

Polish Exiles Demand Liberation Of POWs

LONDON (AP) — More than 1,000 Polish exiles met in London Sunday to demand release of Poles held in the Soviet Union.

Gen. Wladyslaw Anders, commander of Free Polish forces in World War II, told the meeting there has been no word of 20,000 Polish soldiers taken to Russia as prisoners in 1939 and 1944.

He added that 1 1/2 million Polish civilians were deported to Russia in 1939-40 — "And a negligible number have returned to their homes."

The meeting adopted a resolution appealing to world opinion and democratic governments to work for our countrymen.
