Douglas and Sutherlin walked off with 20-19 decisions over district 6 A-2 opposition in Friday night games while a third Douglas County team, Myrtle Creek, was losing a 19-0 engagement to Coquille in the Red Devils' another sub-district championship.

The Trojans edged Bandon on a last-play touchdown while Sutherlin aced out Coquille's only first-half remaining title challenger, Myrtle Point.

Sutherlin 20, Bobcats 19

Sutherlin's standout halfback, Skip Stillwell, again led the Bulldogs to victory, this time passing to two touchdowns, scoring one himself and adding the winning conversion, as the Bulldogs edged Myrtle Point 20-19 in a thriller at Myrtle Point Friday night.

The winners had to come from behind all the way to do it, giving away touchdowns to the Bobcats first and then coming up with the deuce.

Passes To End

Stillwell passed 15 yards to end Mike Thiele in the second period to tie the score and then C. B. Irons carried over the conversion to make it 7-6. It was a sustained drive of 40 yards.

In the third period with the count 12-7 against them, the Bulldogs

drove 65 yards with Stillwell slashing five yards off tackle to score. Stillwell passed 25 yards to Carl Bay on the drive. The run for conversion failed.

After Myrtle Point had again gone ahead 19-13 with six minutes remaining in the game, the Bulldogs marched 60 yards with the next kickoff, Stillwell passing 20 yards to Thiele for the touchdown.

Stillwell then ran right end for the winning extra point.

In the final four minutes of play, the Bulldogs held the losers for downs the only time they had the ball.

Bobcats Move Ahead

The Bobcat TD that made it 12-7 came off a 40-yard sustained drive after Sutherlin had lost the ball on downs. Jesse Adams scored from the three through the middle. The placement kick was short.

A 55-yard pass play from left end Marlin Ganser to right end Wallis Kincheloe produced the final Bobcat touchdown with six minutes left to play to make it 19-12 for the losers. The conversion was kicked, but it proved to be too little.

Sutherlin outdistanced the losers 316 yards to 170 with Stillwell accounting for 181 yards rushing and 55 yards passing, bringing his season's total yardage gained to 1,589 yards.

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Grants Pass Threatens In Fading Seconds, But Penalties Frustrate

For a third straight year, Bob George's Roseburg Indians denied Grants Pass football victory, coming from behind with 8:16 left in the game to tie the score 7-7 on a 91-yard pass play from quarterback Jerry Droscher to fullback Bill Johnston and Brent Long conversion.

It was the first play from scrimmage after Johnston had intercepted quarterback Chuck Nevi's pass on the Indian nine. Droscher took the snap, faded and ran wide to his right before uncorking a 50-yard heave which Johnston took on the dead run behind Grants Pass defenders on the Cavemen 45.

Johnston Scores

Johnston, who had raced diagonally across field to spear the bombshell, whisked untouched to

showed 40 seconds to go. With this fatiguing turn of events, somebody called for more replacements. And replacements they got. The place was flooded with them.

The replacements lined up for field goal exercise. Tee, Tee, who's got the tee? No one of the new replacements knew where the tee had been cast, so the old ones were called back in.

The strategy was altered to meet the new situation. New reinforcements inundated the arena, but paralysis prevailed. Arm-weary Ed Welnitz tolled off another full count then staggered to the ball. The clock still showed 40 seconds.

Everything still looked the same but the ball was moved back another five yards to the Indian 18.

Light Dawns

The light of day arrived in Grants Pass minds, and a goal-ward bound pass by Nevi was knocked down by Indian defenders Droscher and Johnston, giving Roseburg possession.

With 33 seconds now showing a short Droscher pass was lost by end Dick Woolstenhulme and intercepted by Grants Pass' Roger Taylor on the Indian 23.

With 12 seconds to play from the Indian 23, Nevi faded to hurl again, found an opening and ran instead. Three yards short of the goal Nevi was subdued by defensive workhorse Mel Thomas, Larry Exceen and Jerry Sullivan. That was it.

As for the early action, Grants Pass scored the second time it got the ball, going 22 yards in six plays after Bill Oeding's punt from the Roseburg end zone. Halfback David Flipse sliced the final nine yards at right tackle. Allen Drews converted for 7-0 with 40 seconds left in the first period.

After that, Roseburg always threatened to break things open with a Droscher bombshell while the Cavemen always manufactured a good ground drive that threatened to go unchecked. In fact, the last one went unchecked until it started going in the wrong direction.

At least two Grants Pass passes that looked like sure touchdowns were dropped by Grants Pass receivers and 62-yard punt runback by Flipse was called back on a clipping penalty. Grants Pass had all the statistics edge, too.

Sam Brown Paces UCLA To Victory

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Iowa had more plays, more yardage and more first downs but UCLA won the game Friday night by a score of 23-13. The difference — heads-up play and a guy named Sam Brown.

The speedy Bruin fullback, who started the season a third stringer, scored three touchdowns, one on a 67-yard punt return, and averaged 6.81 yards for each of the 11 times he carried the ball.

Opinion was just about unanimous on Brown's value in the Bruin victory. UCLA coach Red Sanders, Iowa coach Forest Evashevski and Jerry Reichow, the Hawkeyes' brilliant quarterback and probably the outstanding lowman on the field, all praised the 173-pound flyer.

Brown's other touchdowns came on plunges of two and four yards. He also set up the first Bruin score by moving 45 yards in seven carries.

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Roseburg Hunter Bulldogs Deer In Season's Most Bizarre Drama

The story of probably the toughest deer in this year's hunting season was told today by L. B. Hicks, who tangled with a buck which apparently thought it was man-hunting season.

The Roseburg man fought a horn-to-horn battle with the 175-pound blacktail before he finally was able to bulldoze the weakened animal to the ground for the kill.

It happened while Hicks and four other men went to a hunting range in the Green Springs Mountains between Ashland and Klamath Falls.

The five men started out one morning for the hunt. At this point, Hicks takes over the story.

Buck Looms Up

He says he saw a big buck loom up and he fired away, apparently hitting it in the stomach. He raced after the wounded animal and soon spotted the deer again. He blasted away again. This time, he apparently hit the deer's leg. Again the deer bounded away. And again the chase ensued.

About a mile from camp, Hicks came on the deer lying beside a stump. He put down his gun and started looking for a rock to stun the deer with. On second thought, however, he decided he wouldn't need it. He put a foot on one set of horns and grabbed the other. Knife in hand, he reached down to cut the animal's throat when it suddenly began thrashing.

Hicks dropped the knife and

grabbed the horns with both hands. The deer rose up on all four legs. "It was the meanest looking deer I ever saw," he said. "I don't mind telling you, I was scared."

He says he didn't dare let loose because he was afraid the big Pacific buck would try to horn him. Pretty soon, the struggle stopped and the two antagonists were eye to eye. "It was the largest, meanest buck I ever saw in that area," he said.

Tries Bulldozing

Hicks then decided to try to bulldoze the wounded buck. He gave a twist, but the deer stood firm and the struggle started again. Finally, after 10 minutes of tugging and pulling, the deer went down, and Hicks was able to finish the job.

At about that time, two other members of the party, Elmer Hicks of Roseburg and Archie Moore of Sutherlin arrived on the scene. "I didn't hold for help because I didn't have time," he told them.

Just to prove it wasn't a pipe dream on his part, Hicks is having the head of the deer mounted. "I can show it to my future grandchildren," he concluded.

He said the same six men will go back to the same hunting ground next year. Others in the party were H. C. Moore of California and Jake Francis of Sutherlin. He said Francis had been elected president of the hunting delegation.

Beamer Stands Out In Frosh-Rook Tie

CORVALLIS (AP) — Oregon frosh quarterback Herb Juran passed seven yards to end Ron Stover with only 12 seconds left in the game, remaining Friday to give the Frosh a 7-7 tie with the Oregon State Beavers.

The Rooks had gone ahead in the second period on a 44-yard scoring pass play from Tony Arana, halfback from Vale, to Duane Marshall, St. Helens, another halfback. Arana made the extra point by circling right end.

That was all the scoring until the Frosh quarterback from South Salem hit Stover with the pass for the touchdown.

Besides Stover and Juran, other Oregon standouts were Noh Beamer from Roseburg, and Earnel Durden from Los Angeles, both backs. Marshall and Arana were the Rooks' best ground gainers.

Both squads, playing their first game of the season, were ragged and good scoring opportunities were thwarted by frequent fumbles and penalties.

A crowd of 3,000 saw the game.
