Ray Froehlich raced 40 yards around left end and quarterback Gary Marlin sneaked to the conversion to give Myrtle Creek Vikings a 7-6 decision over Douglas Trojans at Myrtle Creek in an Umpqua Valley League game Friday night.

The deciding points came after Myrtle Creek had received the second half kickoff. Douglas scored its only touchdown after recovering the opening kickoff on the Myrtle Creek 25.

Larry Bangs packed the ball in the final four yards inside tackle for the Trojans to give them a 6-0 lead. The placement for conversion was low.

The game was even through the rest of the first half. But in the third period, the Vikings took the opening kickoff in a 3-yard march in 11 plays which culminated in the final 40 yards.

Douglas Offers Threat

Douglas threatened them in the third period, moving the ball to the Viking 25, but the Trojans lost the ball on downs.

By game's end, Myrtle Creek, coached by Earl Miller, had taken control, taking the ball to the Trojan one-yard line on ground plays. The game ended at that point with the Vikings having marched 71 yards.

The Vikings netted 235 yards to 131 for Douglas and outscored the Trojans 12-7.

Myrtle Creek's Dads Viking Boosters Club selected Larry Meisner as back of the week and Ed Geer as lineman of the week after the game. Center Bob Shneider of Douglas, who reportedly was contemplating a move to Myrtle Creek in midweek, completed the Trojans.

Bulldogs Edge Past Glendale 25-24 Count

Sutherland edged Glendale in a 25-24 Umpqua Valley League football thriller Friday night at Glendale that was decided on Skip Stillwell's run for conversion after the second Bulldog touchdown.

Stillwell, Sutherland's fine offensive star, sparked the Bulldogs to victory again Friday night, gaining a phenomenal 385 yards, 364 on the ground and 21 in the air.

Both teams scored 12 points in the final period with the Bulldogs coming from behind in the final three minutes on Stillwell's 68-yard dash. The game was a battle of ground attack vs. air attack with Glendale scoring four times on long passes while the Bulldogs' Stillwell raced to four long TD runs.

The 135-pound quarterback opened scoring in the game by romping 35 yards around right end in the opening period. The conversion from placement fell short and Sutherland led 6-0.

Pirates Tie It Up
The Pirates determinedly tied things up in the second quarter when Wayne Berg passed 20 yards to Gene Stein for the score. An interception set the Pirates up on the Sutherland 40. A line play failed to produce the extra point.

Glendale took a 12-6 lead in the third period. That one came on Berg's 20-yard pass to Wesley Young. But the pass for conversion was no good.

An 11-yard TD sweep by Stillwell capped a 60-yard Bulldog drive in the third panel and Stillwell ran the game-winning conversion for a 12-12 Sutherland lead.

Both teams scored 12 points in a wild fourth quarter.

The Pirates went ahead 18-13 as Berg again connected with Young for 10 yards. That play was set up when the Pirates returned Sutherland's kickoff to the Bulldog 20. A line play for the extra point was turned back.

Stillwell Runs 45 Yards
Sutherland then went 60 yards to score with Stillwell eating up the final 45 of a reverse. A pass for conversion failed and it was 19-18 Sutherland.

Berg hit Young for a third touchdown pass as Glendale fought back. It was a 30-yard play, but an end sweep for the extra point was stopped by Sutherland.

Stillwell capped a rising night's work when with three minutes left he dashed 65 yards to score to give the Bulldogs the ball game 25-24. This play followed Glendale's kickoff.

A pass for the conversion was no good. Glendale could not get past the Sutherland 40 as the Bulldogs held in the final minutes.

Southern Cal Scores Upset

Wisconsin Goes Home Loser In 33-21 Tilt

LOS ANGELES — The weary Badgers of Wisconsin headed back to Big Ten country Saturday, blasted out of the nation's unbeaten ranks and doubtless out of their No. 6 rating by once-defeated Southern California.

The score of Friday night's game, the best seen here this season and unfolded before 75,162 noisy fans, was 33-21.

Halfback Jon Arnett, who exploded for 55 yards and the first of the Trojans' five touchdowns; his fullback running mate, C.R. Roberts, and a tremendous line proved too much for the visitors.

Coach Ivy Williamson saw to say-quit Badgers played without several key men, notably Jim Miller, who alternates with Jim Haluska at the quarterback spot.

Loss Riles Trojans
But they caught a Trojan still reeling from a 10-0 setback week before to Washington and once USC got in front in a wild third quarter, there was no stopping him.

Arnett scored two touchdowns and gained 131 yards in 13 times with the ball for a 10-0 lead. Roberts also scored twice, once on a 30-yard run.

Haluska was Wisconsin's big gun, passing for 232 yards with his 12 completions out of 21 throws.

"He climaxed his brilliant performance with a scoring throw to halfback John Bridgeman that went for 78 yards. Fullback Charley Thomas tallied the other two Badger touchdowns on short bucks.

Troy Lineman Strong
The Wisconsin running game was otherwise racked up by Trojan linemen, with Orlando Ferrante, Fabian Abram, George Galili most conspicuous.

"I have no alibis, gentlemen. We lost to a very fine football team. It was a real game. All the Trojans battered us."

So said Williamson to the press later.

Coach Jess Hill of USC was all smiles. This was his second win over Wisconsin. The first was in the Rose Bowl in 1953.

"We wanted that one and we went out and got it," Hill said. "Wisconsin has a good football team, but we wouldn't be denied. Yes, they are the best we have played this year."

Wisconsin's 7-6 lead at halftime, also looked most impressive. But for a 47-yard punt return by Arnett in the second period, which put the Badgers in a hole, the margin might have been wider.

Steelers Test Eagles In NFL Game Tonight

PITTSBURGH — The Pittsburgh Steelers get a chance to prove they're real contenders for the National Football League's Eastern Division title tonight in meeting the win-hungry Philadelphia Eagles.

The Eagles are on the outside looking in at a four-way tie for the division lead. Among the leaders are the surprising Steelers with a 2-1 record.

Cleveland and Washington, two of the other teams tied for first, meet in the nation's capital. The Chicago Cardinals, the fourth member of the quartet, are out to add another defeat to the hapless New York Giants' string of three.
