

Additional Polio Vaccine Released

WASHINGTON (AP)—Release of an additional 1,113,930 cubic centimeters—or shots—of Salk polio vaccine for immediate use was announced Friday.

The Public Health Service allocated to the states and territories 617,355 cc's of the new supply for use in public or commercial channels under the voluntary control program.

This was the first allocation under the broadened age priority system announced Wednesday by Secretary of Welfare Folsom. The secretary recommended that states add not more than 5 years to the first priority group which covered children ages 5 through 9.

He said that with the broadening of the priority group, allocations to the states under the voluntary control program would be based on their needs to complete vaccination of children under 15 and pregnant women.

The federal priorities are not binding upon the states but Folsom said they have been followed with some few exceptions to meet local needs. State health departments set state priorities.

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis was allocated \$2,377,500 for its free injections for second and third grade school children. The foundation also will receive 67,197 cc's released but not allocated late last month.

The 617,355 cc's allocated to the states include: Idaho 2,583; Oregon 6,039; and Washington 9,369.

Railroads, Employees Reach Wage Agreement

CHICAGO (AP)—The nation's major railroads and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen Saturday reached an agreement on wage increases.

The settlement banished threats of a strike.

The strike had been approved and key points in the nation's rail network had been awaiting a go-ahead signal from the union.

However, an 18-hour negotiating session led to an agreement announced at 12:45 p.m.

Union spokesmen estimated the agreement amounts to a package settlement worth 17 to 17½ cents an hour.

The brotherhood said the agreement covers 60,000 of its 98,000 members, and 130 class 1 railroads. Wage increases ranging from 21 cents to 33½ cents an hour were granted to yard workers who are on a 40-hour week.

Morse, Neuberger Withhold Comment On Harriman Issue

Oregon's Democratic senators, Wayne Morse and Richard Neuberger, said Friday they didn't want to get involved in the dispute touched off by Democratic Chairman Howard Morgan's criticism of New York Gov. Averell Harriman.

Morse said, "I simply refuse to become involved in any intra-party fight within the Democratic Party. I am a candidate for re-election to the U. S. Senate and intend to devote myself to the issues of my campaign. However, I do wish to make it clear that I am very pleased that Gov. Harriman is coming to Oregon to make a few speeches, and I am sure he will be welcomed to the state by the Democratic Party, and by the people of Oregon of all parties."

Morse added that in his opinion Harriman is "a man with a great record of public service to the American people, and in every office he has held, he has served with distinction, integrity, and a dedication to the welfare of the American people."

Neuberger, who earlier had agreed to introduce Harriman when the New York governor speaks at a Democratic fund raising dinner in Clackamas county in December, said: "I do not believe a member of the Senate who is so vitally concerned with the issues important to the state should be involved in any clash of political personalities."

Morgan, who favors Adlai Stevenson for the Democratic nomination, criticized Harriman's association with Carmine DeSapio, head of New York's Tammany Hall. He said that DeSapio would finance Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn.) in primary battles with Stevenson, hoping these two would be weakened and that the nomination then would go to Harriman.

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Auto Hits Truck; Two Men Injured On North Umpqua

A car driven by James Carl Veden, Idleyrill Route, Roseburg, struck the rear of a logging truck operated by P. E. Gibson, Glade, Friday evening.

The impact sent truck and driver 150 feet down the North Umpqua Highway. Police said, and into a 44-foot ditch, pinning Gibson inside the cab. The accident occurred around 6:30 p.m., one mile west of Webster's Garage.

Gibson, 53, was trapped in the cab for sometime, until removed by employees of Walt's Towing & Ambulance Service. Two children, Wayne Schermerhorn and Hugh Miller, were first to arrive on the scene. They told Glade Correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby that they could not remove Gibson.

They said gasoline had spilled from the truck, making a high fire hazard. A call to the Douglas Forest Protective Assn. office in Roseburg brought a pump truck and crewmen to "stand by."

State police have issued no citations, but said Saturday that Veden was operating at a high rate of speed.

Veden, 24, and Gibson were taken to Douglas Community Hospital. Personnel there said they suffered bruises. They were to be X-rayed Saturday to determine extent of their injuries.

State police said the car, a 1955 model, and the truck were demolished.

Three Convicts Are Acquitted Of Guard's Death

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP)—Three convicts have been acquitted in the first court test of a unique 1886 Nevada law pinning responsibility for deaths during a prison break on the escaping convicts.

A jury of seven men and five women returned a verdict of innocent Friday night for the Nevada State Prison convicts. They were charged in the death of prison guard George Miller, 59, during a prison break last year.

Dist. Atty. Cameron Batjer argued the men had intended to hold Miller as a hostage in order to complete their break. Miller was found hanging out the window of a milk truck in which the men were escaping. He had been killed by a guard's bullet.

The three men were caught within a few hours in nearby hills. They are Theodore Gene Liebie, 21, convicted kidnaper of Cambridge, Minn.; Don Gulovsen, 27, Coos Bay, Ore., forger; and William R. Burman, 25, Chicago robber. They had commandeered the truck as Miller drove by. Tower guards fired at it as they crashed it through the prison gate.

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recover existing values. In harvest, it is stated to take out an equal volume of intermingled green timber, thus making from 800 million to one billion board feet available for cutting as rapidly as it can be processed.

Mills within the area, it is claimed, cannot handle this volume of timber. Land County mills have been seeking access to the salvage area. Their request has been approved by the Western Forest Industries Assn. and the executive committee of the Assn. of Land Grant Counties.

The Douglas County court has insisted that the relaxation of the barrier shall be only for the period of the emergency and shall not extend beyond the time necessary to remove salvage timber.

During the time the matter of the area is under consideration, the Bureau of Land Management also has been preparing recommendations on other policy changes. McKay reports, and the approved changes are included in the policy statement announced today.

Appraisal procedure will be revamped, McKay states, to more clearly reflect market trends. The change will be temporary, as a more efficient appraisal system is under cooperative study by the B.L.M. Bureau of Indian Affairs and U.S. Forest Service. A uniform system is expected to result.

The BLM also is engaged in an inventory of its timber lands, based on current usage. This inventory is expected to show possibility for upping the annual allowable cut to a considerable degree. It had been expected that as much as 100 years would be required to complete the inventory. The new order will direct that the work be finished in three years. During the interim the allowable cut will be arbitrarily increased to 588 million board feet annually, as compared with the present six million board feet maximum. Overcutting will be permitted only in emergency salvage situations, McKay reports.

It is planned, said McKay, to increase access road appropriations from 15 per cent of receipts, as at present, to 25 per cent, and thereby to speed up the access road program. At the same time management procedures will be adopted to improve reforestation practices and secure maximum productivity.

Margaret also probably would renounce her right of succession to the throne. She is now third in line. She already has given up her right to stand as regent should the Queen die before her two children are of age.

Many newspapers gave a quarter of their news space to the princess and Townsend — virtually the only topic of conversation this weekend in British pubs and clubs.

Most papers agreed any final announcement would have to await the reconvening of Parliament Oct. 25, but urged a speedy royal statement to end the suspense.

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Assignment Of Most New Street Addresses Finished

With the assignment of most new address numbers in Roseburg, a job completed this week, most of the street systemization program is done.

Asst. City Engineer Don Robertson said this morning that a few address changes still must be made, but these will be taken care of quickly. Mostly, they are addresses unavoidably overlooked while engineers were marking out the city.

The City Council has renamed most of the streets whose names were confusing or duplicated. Final action remains only on six, and they will be subjected to a public hearing by the council Oct. 24.

Mostly, the holdups in changing names of the six were because of technicalities. Residents are contesting the name of only one street. That is Third Avenue North and First Street in the northeast section of town.

Three residents had petitioned for the name "Phillips Avenue" for the street and the name was included in the ordinance changing all street names.

But, belatedly, four other residents of the streets asked that the name be changed to "Malheur Avenue."

Robertson said city engineers are assigning addresses on the basis of the list below.

The list of changes inside the city follows. Robertson emphasized that prefixes — NE, SE, NW and W. — should be used in all addresses. Those changes scheduled for hearing are designated.

Jury Awards Staggs \$6,836 IN Damages

Geddes contended that the plaintiff and his employer were much more negligent than the defendant company.

There was "extreme and gross negligence" on the part of Staggs, Geddes said, suggesting also that perhaps "Funderburk should be the defendant" in the case.

Geddes pointed out that the powerline was about 35 feet in the air and that the defendant knew the wires used by him to set off the blast would be blown up in the air toward the powerline.

He criticized what he termed poor safety practices of the employees, and especially the action of Staggs at the time of the accident, and he cited the testimony of Lyle Hutson, an experienced explosives man, to back up his contention.

In rebuttal to Geddes' argument, Yates pointed out that it "is apparent California Oregon Power Co. is trying to shift the responsibility." Funderburk was in no way connected with the case and Staggs was using accepted methods, he told the jurors.

Lindye explained that Staggs would lose more than \$90,000 in wages alone during his life expectancy of 36.88 years, leaving only \$15,000 of the amount asked for the "pain and suffering" and fact he would have "to go through life as an outcast."

The defense based its case primarily on contributory negligence on the part of the plaintiff, where the defendant should pay only for the percentage it was negligent, if negligent at all.

SIX PASSENGERS OF BUS KILLED IN CRASH WITH TRUCK

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind. (AP)—A two-decker Greyhound bus, carrying 25 passengers, crashed into the rear of a parked semi-trailer truck early Saturday, killing six persons and injuring 21 others.

The bus driver and six passengers remained in hospitals, some reported in critical condition.

The dead were identified by State Police as four women and two men.

Most of the passengers on the bus, on an express run from Chicago to New York, were believed asleep at the time of the crash, about 12:40 a.m. State Police said.

Harry Williams, 43, the truck driver, said he flashed a flare as a warning to the oncoming bus on U.S. 20, a four-lane highway, about six miles east of Michigan City but the driver apparently did not see it.

Williams said he had halted his truck, loaded with 15,000 pounds of freight, to repair a broken air line and had set out four flares. "After repairing the air line," Williams said, "I went to the rear of the truck to pick up the last flashlight when I saw the bus approaching."

"I kept saying it so the driver would see it."

"I kept thinking, 'My God, isn't he going to turn? Isn't he going to turn?'"

"Then I knew the bus was going 15 to 20 miles an hour and I started running. I got about 20 feet from the truck when the bus hit. I was knocked down by the debris."

Police Capt. Ogden Jarvis of Michigan City, who arrived on the scene shortly after the crash, said the impact of the crash sheared off the right side of the bus from the grill to where the second deck starts, about 10 feet back.

Grand Jurors Indict Swartzs For Abortion

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—After deliberating one minute, a grand jury indicted Rosalie and Milton Schwartz yesterday on charges of performing the abortion that killed chainstore heiress Doris Jean Silver Ostreicher.

The quick decision came after the 22 jurors spent almost all day hearing 13 witnesses in the case. The Schwartzes were charged with abortion causing death and a conspiracy. They were charged separately with perjury.

Most of those who testified had appeared previously as witnesses, either at the inquest into Mrs. Ostreicher's death, or at a hearing for Mrs. Gertrude Silver, mother of the dead 22-year-old socialite beauty.

The mother, who has been charged with being an accessory to her daughter's abortion death, is in the Philadelphia Psychiatric Hospital suffering from bereavement shock. Both her
