Plaque Now Marks Home Built By Ike's Grandad

ELIZABETHTOWN, Pa. (AP) — A bronze plaque now marks the farm home built by President Eisenhower's grandfather 101 years ago in this central Pennsylvania town.

The plaque was unveiled by the President's brother Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower, president of Pennsylvania State University, at ceremonies Sunday. He said: "If they (the Eisenhower brothers) have lived and strengthened just a little such principles as fear of God, freedom, justice and opportunity, if the family has symbolized these fundamentals, this tablet has a value."

The home is now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Leo W. Phillips. Most of the original house is intact although it has been enlarged and renovated.
