

Non-Profit Hospital Can't Be Held Liable For Acts Declared To Be Negligent

SALEM — The Oregon Supreme Court said this was unfair to the class A stockholders, since they had to put up almost all of the capital.

The decision upheld Circuit Judge James W. Crawford of Multnomah County. A jury in his court had awarded \$3,500 damages to Dolores Ackerman in her suit against Physicians & Surgeons Hospital, but Judge Crawford set the verdict aside and entered a judgment in favor of the hospital.

The high court ruled that Mrs. Ackerman, who said she was burned by a hot water bottle, could not collect because the hospital is a charitable corporation.

In another Multnomah County case, the Supreme Court deprived officers of the American Guaranty Life Insurance Co. from control of the company.

The court, upholding Circuit Judge Martin W. Hickins of Portland, cancelled the class B stock held by the company's officers.

The organizers of the company, who became its officers, issued 19,800 shares of class A stock with a par value of \$10 a share, and 20,000 shares of class B stock at 10 cents a share.

By keeping the class B stock themselves, the officers retained control of the company, and their investment cost them a total of \$2,000.

Thousands Aid Search For Clues To Boy Slayings

CHICAGO — The aid of thousands of school children, county highway workers and utilities employees was enlisted Wednesday in the hunt for clues in the slaying of three Chicago school boys.

Lacking any good lead, investigators have turned to painstaking, routine police investigation methods in the hope of uncovering a needle-in-the-haystack type clue.

School counselors arranged to question some 25,000 school children in the hopes of finding some scrap of information that would provide a lead.

County highway workers have been pressed into a search of culverts or other places where the victims' missing clothing may have been secreted. Utility companies instructed their crews to keep a similar lookout.

Meanwhile, police chiefs for 11 suburbs met with Sheriff Joseph Lohman in an effort to coordinate their activities in the search.

Four men still were held for questioning in the case.

None has been charged in the mystery to which police have been unable to find leads in more than a week of widespread investigation.

Detective Charles Fitzgerald, said Charles Dahlquist, a 33-year-old golf caddy, was seized after a couple reported having seen him and the youngest of the slain boys, Anton Schuessler, 11, together last July.

Dahlquist had been given a lie test and released last week. A second lie test last night was inconclusive.

Minister Climbs To \$32,000

NEW YORK — The Rev. Alvin L. Kershaw, who won \$32,000 on the CBS television and radio show "The \$64,000 Question" with his knowledge of jazz.

He can try for the grand prize next Tuesday night, or quit with his winnings.

The Rev. Mr. Kershaw, 36, rector of the Holy Trinity Episcopal Church at Oxford, Ohio, got over the \$32,000 hurdle last night by answering a complicated question about a 1925 recording of Louis Armstrong.

Another contestant, Don E. Self, a physicist from El Paso, Tex., decided to quit with the \$16,000 he had won in three appearances on the show and not try for the \$32,000 question in his mythology category.

Self, 24, who is working on Long Island, said the money will be used for the education of his son Clifford, 5 months, and toward the purchase of a home in El Paso for his family.

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Israel Policeman Killed, 3 Shot, Two Kidnapped

JERUSALEM — An Israeli policeman was killed, three were wounded and two kidnapped Wednesday when an Egyptian military force penetrated the El Aja-Nitzana demilitarized zone, the Israeli army announced.

A military spokesman said the Egyptians occupied an Israeli police post at Beerotayim, near the Sinai border, during the attack but that they later withdrew.

Beerotayim, which in Hebrew means "two wells," is about a mile inside Israeli territory.

El Aja-Nitzana border problems are reported to be the main topic of the present New York discussions between Maj. Gen. F. L. M. Burns, chief of staff of U.N. observers, and Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld.

A U.N. spokesman said the French chairman of the Egyptian-Israeli Mixed Armistice Commission had received an Israeli complaint on the attack.

The spokesman added that observers in the area immediately went to the spot and ordered the Egyptians to withdraw.

A Foreign Ministry spokesman said Israel regards the incident as "extremely serious."

CAIRO, Egypt — One Egyptian soldier was wounded when Israeli armed forces opened fire on Egyptian frontier check posts near the demilitarized zone of El Aja, Wednesday, an Egyptian government spokesman announced.

In the resulting action, the communiqué said, one Israeli soldier was captured by Egyptian forces.

Educators Will Attend Sessions In Lane County

Douglas County educators and school board members will travel north this weekend to attend one of three meetings slated for Eugene and Springfield.

District superintendents will take in the fall conference of the Oregon Assn. of District Superintendents Thursday morning at the University of Oregon. The superintendents will wind up business at noon, just in time to make the university.

The conference is sponsored by the State Dept. of Education, the host school and the superintendents. It concerns planning and building. One county administrator, District 4's Supt. M. C. Deller, will participate in the program. He will serve as a consultant on remodeling and remodeling school structures.

Along with administrators, a healthy number of school board members will attend the three-day event.

While they're eyeing building statistics and information, the matter of curriculum will be under scrutiny in Springfield, Thursday and Friday the Northwest Assn. for Supervision and Curriculum Development meets for planning. District 4 Assn. Supt. Arthur Judd will represent Roseburg there.

The three events will pave the way to the conference of school board members which will convene in Myrtle Creek Monday at 6:30 p.m.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. — Air Force Capt. Bill Murray didn't quite fly across the nation unnoticed—because of a sharp-eyed, sharp-tongued Arizona.

Murray took off from New York Saturday in a light plane, trying to fly from coast to coast without being detected by the Ground Observer Corps. He was paying the consequences as his part in Jack Bailey's radio show, Truth or Consequences.

Arizona got as far as Eastern Arizona Tuesday without anyone noticing him. But at Winslow, Earl Brinkerhoff had heard the show and had his eye peeled for the black and white striped plane.

Brinkerhoff was mowing the lawn and keeping an eye tilted skyward. It was 2:16 p.m. Two minutes later his telephone call got through to the GOC filter center at Kirtland AFB, Albuquerque.

He estimated the plane, with the label Truth or Consequences on a wing, was about 1,000 feet high, headed west over Winslow.

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Jailbreak Killer Gives Self Up To Officers

ferred a bullet wound in the arm. It apparently had not given him much trouble as he eluded pursuers along the banks of the Willamette River some 20 miles north of Monmouth Monday night and Tuesday.

Reyes said he had thrown his gun away as he fled north, with bloodhounds and searching parties closely on his trail. Half a hundred Oregon State College students were in the posse. At times the searchers were only a few feet behind him and sometimes they even passed him in the underbrush along the river bank, Reyes said.

The fatal shooting of Applegate climaxed a night in which Reyes and Jose DeMasa, 21, also of San Francisco, broke out of the Eugene jail by holding up a jailer with a gun which Reyes had concealed on his person, state police said.

They took a deputy's car and en route to Corvallis flagged down a car containing Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Littlefield of Medford, and their three daughters.

The fugitives locked the Littlefields in the deputy's car and sped on to Corvallis in the Littlefield car.

DeMasa was captured after Reyes smashed the car into a tree at Corvallis. Reyes got away on foot and was attempting to hold up the Applegate family for another getaway car when the fatal wounding of Applegate occurred.

Reyes was taken under heavy guard to a Salem hospital for treatment of his arm wound, then was booked into jail at Salem on a charge of murder.

Earlier, before Applegate died, charges of assault with intent to kill had been filed at Corvallis against Reyes. The formal charge of the killing was to be filed later Wednesday after Reyes' transfer to jail at Corvallis.

DeMasa was returned to Eugene and decision was expected later in the day whether to add to the car theft charge against him. He and Reyes had been jailed at Eugene after arrest Sunday at Grants Pass for car theft.

State police said they had no information on a past record for DeMasa, but Reyes was arrested last spring at Seattle on a charge of burglary on which sentencing was deferred after he had served 60 days.

Although he had been listed as from San Francisco, he told state police Tuesday night that he grew up in Seattle. He added that he had been trained for guerrilla warfare in the Army and he put that to good use in his flight. The gunnysacks on his shoulders provided fine camouflage, he said, when he crouched down and flipped one over his head.

Reyes said he didn't know when he was shot in the arm—whether in the scuffle when Applegate grabbed him or whether by a shot as he fled. He said that he didn't intend to shoot Applegate and was sure he didn't pull on the trigger when three shots that hit the Corvallis man were fired from the gun he agreed was in his hand.

to Egypt, Sharett smiled and said there was nothing definite to report.

The long talk with Sharett made Dulles late for his plane and he took time as he left the residence only to tell reporters that he had had a "full talk" with the Israeli leader and that he had discussed "Middle East affairs in general" with Zorin.

The threat to the uneasy balance between the Jewish state and various Arab states in the Middle East was thrown into the Paris meeting of the Big Three by the surprise arrival here of Sharett, who insisted on a part in the talks. He got it.

GENEVA — Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov flew in Wednesday for the Big Four Geneva conference, a smile on his broad face. He was the first of the four foreign ministers to arrive.

Molotov landed in a Soviet transport plane. This is Molotov's third Geneva conference in 18 months.

He flew in from Berlin, where he spent Tuesday night in the Soviet sector. At Berlin, East German Wednesday they will hold a party conference to make "decisions of wide-ranging importance."

There was no indication when, however, the announcement touched off speculation that the conference will give formal approval to the creation of an East German national army.

The announcement, timed to appear just before the conference in Geneva, was taken by Western officials as a hint that the Communists are not expecting much progress on German unification.

Tooth Cavities To Be Reduced By Fluoridation

PORTLAND — Cavities in children's teeth will be reduced 65 to 70 per cent in Oregon communities which are fluoridating their drinking water supplies, the League of Oregon Cities was told Tuesday.

Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer, told delegates he was basing that prediction on surveys made in the four Clatsop County towns which are using fluorides.

He said the surveys showed an appreciable decrease in tooth decay at Gearhart, Seaside, Astoria and Warrenton.

There is virtually no danger of excessive amount of fluorides being added to water supplies, Harold Millican, water supply engineer for the board of health reported. He said that fluoridation equipment could be installed for from \$500 to \$4,000.

Other speakers at Tuesday's session included S. C. Benson, research director for the federal commission on intergovernmental relations, and James H. Gilbert, a former dean at the University of Oregon.
