

Stanford Remembers 72-0 Rout In Drills For UCLA

The Stanford Indians, very mindful of their 72-0 clobbering by UCLA last year, are working hard to prevent anything like that in their Pacific Coast Conference thriller on Saturday.

And they're concentrating as heavily on stopping the Uclans' vaunted tailback, Ronnie Knox, as they did on Hopalong Cassidy, Ohio State's All-America, whom they successfully bottled up.

Knox, nursing a sore shoulder, took part Tuesday in only a short punting drill as his teammates first string tailback spot and Coach went through a two-hour workout. Sam Brown won back the Bears' Sanders had Brown and end Johnny Hermann practicing conversions for the big college football game of the week at Palo Alto. Two years ago, Stanford spilled UCLA by a conversion, 21-20.

Chukar Population Grows In Eastern Oregon Areas

Two sight records during 1954 and a substantial release in 1955 in Deschutes County brought the total to 17 counties in which chukar partridge are known to occur.

Since 1951, a total of 43,110 chukars have been released in suitable habitat throughout eastern Oregon. The 1955 liberations amounted to 11,501 birds, 5,949 of which were adult birds.

The heaviest known populations are to be found in areas along the Deschutes River canyon where several flocks of 150 or more have been reported. Other good populations of chukars can be found in the John Day country, especially the north fork, the Malheur and Owyhee rivers, Hart Mountain and Abert Rim. It appears that the birds have become established in portions of these areas but not to be considered as particularly abundant in any one locality.

A total of 29 complete broods was recorded during the summer of 1954. These contained a total of 528 chicks of an average of 11.3 chicks per brood.

Hydroplane Racer Arrives In Nevada

LAS VEGAS, Nev. — Britisher Donald Campbell Wednesday planned to inspect the "Bluebird II", the hydroplane in which he hopes to better this weekend the water record of 202.34 miles an hour he set last summer.

Campbell, 34, who arrived by air Tuesday night, said he probably will make his first trial runs on the 7-mile Lake Mead course Thursday. If all goes well he will shoot for the record Sunday.

Campbell branded as a "newspaperman's myth" the description of the "water barrier." Campbell said there is no truth in the report that at speeds in excess of 200 miles an hour a boat is pounded apart before it can resume level motion.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Who is going to win the 1956 Olympic Games at Melbourne, the United States or Russia?

American sports fans find that question a good topic for spirited debate. But members of the International Olympic Committee find it a tiresome thing, a danger to their cherished ideals of Olympic competition.

With physical arrangements for the Melbourne games nearing completion, the men behind the Olympics are turning their attention more and more to the fierce nationalism that spawns the question and keeps it alive.

"The Olympic Games are contests between individuals," presidential Avery Brundage of the international committee said Wednesday. "They are not contests between nations to decide the superiority of one nation over another, or of one political system over another."

Reporters Hear Plea

Brundage and Lewis Lutton, chairman of the organizing committee for next year's games, pleaded with newsmen to do what they could to abolish—or at least minimize—the use of any unofficial point system to determine the leading teams in Olympic competition.

Lutton said point systems were ridiculous. "How," he asked, "can you balance a gold medal won by tiny Luxembourg against a gold medal won by the United States? How can you balance a gold medal won in the marathon against a gold medal for being a member of the championship gymnastics team?"

Lutton said everything possible was being done in Australia to give what he called "true meaning" to the Olympics. There will be just one Olympic Village, and competitors from both sides of the Iron Curtain will be encouraged to mix freely.

Canadian Football Teams Racked By Player Trouble

CALGARY (AP) — Trouble rocked Canadian pro football Wednesday—the Calgary Stampeders are sure they lost a game because a player was tipped off the opposition, and the Ottawa Rough Riders are shaking up their roster after fining 20 players \$200 each for sub-par performances.

The Stampeders, who Tuesday fired guard Dean Bandiera after accusing him of revealing their plays to the Winnipeg Blue Bombers, were reported considering a request to Western Interprovincial Football Union officials for a replay of last Saturday's game. The Bombers won it, 13-12.

It seemed unlikely such a request would be honored, however, League President Jack Rowland already has commented he didn't "think it really mattered much because Winnipeg probably already knew the Calgary plays anyway."

Bandiera denied the charge. "I'm innocent of everything they accused me of," he said. "Just because I happen to be friendly with a certain player on the Winnipeg team, they accuse me of divulging plays."

There was no comment from the Winnipeg club owners or players on the matter.

The Ottawa players were fined \$100 for each of the last two games. The club announcement said the fines were imposed "for failure to exhibit the caliber of football of which the players are capable."

The announcement added "immediate steps are being taken to secure replacements in an endeavor to strengthen the team."

The Big Four club did not identify the players or reveal how many American imports were involved.

The Rough Riders were whipped 35-7 and 43-6 in two weekend games with Montreal. The team record is 2-6 this season.
