U. S. Said Ready In Case Action Comes In Asia

TAIPEI, Formosa. (AP) — The United States has indicated, quietly but unmistakably, that it has built up an organization instantly ready to assume all the functions of a battle command headquarters in the event of hostilities in the Formosa area.

The indication came in the form of an announcement by Vice Adm. Alfred M. Pride, commander of the U.S. 7th Fleet, that on Nov. 1 the name of the Formosa liaison center will be changed to the United States Taiwan Defense Command.

Pride also heads the liaison center, an organization representing all branches of the U.S. armed forces on Formosa. It works in extremely close cooperation with Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist Chinese high command.

Pride gave two reasons for the name change:

1. Because of "the role played by the United States through the mutual defense treaty signed last March here in Taipei. Among other things, the treaty guarantees U.S. protection of Formosa and the nearby Pescadores."

2. "The increasing use of the name Taiwan in lieu of Formosa." The Nationalists prefer the Chinese name Taiwan, which means terraced bay, to the Portuguese Formosa, which means beautiful Portuguese seamen named the island in the 16th century.

Other U.S. organizations here also plan to substitute Taiwan for Formosa.

James B. Oerding To Attend School At West Point

A Roseburg man, James B. Oerding, 20, has been selected to attend the West Point preparatory school at Stewart Air Force Base, Newburgh, N.Y. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Oerding, 1014 SE Main St.

Oerding enlisted in the regular army in September 1953. He took a battery of examinations this summer while stationed at Ft. Kobbe, Panama Canal Zone. He is one of 180 men selected to take final examinations for the school and was the only person chosen from the Caribbean area.

The 1953 Roseburg High School graduate arrived at the air force base Oct. 15 and has begun an intensive six months schooling. When he completes the course, he will take the entrance examinations at West Point.

M. Sgt. Charles L. Wilcox, U.S. Army recruiting officer for Roseburg, commended Oerding for his fine record Monday. The sergeant said the pre-West Point competitive examinations are given once a year to army personnel stationed throughout the world. Only men who have passed the original army entrance exam with a score of 110 or better are qualified to take the tests.

Oerding was born in Roseburg and attended local schools. He was a member of the high school track team. Following enlistment in the army, he was sent to Ft. Ord, Calif., and later attended leadership school. He has one brother, Bill, a junior at Roseburg High School, and a sister, Priscilla, a second grader at Rose School.

Oregon GOP Plan Hit By Morgan, Demo Chairman

PORTLAND (AP) — A group of Republicans has announced formation of a committee to improve party organization and handle certain financial matters.

The organization, to be known as the "Oregon Committee for Good Government" drew caustic criticism from State Democratic Chairman Howard Morgan.

John C. Higgins, a Portland attorney, is one of the organizers of the new committee, which he said was "a voluntary committee with no constitution, no by-laws and only one elected officer"—the treasurer, Herbert Templeton, Portland.

He said the function of the committee was to collect money and to give donors an opportunity to exercise closer control over the use of their funds.

The committee already has made "one or two advances" to the GOP state central committee, he said.

He said that members are satisfied with State Republican Chairman Wendell Wyatt's efforts at improving the party organization.

Wyatt "made a good report" when he appeared before a meeting of the committee at the Arlington Club in Portland last week, a member of the committee said.

Higgins' Hand Seen

Morgan said in a statement that Oregon voters should be "grateful that a complete picture now has been presented of the capture of John C. Higgins of Vancouver, Wash., representing the New York office of Thomas E. Dewey."

"This development has been rumored for months... the incredible picture of the Republican state chairman, ring in nose, being led into the Arlington Club to 'report' to Higgins and his closed committee, having 'no by-laws, no constitution and only one elected officer' is surely one of the most amazing phenomena ever seen in Oregon politics."

"The arrogance of Higgins and his big money associates in announcing that the purpose of their committee is to 'give donors control over the use of their funds' in Republican politics surely has never been equalled."

"This statement, coupled with State Chairman Wyatt's compliant and subservient willingness to 'report' to Higgins, simply means that from now on a Washington piper named Higgins will officially call the tune for the whole Republican Party in Oregon."

Higgins said he would reply later to Morgan's statement.

The Tri-City addition will contain a multipurpose room with stage and kitchen.

Bids for sale of bonds will be received at Canyonville Nov. 15 at 8 p.m. The bonds will begin maturing Jan. 1, 1957.

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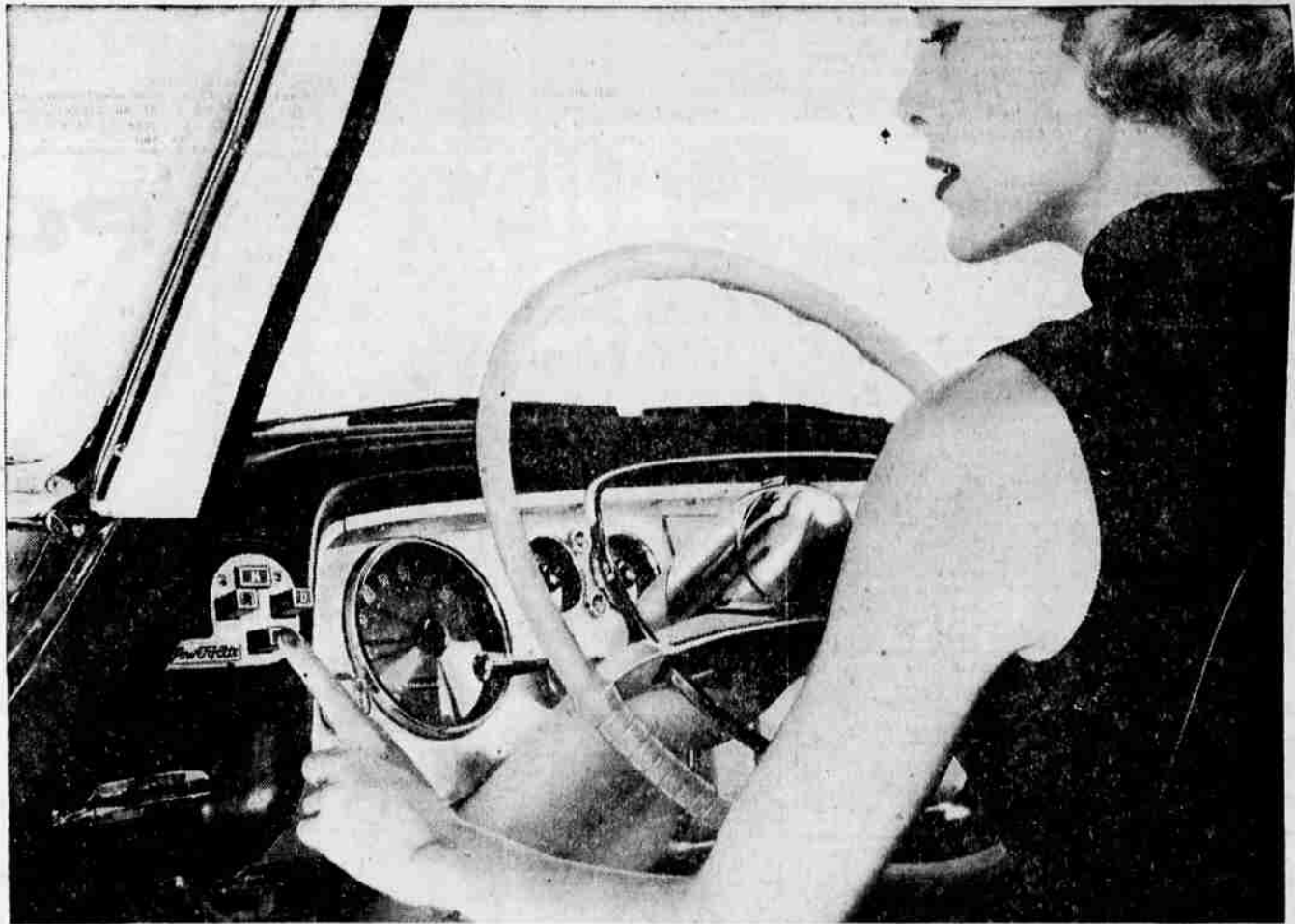
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
