The lens is the camera's most important single component, and on it rests many of the advantages—or limitations—the camera has to offer.

The most inexpensive cameras incorporate a single element lens that differs little from a spectacle lens. However, it has six major defects, known as aberrations, which make it unsatisfactory for limited snapshot use only.

The most common known of these aberrations is astigmatism, a defect that prevents either horizontal or vertical lines from being properly focused near the edges of the picture. The astigmatism (meaning without astigmatism) lens is designed to minimize this fault. The title "astigmatism" is popular on many lenses, and to some people it denotes one that is corrected for all defects. This is not necessarily true, as the name implies the correction of one aberration only.

Most of the remaining aberrations also affect sharpness. One prevents light rays of different colors from being focused on the film together—a defect that must be overcome in critical color work. Other defects prevent sharp focusing of the entire image, of the center portion, or of the edges. Aberrations are corrected only by carefully designed lenses with several elements consisting of combinations of various optical glasses. The degree of correction determines quality and final cost.

MEDFORD (AP) — Plans for a multi-million dollar Methodist retirement home in this area were disclosed Thursday.

Rogue Valley Methodist Home, Inc., is undertaking the development, similar to Willamette View Manor, established recently near Milwaukie south of Portland. The site will be chosen later.

Clyde W. Mummary, organizer and administrator, and the board of trustees discussed tentative plans Wednesday night. They said the home will accommodate a minimum of 200 persons at the start and will be expanded later.

Apartments in the luxurious hotel-type building will be sold outright with lifetime care furnished at an amount estimated at \$100 a month per person.

President of the corporation, to be affiliated with the National Assn. of Methodist Hospitals and Homes, is M. N. Hogan, Medford stockbroker. The Rev. Meredith Groves, Eugene, district superintendent of the Methodist Church, is vice chairman.

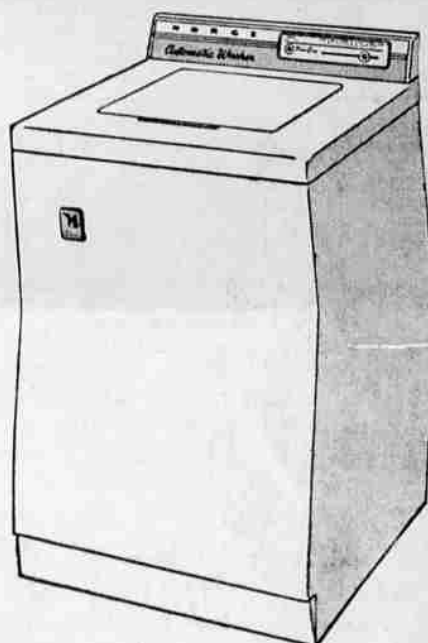
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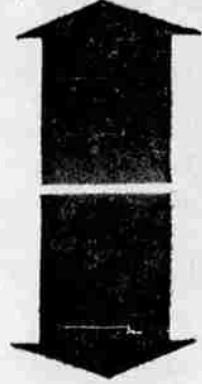

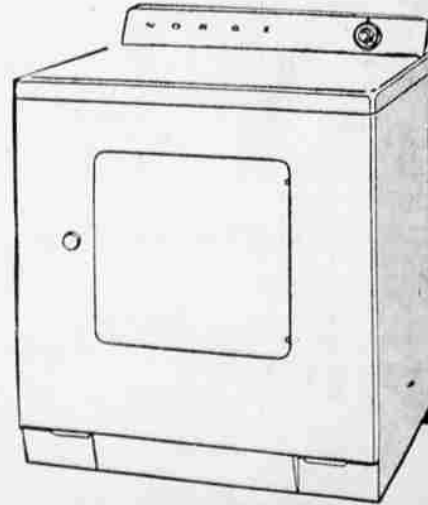
