations may be about at an end. Rain this weekend, following on that which has just fallen, could well mean seasonal closure for many, the Oregon State College farm forest report said Tuesday.

At the close of last week long No. 2 sawlogs, second growth fir, were mostly \$50 to \$55 a thousand at Willamette Valley mills. Long camp-run logs were mostly \$42.50-\$45 in the central valley and up to \$55 at the north and south ends.

In Douglas County, long camp run logs were mostly over \$50, up to \$54. No. 2 second growth sawlogs were \$38 to \$54 with No. 2 old growth \$57.50.

At Coos Bay, No. 2 third-growth were generally \$36 to \$38. Short logs were discounted \$2.

Forty-five foot barkie poles brought 7 to 23 cents a lineal foot, depending on diameter, at Willamette Valley pole yards. A Washington County buyer has started taking peeled poles of 55 feet and longer at 40 cents a lineal foot. At Coos Bay, peeled poles 25 to 75 feet brought 17 to 32 cents.

Douglas fir seed cones at Salem brought \$4.50 a sack. Sword fern was 12 cents a bunch and dry cascara bark 15 cents a pound.

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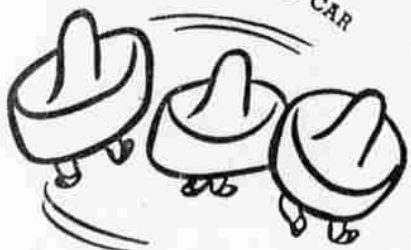
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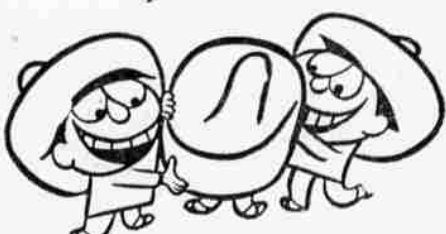

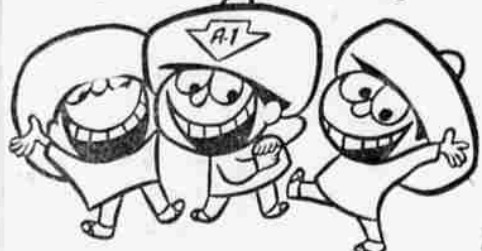
