Illinois High School Busy Moving Football — CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (AP) — Champaign's high school football team scored five touchdowns in six plays in the third quarter in its game with Danville Thursday night.

The touchdown parade started when halfback Bill Ohls returned Danville's kickoff opening the third quarter 91 yards. Then followed touchdowns on 43 and 46 yard passes, a 50 yard sprint around end and a romp of 32 yards on an off tackle play.

The final score was Champaign 35, Danville 0.

Hoosier Football Drills Broken Up By Big Rally

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP) — Indiana University's football Hoosiers missed part of their practice session Thursday, but they got a big morale boost to replace it.

Five thousand students, needed by newspaper criticism of their school spirit, poured onto the field in an unscheduled pep rally and broke up practice with a noisy demonstration of support for the winless Hoosiers.

Crews who were reluctant to attend were dragged from their dormitories and sorority houses by men students. Dormitories and houses postponed their evening meals an hour as the rally roared on.

Floyd Patterson Kayoes Opponent In 1st Round

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Floyd Patterson's Southern California debut was one of the shortest and most impressive on record. The Brooklyn light heavyweight knocked out Calvin Brad, Los Angeles, in 2:58 of the first round Thursday night.

The No. 1 contender for Archie Moore's crown and not yet 21, Patterson impressed local boxing experts with an assortment of left hooks and right crosses that put Brad down for a count of eight after about a minute.

The final punch, a right to the jaw, sent Brad pitching forward on his face. He was counted out prone.

It was Patterson's 26th win in 27 starts and his 18th knockout. Patterson weighed 175, Brad 174 1/2.

TV HELPS GRIDGERS

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Dr. H. Burr Roney, assistant professor of biology at the University of Houston, says televised educational subjects get many a football player over the classroom hurdle.

Dr. Roney said last year he presented his subject matter in the classroom, then repeated it over the school's TV station. Houston football coaches insisted squad members attend both.

As a result, Dr. Roney said "more football players passed the course than ever before."

Minor Mishaps Stall Try For Hydro Record

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Don Campbell planned a test run Friday in his jet-propelled hydroplane after a slight accident Thursday which he said did not damage the speedboat.

A foot-square section of the plastic cockpit cover blew off and lodged in the engine air intake duct while Campbell was taxiing away from a dock on Lake Mead. He shut off the engines immediately, preventing damage to the air compressor engine blades.

"I'm glad it happened now instead of Sunday at 200 miles an hour," said the 34-year-old British pilot.

He expected to make a test run in the "Bluebird II" at moderate speed Friday and a "dress rehearsal" run Saturday before trying to better his mark of 202.34 miles an hour Sunday over a seven-mile course on Lake Mead. He set the record last summer at Ullswater, England.

Small Colleges Set Conference Action

Two conference games are on tap for Oregon's small colleges this weekend—Willamette traveling to College of Idaho in the Northwest Conference and Eastern Oregon visiting Oregon College of Education in the Oregon Collegiate Conference.

Willamette, one of the favorites in the Northwest loop, is expected to win handily in its game at Caldwell Saturday afternoon.

But the Eastern Oregon-OCE game at Monmouth Saturday night may be close. Eastern Oregon has won two straight in conference play, showing surprising strength. OCE, however, has lost only one conference game in five years.

In non-conference games Portland State will be at Pacific University Saturday night, the Seattle Ramblers will play at Linfield Saturday night. Southern Oregon will travel to Humboldt State Saturday night, and Boise Junior College will visit Oregon Tech Saturday afternoon.

Shooting Of Hunter Held To Be Criminal Act

CLARKSTON, Wash. (AP) — A coroner's jury held Wednesday a Clarkston hunter found shot to death Sunday "died as the result of a criminal act by a person or persons unknown."

Harry Roberts, 35, was fatally wounded while hunting with his stepson, Jerry Lyons, 33, near the Oregon border.

Lyons told the jury he and his stepfather had been drinking heavily and he recalled nothing of the shooting. He said he was still confused when he left the scene Sunday evening and hitchhiked here.

Prosecutor Donald Moore deferred action in the case until Thursday.

HUNTER HAS SYSTEM

CALDWELL, Idaho (AP) — Farmer Dallas Waterman has figured out a way to let his family know that he is safe while he is on big game hunts.

Waterman took eight homing pigeons along on a four-day hunt in the Elk Mountain region. The birds were dispatched home at intervals to let the Waterman family know that the six-man party was safe and well, but encountered no elk.

Court To Decide Insurance Benefit

PORTLAND (AP) — Whether a boy who killed his father with a baseball bat is entitled to collect on his father's life insurance, is up for decision in federal court.

The boy, James Harvey Biswell of Burns, was acquitted on a 1953 indictment, the jury finding him innocent of killing Eldon Biswell by reason of temporary insanity.

Later a court found him to have recovered his sanity.

The boy, now 18 and in the Marine Corps, was principal beneficiary under the father's National Service Life Insurance. His mother, Mabel Biswell, divorced from the father, was contingent beneficiary.

The Veterans Administration Wednesday brought the case into court saying it was ready to pay the \$10,000, but wondered who should get it in view of an Oregon law prohibiting people who kill "feloniously" from being the beneficiary. Whether the acquittal removed that bar is the question the VA wants answered.

Youth Increases Value Of Farm By Practices

KANSAS CITY (AP) — An 18-year-old youth who increased the value of his father's farm by instituting numerous soil saving practices received a Future Farmers of America national achievement award Wednesday night.

Ben Greene of Ripley, W. Va., won the award in soil and water management by draining swamps, developing about 100 acres of contour strips and planting 6,000 young trees. He also improved the soil through the use of fertilizer.

Now he has 56 Hereford cattle on a farm that 12 years ago would not feed 12 cows.

Regional winners in water and soil management included Emory Clapp, 18, Dayton, Wash.

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
