WASHINGTON — A House investigation of Eisenhower Administration power policies continued Wednesday after a turbulent session marked by Democratic charges of "fraud" and "bad faith" and hot denials by an Interior Department official.

Mexican Painter Will Undergo Cancer Surgery

MOSCOW — Mexican painter Diego Rivera, who came to Moscow more than a month ago seeking treatment for cancer, will undergo an operation Thursday.

"I had to choose between the operation and the crematorium," he said Tuesday at Moscow's Botkin Hospital.

Rivera praised the treatment he had received for skin cancer so far. It has consisted of five days of complete rest, followed by 10 days of radioactive cobalt bombardment, then another five days of rest. This treatment will continue after the operation, he said.

Guided Missile Cruiser To Join Fleet November 1

WASHINGTON — The first of two cruisers to be converted into seagoing bases for launching guided missiles will join the fleet Nov. 1 at the Philadelphia Navy Yard.

The Navy said Tuesday the cruiser Boston will be recommissioned then as "the world's first guided missile cruiser." After two years' work, the Boston has been rebuilt and refitted to launch Terrier anti-aircraft missiles.

Her sister ship, the Canberra, is scheduled to be ready next spring after similar conversion work.

Official sources say the Terrier has a range of slightly over 15 miles and can climb to 50,000 feet at about twice the speed of sound.
