Boy Dies In Fire Trying To Get His New Pajamas

McMINNVILLE, Ore. — A little boy pulled away from his father and died in their flaming home Friday because he wanted to get his new pajamas.

The boy, Bobby Nisly, 2½, was being led out of the burning one-story frame farm house three miles south of here and he and his father, Van Nisly, were nearly to the door when he pulled his hand from his father's and turned back. Three times the father reentered the house and groped for the son whose calls and coughs he could hear. Each time he was driven outside by the dense smoke.

It was suffocation which killed the boy, Coroner Glen Macy said. Firemen found his form huddled in a corner.

Mrs. Nisly carried the couple's only other child, Juanita 1½, to safety.

The couple said they recently got a new pair of pajamas for their son but he was not wearing them when the fire broke out. As he pulled away from his father he said he didn't want to leave them.

Nisly said the fire was caused by an improvised walnut dryer in a shed attached to the house.

U Of O Song Writer Of 1907 Dies Of Attack

SEASIDE, Ore. — Robin Nelson, 68, Northwest regional director for Seagrams Distillers for years, suffered a fatal heart attack while speaking at a Rotary Club meeting here Thursday.

He was the author of the popular University of Oregon song, "When I Sit and Dream at Evening," which he wrote in 1907.

A heart attack curtailed his activities and he retired last April. He and Mrs. Nelson lived here and at Portland after that.

While a student at the University of Oregon, he was a baseball pitcher and played two years on the basketball team.

He was city engineer at Hoquiam, Wash., for two years about 40 years ago, and later was in the lumber business near Chehalis. He was with Seagrams 19 years, stationed in Portland.

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. — A volunteer fireman was killed and nine others were injured early Friday when a 300-foot covered bridge collapsed in a fire believed set by Halloween pranksters.

The wooden bridge, spanning White River east of Gosport, apparently was set fire about midnight.

The body of Bert Dittamore, 33, a Gosport merchant and volunteer fire fighter, was recovered from the stream.

Rotary Governor Stresses Importance Of Individual Member And Friendships

The importance of the individual member and the friendships created in Rotary service were stressed Thursday noon in a talk before the local club by Alton F. Baker of Eugene, district governor of the organization.

At a noon meeting in the Hotel Unquaga, the visiting officer pointed out that "friendship and fellowship lead to understanding" and understanding can bring peace and hope in the world.

The improvement in human relations through the efforts of individual Rotarians in 93 countries is a great asset in promoting world understanding and peace, Baker said.

A veteran of 27 years as a Rotarian, Baker reviewed for local club members the objects of Rotary International and reminded them that the worldwide organization is wholly democratic in operation.

Despite the scope of the organization, Baker explained, the ideas, vision and changes inherent in improvement and service still come from the individuals who meet week after week, rubbing shoulders and enhancing friendships.

The district governor called upon his listeners to enlarge the club membership. "The more Rotarians we get, the better job we can do," he said, adding that the same effort to further understanding applies to other service clubs as well.

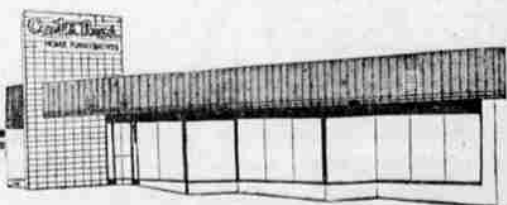

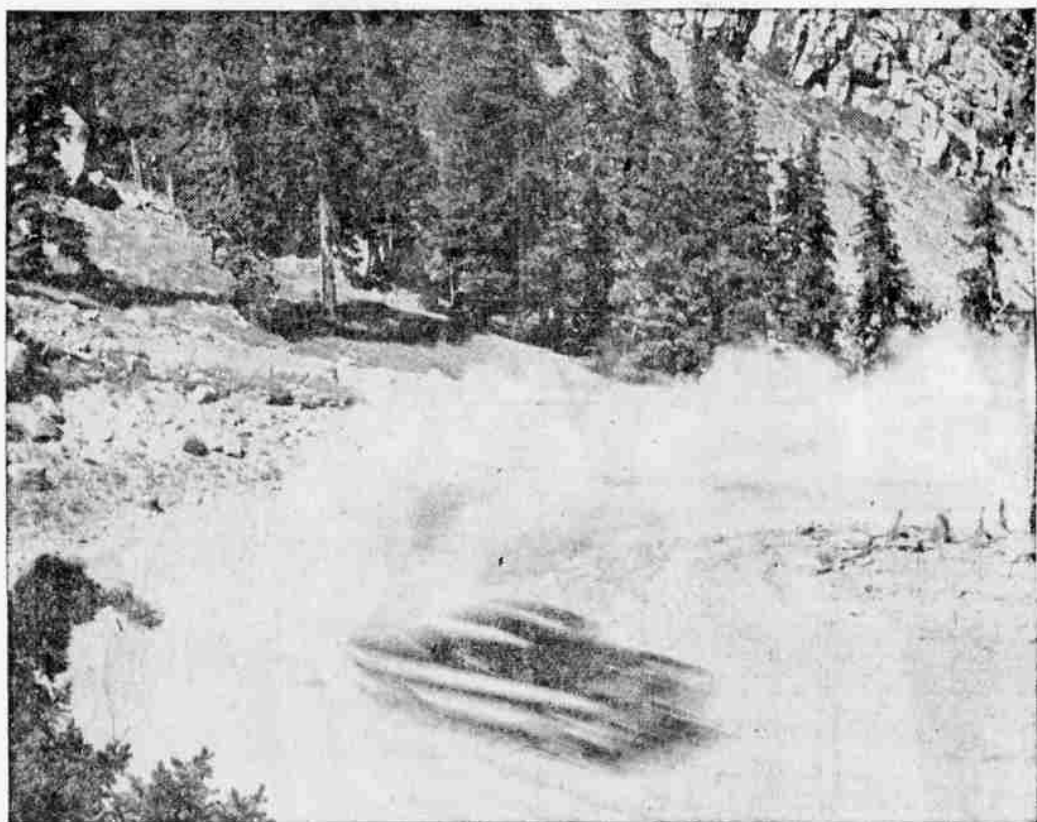
