

Van Brocklin Leads Rams To Spirited Win Over Lions

LOS ANGELES — The Los Angeles Rams are perched atop the Western Division heap in the National Football League, thanks to a 21-yard touchdown run—and you have the picture of the Rams' star Van Brocklin, Bob Boyd and Elroy (Crazy Legs) Hirsch.

Throw in the clutch running of rookie Ron Walker from Maryland—127 yards in 16 carries, including a 21-yard touchdown run—and you have the picture of the Rams' 24-13 victory over the Detroit Lions Sunday.

The win, witnessed by 68,630 fans in Memorial Coliseum, leaves the Rams with a 4-1 record in league play, with beaten Green Bay and Baltimore next, each with 3-2 standings, and then the San Francisco 49ers and Chicago Bears, upcoming for the Rams here, tied with 2-3.

For Detroit, this was the fifth straight loss for the 1954 division champs.

The Van Brocklin history of Sunday: A pass to Boyd in a play that went for 68 yards and put the Rams in front in the first period, 7-3.

A pass to Hirsch that went for 47 yards and the game-winning touchdown—and credit, old Crazy Legs with a twisting, battling run and escape from at least two Lion tacklers.

Hydroplane Record Set In California

INDIO, Calif. — A new world speed record for hydroplanes in the B Class racing runabout division—61.058 m.p.h.—was set Sunday by Ernie Rose of Patterson, California, in the three-day National Desert Regatta on the Salton Sea.

The previous mark of 59.840 was set by Rose on the same course last year.

National awards for scoring the most points in hydroplane races throughout the year were given two racers, George Moniz, Hayward, Calif., won in the 48-cubic-inch racer class and Ed Fletcher, Bell, Calif., in the E racing runabout division.
