Man Packs Deer Eight Blocks In City Center To Win Bet

"I knew I had it whipped when I made Cass!" Speaker Clarence Mabley, 56, was slightly exhausted when he made the comment Thursday afternoon, after he'd packed a near 200-pound deer eight blocks in downtown Roseburg to win a bet. The Roseburg resident, who weighed less than his deer pack, attracted considerable attention during his feat. Traffic halted along Stephens Street to watch him grapple with the animal. The Monogram Cigar Store, 225 N. Jackson St. Mabley had started from the store, walked with the deer adorning his back to a block past Stephens on Cass, and then headed back. As he neared the back door of the cigar store, he had picked up an entourage of several well-wishers.

He was paced all the way by the shooter of the deer Bobby Soffer. Soffer downed the eight-point buck earlier Wednesday on Butlers Butte above Miller. As Mabley deposited the animal in the rear seat of a car parked behind the store, some 10 men of feral comments and cheers from the rear of the building. Soon a group of men, about 50, had gathered.

(3) Junior high school tackle football should be a part of the program in District 4 and football cleats should be part of the equipment.

(4) Spikes in track should be a part of the equipment for seventh and eighth grades.

(5) Parts of those standards are contradictory and unworkable with out serious modification to fit local conditions and that in a district where 65 per cent of the pupils are transported, a strictly intramural program does not meet the needs of the district.

Supt. Deller said he believed every school district should meet out its own needs because each situation differs. He plans to meet with the executive board of the Douglas County Medical Assn. to learn its opinion regarding the athletic program. Similarly, he will contact parents and PTA groups.

Board member Dudley Walton termed the directive "obnoxious." He opined that it was another step towards taking local control from school boards and relegating them to a position of being only a group concerned with raising money to meet new state standards. He termed standards as "creeping" and "unworkable" with many other items of business. (See story Page 2)

Richard S. Hutton, 80, Former Resident, Dies

Richard S. Hutton, 80, resident of Roseburg since 1909, died this morning at Good Samaritan hospital in Corvallis as the result of a heart ailment. He was born July 22, 1875, in Ramsey, Ind., and was married to Mrs. Fileen Hutton in Garnett, Colo. July 1909. Mrs. Hutton died in Roseburg in 1910. They moved to Roseburg in 1908 and purchased a large ranch in Garden Valley. Mr. Hutton was never in the heart attack last March and was hospitalized here for many weeks. In July he went to Corvallis to be with his son, Burton Hutton, and family.

Survivors include the son, Burton Hutton, Corvallis, one grand-daughter, Katherine Hutton, Oswego, and a brother, W. T. Hutton, Orlando, Fla.

Roseburg Funeral Home will be in charge of funeral arrangements, which will be announced later.

Microwave Relay Antennae To Boost Television Uses

Four huge microwave relay antennae thrust their shapes some 4,800 feet into the sky for the first time Saturday at King Mountain, about 80 miles southeast of Roseburg.

First of their type in the Pacific northwest, the 22-foot tall antennae were placed atop a sturdy 37-foot structural steel tower, part of Pacific Telephone Company's new television relay station being built on the 4,800-foot high mountain.

A similar station is under construction on Mt. Nebo, ridge near Roseburg, according to local manager Jack McGuire.

Both stations will be linked in a high quality transmission system to provide microwave channels for three network television programs, plus a standby channel for emergency use. The new system will be used to carry hundreds of telephone conversations, in addition to TV.

Nine such stations are now under construction. They will fit into a network stretching from Portland to the San Francisco Bay area.

When the system is placed in service Aug. 1, 1956, the present coaxial cable will be used to boost existing long distance telephone facilities.

Work at both locations near Roseburg is going along about as planned, according to R. Patrick Sweeney of Portland, telephone company coordinator for Oregon's part of the new system.

Erection of a steel tower—the same height as the one at King Mountain—was scheduled to get under way this week at Mt. Nebo. Antennae are slated to be installed at Nebo early in February.

Erection of the cornucopia-shaped antennae at King Mountain was under supervision of Sweeney and George Amstein, district construction superintendent for the phone company from Eugene.

A mobile crane with a 65-foot boom, owned by Flegel Transfer and Storage Co., and operated by Rex Quinten, 240 Sweetbrier Ave., Roseburg, was used to lift the antennae atop the tower where they were hoisted by cables—each weighs a ton—was accomplished without mishap, weather conditions were not ideal. Winds on the lonely mountain top blew in gusts of 50 miles an hour.

Winds, sometimes blowing at estimated strength of 70 miles an hour, and driving rain showers have several times put a stop to construction work, according to Lew Weston of Salem, construction foreman for the Malarkey and Moore Co., contractors on the job.

The towers, however, have been built to withstand 150-mile-an-hour winds and extreme icing conditions.

CDUF Reaches 18 Per Cent Of Campaign Goal

A report released Wednesday by Central Douglas United Fund campaign Chairman James Richmond reveals that receipts have reached 18 per cent of the \$32,289 UF goal. Richmond said the figure was \$9,333.

"Coverage has been slow," stated Richmond, who added that the workers have been soliciting but that collection in many cases have not been completed and turned in to the CDUF office at the Hotel Umpqua for processing and banking. He expressed hope that workers would bolster receipts considerably by the weekend by turning in what collections they have made to that time.

The section and division chairmen met Wednesday morning and numerous favorable reports were given. Richmond said, "However, it is our policy not to make a public report of total receipts covering anything other than cash deposited in the bank," commented Richmond. He urged that all workers complete their solicitations at the earliest possible date and turn in their collections at the UF office.

Board Awards Hucrest School Work Contract

The Coast Construction Co., Roseburg, was awarded a contract to provide the filter bed, sewer and manholes at Hucrest School by Roseburg School Board members Wednesday.

The company's low bid of \$10,018.45 won out over bids entered by J. R. McCallister and W. R. Casebeer, both of Roseburg.

A lengthy list of minor business items confront the board.

It authorized Supt. M. C. Deller to continue the present administrative policy concerning granting of excuses for outside activity during school hours. The Superintendent says school policy does not allow this, and that state policy states youngsters must spend a required length of time in school.

The board learned that a reversal of the state department of education's policy states that teachers are entitled to sick leave, starting with the first day of school. This has been the local policy.

The board heard several reports. Supt. Deller noted that enrollment in district schools Sept. 30 was 5,217, and the end was not in sight. He added the board should reach a decision in the next few months concerning need for school sites and additions to several elementary schools. He said the Roseburg High School gymnasium floor was being put into shape with a mechanical draft.

In a new policy of familiarizing board members with school programs, special education Director Dick Gates talked for several minutes about the district's reading program.

Another report from Guy Davis, superintendent of buildings and grounds, concerned possible purchase of building materials suitable for school construction.

Clerk of the works George White announced that construction on Hucrest School and the Joseph Lane Addition was continuing on schedule.

The board also okayed changes in construction at Joseph Lane which would insure a one hour fire protection; approved recommendation that principals and teachers select inside colors at Hucrest and Joseph Lane "within specifications"; and learned the high school made a net profit of \$174.69 from the student book exchange.

Members Wayne Crooch and Bob Bashford and Guy Davis were authorized to inspect a possible 20-acre school site near Newton Creek. The board moved to provide a meeting place for the PTA's County Council each month, voted to attend a county school board association meeting in Myrtle Creek Oct. 31; authorized purchase of gravel for the Green School grounds and named Dudley Walton and Harold Hoyt as those to attend a school building conference in Eugene Oct. 27-29.

The school board accepted an invitation from Central Junior High PTA to hold its next regular meeting with the parent-teacher group. Board policy limits such meetings to one each year.

a gesture to Murphy, the 109-man Iowa delegation voted against the resolution to take this country out of UNESCO.

"I'm sorry to see them (the Legion) get into politics," Truman said. "They had no business doing so. There's a bunch of new fellows in charge. They haven't read the (Legion) constitution. But they're nice fellows, and they'll get over it soon."

Opposition to the UNESCO resolution was rapid and futile. Withdrawal of the United States from the organization would take some of this country's outstanding educational and scientific talent from UNESCO. Forty government representatives would remain, but 60 delegates of national organizations would withdraw.

The Legionnaires also called for 8,000 rescue teams formed, trained and equipped for use in civil defense.

He was born at Dunker, Sweden, Aug. 17, 1887. He came to this country in May, 1922, and had lived in the Sutherlin area for about seven years. He leaves no known survivors.

A son was with him when he died. He observed his 83rd birthday by parachuting 2,500 feet into the Hudson River.

While in his early 80s, he still piloted his own plane and enjoyed fast games of tennis. He spurned medicines, whisky, tobacco and white bread, and avoided doctors.

It was his regular habit to go without food for one day a week, frequently fasting as long as two weeks but drinking a lot of water during these periods.

His first and second marriages, to Marguerite Kelly and Mary Williamson, respectively, ended in divorce. He was estranged from his third and last wife, Mrs. Jonnie Lee.

Macfadden came to New Jersey, where he lived in a modest Jersey City hotel, when a New York court held him in contempt for failure to pay alimony and court fees to his third wife.

A public relations man said his estate would be less than \$5,000. Funeral services will be held Saturday in New York City.

Tacoma Man Stricken, Dies Of Heart Attack

Roy James Carson, 62, Tacoma, dropped dead of a heart attack this morning here, according to Coroner L. L. Powers.
