Reuther Outlines Views For Better Living Standards

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Walter Reuther of the CIO Monday said automation can bring "a four-day work week, longer vacation periods, opportunities for early retirement, as well as a vast increase in our material standards of living."

But he said careful social planning and proper controls will be needed if the changeover is to be made "without first having to pay a heavy price in unemployment and human suffering."

Reuther's testimony was prepared for a Senate-House economic subcommittee as it continued hearings on the effects of automation—the growing use of automatic machines for complicated factory processes.

He said a gradual reduction of the work week to 30 or 35 hours and a rapid increase in consumer buying power are needed as "cushions" to absorb the workers who would be replaced by the new machines.

As other parts of an eight-point program, he proposed earlier retirement under social security; improved social welfare services; loans and other aids to small business; re-training of workers whose jobs were eliminated; aid to communities affected; and pricing policies which would help consumers enjoy the increased production.

Milk Price Hiked Cent Per Quart At Corvallis

CORVALLIS (AP) — The price of milk went up a cent a quart in the Corvallis area Monday, following a trend elsewhere in the state. The boost puts the price of four per cent milk at 23 cents and the price of premium milk at 25 cents a quart. The cost of half-and-half cream went up two cents to 27 cents a pint, and the cost of whipping cream now is 36 cents a pint, an increase of four cents.

Red China's Premier Ready To Meet Dulles

HONG KONG (AP) — Premier Chou En-Lai of Red China is ready to meet U.S. Secretary of State Dulles, a member of a Japanese delegation to Peiping reported Monday.

Yoshihiko Katojimi, a Tokyo city councillor who was among 47 Japanese municipal officials who visited Red China, said he talked with Chou at a reception in Peiping Oct. 2. He quoted the Communist premier as saying he is willing to confer with Dulles if such a meeting is needed to improve relations between Peiping and Washington.

Shanghai Life Dreary, Says American Couple

KOBE, Japan (AP) — An elderly American couple, released after long detention in Red China, said here that life in Shanghai is dreary and nerve-racking.

Mr. and Mrs. Howard L. Ricks, who left Shanghai aboard the Dutch ship Straat Ball Oct. 12, said "conditions are gradually changing for the worse. That goes for foreigners, but primarily for the Chinese people."

They were met by their son, John Ricks, a Tokyo businessman. The couple will proceed to Tokyo to meet John's wife and two grandchildren they never have seen.



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
