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Water's Importance More Than Timber's, Foresters Told At Portland Meeting

PORTLAND — The Society of American Foresters set out on field trips Thursday after hearing that water sometimes now is a more important product of forests than timber.

R. A. Work, head of the water forecast section of the Soil Conservation Service at Portland, said several sections already have found this true.

He cited the Rogue and Klamath River Basins in Oregon. There the water value is \$225 an acre, while timber, on a sustained yield basis, is \$175 per acre in the Rogue and \$110 per acre in the Klamath Basin, Work said.

He predicted this trend would spread to other areas with the farm use of water and the water-using industries increasing from 5 to 10 times in the foreseeable future.

A sanitation and engineering expert for the Oregon Board of Health, Curtis M. Everts Jr., Portland, urged wise management of watershed forests.

He suggested that foresters build roads well away from stream beds, that skid trails and other scars be covered with light slash to prevent soil erosion, and that all cut areas be reforested quickly.

Mason B. Bruce, Olympia, supervisor of the Olympic National Forest, told of the big timber salvage job being accomplished in the Forks burn.

He said 655 million board feet of timber was affected in the 1951 fire, but that all but 30 million board feet have been salvaged. He said the rough terrain made road construction cost about \$25,000 a mile, but more than 100 miles of road were built into the burned area to speed the salvage.

Color photography is helping the fight against the Douglas fir beetle, J. F. Wear of the Forest Service at Portland, and P. G. Lauterbach of the Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. at Centralia, Wash., said.

They said color photos, taken from airplane, show up insect-attacked areas in one-tenth the time a ground survey takes.

C. M. Countryman of the Forest Service at Berkeley, Calif., warned the forest fire danger goes up greatly in areas where timber has been cut.

He said ground temperature in a clear-cut area may be twice that of an uncut stand of timber, that fuel moisture may be only half that in the forest and that wind velocity may be 6 to 10 times as high. He concluded that fire control in clear-cut areas may require 20 times the effort in an uncut stand, even if no slash is present.

The foresters went on trips Thursday to tree farms and to the Tillamook Burn in Oregon to view reforestation programs there.

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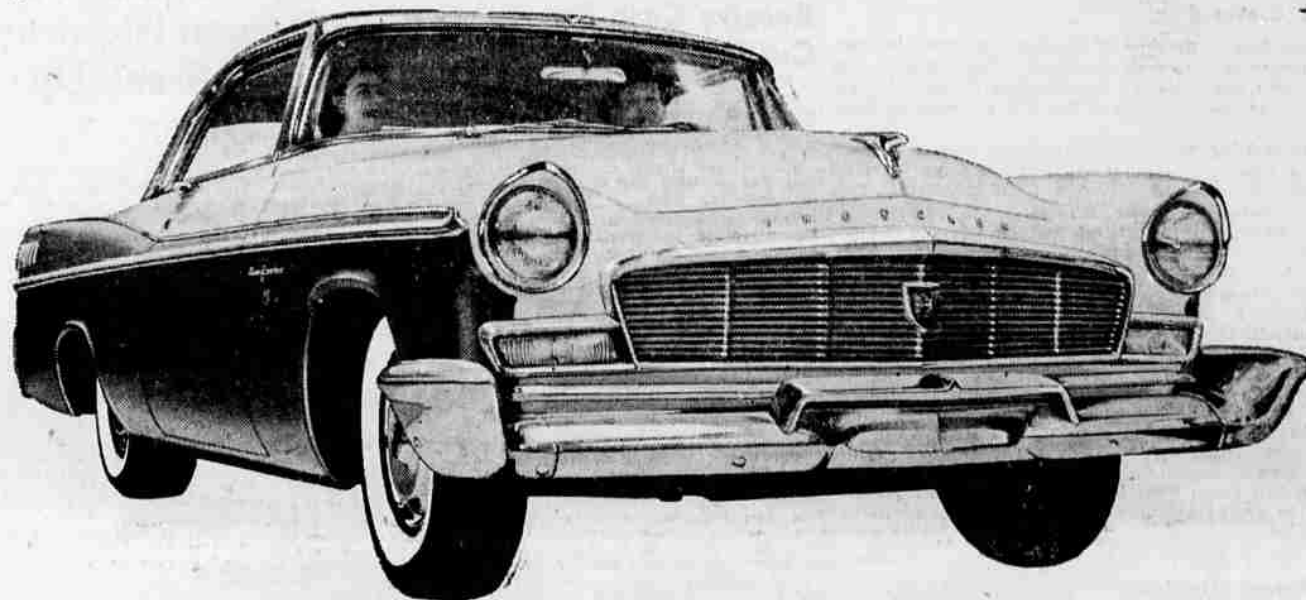
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
