Tax Committee Studying Effect On New Industries
Chambers of commerce, business groups, and others interested in taxation are being asked this week by Sen. Rudie Wilhelm, Jr., chairman of the Interim Tax Committee, to supply the committee with names of companies and individuals who built plants or expanded old ones in their areas or constructed their factories elsewhere after studying and Oregon building site.

The request for names is the first step in carrying out that part of the committee's assignment of determining which, if any, of the state and local taxes now in force in the state have an adverse on the location and development of industry and wealth in the state. When the committee receives the names, it will compile a master list which will be the basis of intensive study and examination.

Firms, thus named, will be asked to provide extracts from their materials on the relative importance of the factors which led them to select or reject an Oregon site. Where possible, departments of the state government and affected local governments will be brought in to verify the conclusions made by industry representatives.

The committee hopes, according to Wilhelm, to separate the "fact from fiction" in the oft-repeated charge that Oregon's tax structure is driving business away.

Persons with information regarding companies that have moved from Oregon or failed to locate here are asked to notify their local chamber of commerce.

FPC Is Accused Of 'Out And Out Politics' On Issue
SPOKANE (AP)—The Federal Power Commission Friday was accused of "brazen, out and out politics" in licensing Idaho Power Co. to build three low level dams in the Hells Canyon of the Snake River.

Rep. Gracie Post (D-Idaho) told a meeting of Northwest women Democrats here the FPC acted "cowardly" in issuing the Idaho Power license after Congress had adjourned.

The three Idaho Power dams will flood out the site of a proposed high federal dam, which had been proposed by bills under consideration in the House and Senate when Congress adjourned.

Another speaker, Rep. Edith Green (D-Ore.), said the Democratic Party proved itself the "Party of responsibility" during the last session of Congress.

Democrats, she said, supported President Eisenhower when they agreed with proposals he offered and offered a constructive program of their own when their views were different from those of the chief executive.

The Democrats, she added, disapproved Eisenhower's prediction that they would wage a cold war against his entire program.

Gov. Knight Says Nixon Can't Win
LOS ANGELES (AP)—Republican Gov. Goodwin Knight of California was quoted Thursday as saying he opposed Vice President Nixon as a possible presidential candidate because "I just don't think Dick can win."

Knight, in an interview with the Mirror-News, said also that he does not believe that there was any animosity in his attitude and added that he worked hard for Nixon during the latter's 1950 fight for U.S. senator. Nixon was elected.

The governor reiterated that he plans to lead the potent 70-vote California delegation to the GOP National Convention in San Francisco next August as a nominal "favorite son" even if it means an all-out fight with Nixon.

Knight said he himself took a public opinion poll during two weeks of personal interviews, and in the poll "Dick got murdered."

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
