A Roseburg educator is one of the authors of the new 278-page report on "Reading For Today's Children" which has been published by the Department of Elementary School Principals of the National Education Assn.

He is Roy E. Crain, principal of Riverside School. His four-page contribution is titled "A Home-centered Reading Program." It concerns a program at Riverside in which five-year-old children in the school area were given opportunity to become familiar with school material.

The program originated from a PTA meeting. In a rotating library program, books were taken to the pre-schoolers for their parents to read to the youngsters. With the books, the parents were given informative letter-type bulletins.

Crain commented in his article that a comparison of first grade reading abilities the following fall showed that the "group of children who had had the home-readiness experiences made the higher average score."
