

PCC Football Tops Big Ten

Either Pacific Coast Conference football is getting better or the Big Ten brand is slipping, a check of the records showed Thursday. PCC teams have defeated Big Ten opponents four times in six games this season with one more to go—and Southern California is a near unanimous choice to make it five out of seven over Minnesota Saturday at Minneapolis.

The record is a complete switch from that compiled only one year ago. Western teams won only twice in six encounters during 1954 regular season play.

Coast winners this year have been Stanford, 6-0 over Ohio State; UCLA, 3-13 over Iowa; Southern California, 33-21 over Wisconsin; and Washington, 20-0 over Minnesota. The losers are Stanford, 38-14 to Michigan State, and California, 20-13 to Illinois.

Last year the only two PCC victories over Big Ten foes were by slim margins—Stanford's 12-2 from Illinois and Southern Cal's 12-7 from Northwestern. On the other side of the ledger, Michigan State crushed Washington State, 54-6; Michigan beat Washington, 14-0.

Against other non-conference opposition, though, the Coast isn't doing as well. Last year PCC teams broke even in 24 games with all other non-league teams, excluding the Big Ten. This fall, with seven such games still on the schedule, the records show only seven victories against nine defeats.

All-time PCC records, dating back to 1916, show member teams with a combined 31-39-3 slate against the Big Ten and a 179-131-16 mark against all other non-conference teams.

What about the Rose Bowl? PCC teams have won only twice in 11 games with Big Ten teams while posting a 14-10-3 mark against all other schools. The last Coast triumph in the Pasadena post-season classic was Southern California's 7-0 triumph over Wisconsin in the 1953 game. The first was in 1921, when California whopped Ohio State, 21-0.

The Big Ten has won 8 of the 9 Rose Bowl games played between the two conferences since the present series started in 1947.

Marciano Ready For Moore Again

LOS ANGELES — Heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano is perfectly willing to fight Archie Moore again, provided the public wants a rematch and Archie "wins a couple of fights in the next few months."

So said the champ here Thursday, adding (1) that Jersey Joe Walcott hit him much harder than did venerable Archie, and (2) Moore really got under his skin with his campaign for a title fight. "Sure I was sore," said Rocky. "He even sent me personal letters, daring me to fight him."

Due to the government's healthy bite out of his ring earnings, Rocky confided, it isn't profitable to fight more than twice a year. He figures the next defense of the crown will be in June.

Yes, he added, the winner of the coming rematch between Nino Valdes-Hurricane Jackson "will move into contention."

Carpenter Leads Scoring Battle

WINNIPEG — Ken Carpenter, and Cleveland Browns' halfback, is the scoring leader of Canada's Western Interprovincial Football Union.

Carpenter, playing for Saskatchewan, also has set a touchdown record for the league in one season. His 17 touchdowns to date better by one the previous mark of 16 set by Tom Casey of Winnipeg in 1952.

Carpenter scored two touchdowns against the British Columbia Lions last weekend to raise his scoring total to 85 points. That is 8 more than have been scored by Winnipeg quarterback, Buddy Leake, a former Oklahoma star.

Carpenter, from Seaside High School, was an all-Coast player at Oregon State where he was a starter for four years. After several big seasons with Cleveland he jumped to Canadian play.

Newspapers Facing Upped Advertising, Subscription Rates

NEW YORK — Forthcoming increases in newsprint prices leave American newspapers with no alternative except to increase advertising rates and the price to subscribers, the general manager of the American Newspaper Publishers Assn. (ANPA) said Wednesday.

Commenting on the hikes of \$5 a ton by two Canadian newsprint makers and of \$4 a ton by another, Cranston Williams, ANPA general manager said:

"With the Canadian newsprint mills increasing the price of newsprint \$5 a ton, the total cost of this raise to American daily newspapers will be 32 million dollars. This staggering sum is more than any newspaper anywhere can absorb. The margin today between expense and income of the American daily newspaper is the narrowest ever and growing narrower. To stay operating, our newspapers will have to find new and additional income. They have only two sources, advertising rates and the price of the newspaper to readers. These will have to go up if the papers are not to go out of business."

Air Pollution Causes Deaths At New Orleans

NEW ORLEANS — Two asthma patients died and more than 350 others received treatment at Charity Hospital between midnight and dawn Wednesday—apparently the victims of atmospheric conditions.

Doctors at the hospital described the condition of the asthma patients as "unusually severe" and the rush in the emergency room as the worst in memory.

The Weather Bureau reported patches of smog and fog in parts of the city.

Two other hospitals reported a total of 27 persons treated for asthma attacks.

A Weather Bureau spokesman said conditions Tuesday night were unique because there seemed to be a lot of dust late Tuesday and through the night.

The dust intermixes with the fog, he said.

Weather Bureau Says More Rain Can Be Expected

Most of Oregon was soaked by rain Tuesday and early Wednesday and the Weather Bureau warns that more is in the offing for the western part of the state by late Thursday.

It snowed at higher elevations. Timberline Lodge, on Mt. Hood, had its first heavy fall of the year. Three inches of new snow fell there.

The rain was most intense on the coast and in northwestern Oregon. In the 24-hour period ended at 4:30 a. m. Newport had 1.46 inches and North Bend record 1.15. Salem had 1.25 and Portland 1.15.

Elsewhere in the state Medford had .78, Roseburg .71, Klamath Falls .27 and Pendleton .36.

Fed by more than 26 hours of rain, rivers spilled over their banks in many parts of Western Washington Tuesday, causing thousands of dollars of damage.

Hardest hit was the little community of Longmire in Mt. Rainier National Park. Its 100 residents were forced to evacuate Tuesday when the Nisqually River spilled its banks, knocking out the concrete Glacier Bridge, near Paradise, and breaching part of the road to the Longmire camp grounds.

Forest rangers estimated damage at \$150,000.

POLICY HOLDERS MUST PAY

AUSTIN, Tex. — More than 15,000 people who bought policies from an insurance firm which went broke have been ordered to help pay off the \$193,148 of debts.

Dist. Judge Charles O. Betts ordered the assessments against former policy holders of Pioneer Western Mutual Insurance Co., now defunct.

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
