One of the founders of the Sutherlin Methodist Church died Saturday. Funeral services for Mrs. Ora Shaver Banker, 86, well-known Roseburg woman, are scheduled Tuesday at the chapel of Long & Orr Mortuary at 2 p.m. The Rev. Clarence Currier will officiate. Following services, the body will be sent to Redwood Falls, Minn., for conducting services and interment. Mrs. Banker was born Dec. 5, 1868, in Wenoia, Minn. She came to Sutherlin in 1911 and later became one of the founders of the church there. Her husband, the late D. W. Banker, died about 29 years ago. She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. R. H. Life Penalty Escaped The 38-year-old former San Francisco bank clerk had been accused of broadcasting wartime propaganda for the Japanese, of abusing fellow American soldiers in prison camps, and of causing the death of Army Capt. Burton C. Thomson of Sueda City, Iowa, by informing on him to Japanese captors. His first trial was in U. S. District Court in New York, where he was convicted and sentenced to life imprisonment. The U. S. Circuit Court in New York later set aside the conviction on the ground the trial should have been held in Maryland. The government was reported to have spent a million dollars to convict Provo at his first trial, in 1953. Witnesses were called from all over the world; 20 of the government's 34 witnesses were from Japan.

Martial Law In Circle Strike Partly Ended

INDIANAPOLIS — Gov. George N. Craig Monday ended martial law in Richmond and announced National Guard troops in the Perfect Circle strike areas in two other cities would be reduced by 400 men. The governor said troops will remain at Hagerstown and also in New Castle and the rest of Henry County, in east-central Indiana. They will number about 600.

Tackle Football Rule To Be Eyed By Roseburg PTA

The recent State Dept. of Education directive proposing a ban on tackle football below the high school level will soon come under the scrutiny of all Parent-Teacher Assn. units in the Roseburg School District. In a meeting of presidents and health chairmen last week, the regulations of the state department were reviewed. It was decided then to present the study to all interested parents, according to Mrs. Jack Chapman, information chairman of the Douglas County Council of PTAs. Units now are in the process of scheduling panels and speakers for the next few weeks. The Roseburg School Board, said Mrs. Chapman, has requested executive committee of PTAs and other parent groups for written statements of opinion following consideration of the local athletic program. A resolution also was passed in the session calling for increased participation from all Roseburg and Gile school PTAs in the Red Cross blood recruitment program. Present were representatives from 10 PTA units. Mrs. Walter Brittle, head of the county recruitment program, explained the program. Mrs. Chapman said all PTA groups in the two school districts will challenge one another, on a per-capita basis, in an active effort to rebuild the blood donor program in the county.

Highway Travel Increase Noted

Oregon highway travel increased almost nine percent last month, data obtained from automatic traffic recorders at 32 key locations throughout the state reveals. The recorders, installed and maintained by the State Highway Dept., show rural traffic volume has gained an even 7 percent during the year to date. The September increase averaged 8.9 percent at all locations. September traffic on Highway 99S at a point just south of Woodburn averaged 11,734 vehicles per day, up 17.8 percent over September last year. A recorder at the south end of the Interstate Bridge in Portland counted an average of 35,322 vehicles a day during September, a 14.9 percent gain. Despite the increase in travel, Oregon traffic deaths through September totaled 286 as compared with 285 at the end of September last year, Secretary of State Newberry's office reported. Thirty-three fatalities had been reported in September, five fewer than the 38 deaths charged to September of last year.

Chessman Gets Death Stay For 8th Time

Man has written two books. One called "Cell 2455, Death Row," was made into a movie. The other, "Trial by Ordeal," was published last July although prison authorities said they had impounded Chessman's manuscript under a ban against publication of writings of condemned men. Chessman, now 34, was convicted May 1, 1948, of eight counts of robbery, four of kidnapping, two of sex perversion on victims, one count of attempted robbery, one of attempted criminal assault, and one of auto theft. The latest appeal repeated statements made in previous legal moves that the record of his 1948 trial was "spurious."

Explosion In Oil Field Kills 3 Men, Injures 6

WILSON, Okla. — A bomblike oil field explosion, common more than 25 years ago but rare now, killed three Oklahoma City oil well shooters and injured six others near here Saturday night. The three men were blown to bits when 100 quarts of nitro-glycerin exploded with the force of a 5,000-pound bomb as they prepared to loosen underground oil sand from the well. What caused the explosion probably will never be known. Police think the nitro, a jelly-like substance, was detonated when wires accidentally touched it before it was lowered into the well. The victims were William G. Chandler, 28; Russell G. Sullivan, 48; and Harold E. Brill, 34.

Caribbean Hurricane Misses Major Cities

MIAMI, Fla. — Hurricane Katie, 11th tropical storm of the season, roared across Haiti and with winds of 115 miles an hour. She was not expected to hit the U.S. mainland. No important cities in the two countries — which make up the Caribbean island of Hispaniola — were in the immediate path of the storm. Forecasters said it may be 48 hours before the extent of damage is known.

Brittain Rites Set Wednesday

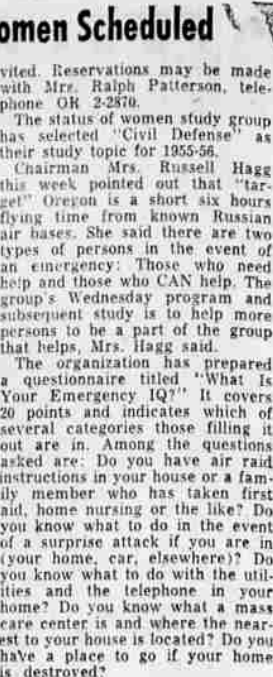

Muehling, who was shot Saturday night at a Bourbeuse River clubhouse where he had gone for a weekend outing with two companions, Frank Laura, 21, and Vincent Oliver Baum Jr., all were St. Louis youths. The sheriff said Baum and Muehling began practicing "quick draw" with .22-caliber target pistols. Muehling was struck in the chest when Baum's pistol was accidentally discharged. Miller said.
